VERY LATEST BY TELEGRAPH. London, Nov. 14. Consols 2 1/2 Markets steady.

Several lines of telegraph wires to the South American continent have been laid. The storm last night prevailed in New York, and the South sea a portentous gale, rain falling heavily. No arrivals from sea, and marine disasters are feared. Telegraph wires were affected, and worked poorly in all directions.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15th. Gold 111. Eight Exchange 10 per cent. premium. The weather cleared up to-day after a severe Eastern rain and gale, lasting 20 hours. The storm extended along the Atlantic coast, and marine disasters are feared.

During the present season 22 Gloucester fishing vessels have been lost, and 136 men drowned. No signs yet of the Grand Duke Alexis and the Eginian fleet.
