We are moral-force Repealers. (Tremendous cheering.) We are the disciples of the Great O'Connell—he of European fame. (Loud cheering.) We are his followers; and though he is dead we will hoist his banner for Repeal, liberty, and Old Ireland. (Great cheering.) I have great pleasure, my lord and electors of Tipperary, in proposing Francis Scully as a fit and proper representative for gallant Tipperary. The Archdeacon resumed his seat amidst the loudest demonstrations of applause.
