Frederick Harrison on Education

"It has long been a favorite idea of mine that many things work delightfully for good while they are spontaneous and unorganized, but when they are stereotyped into an elaborate art and evolve a special profession or trade of experts, they produce unexpected failures and end in more harm than good." In this sentence is contained the underlying thought of Mr. Frederick Harrison's remarks on education in the forum for December, says the Review of Reviews for January. Mr. Harrison's observations have led him to believe that the less we systematize education and dogmatize about it the better. Education should not be treated as if it were a special act. It cannot be taught, "like playing the violin." Minds are too various and too subtle to be prescribed for specifically. "We ask," he continues, "too much from education, we make too much of it, we monstrously over-organize it, and we cruelly overload it. Education can do for us infinitely less than we have come to expect; and what little it can do is on the condition that it be left simple, natural and free. I have known very few men who were made into anything great entirely by their education; and I have known too many who were entirely ruined by it and who finally turned out as pedants, prigs, or idiots. Struggling to win prizes in examinations, thinking always about the style current to-day being put through the regular mill, and pouring over some little corner of knowledge for some material object, may give an outside appearance of learning, with nothing behind it, will turn out mechanical eccentricities like calculating machines, may change an honest fellow into a selfish, dull brute or leave a weak brain softened and stupified for life. And the more we organize education the greater is the risk of our finding this result." Education, he maintains, can at best do but little for us. "All that it can really give is this: it can supply the opportunities of self-culture; hold forth new standards and ideals to aim at; it can bring the budding mind into contact with a formed and mature mind. It can suggest, explain, correct, and guide in a very general and occasional way; but it cannot teach vigorous thinking, or thrust coherent knowledge into a raw mind, as a ploughboy can with trouble be taught to write or to remember the multiplication table." Mr. Harrison does not deny that drill, in its place and for certain purposes, is good, but believes that in modern education it is over done—enforced at the expense of "minds, characters, imaginations and hearts." It can turn out troopers, but can it turn out well-developed minds? He does not believe in the examination system, as he holds, disastrous to education. They never can test any knowledge worth having, and only debase and pervert education. He sighs for the old academy of Plato and Aristotle, to which the students came in search of knowledge.

Eastern News

The genial lighthouse keeper of Souris ceased lighting the lamp on the 17th inst. The 8th of this month is the usual time for allowing this light to go out, but this year is an exception. Mr. McDonald is a faithful and proficient officer, and as he has to keep his lamp trimmed and burning every year for weeks after other lights on the coast are extinguished, he is justly entitled to more pay. The usual week of prayer at Souris was postponed owing to the illness of one of the resident clergymen. Meetings are now held in the Methodist and Presbyterian churches alternately. The Sons of Temperance have rented McDonald's Hall from the W. C. T. U. They meet once a week. Several have joined lately, and the cause is said to be now in the ascendant. This has been a wonderful season in more ways than one. Last week farmers were ploughing in R. L. B. Y. and a joint settlement. Farmers in the same week have finished off the same work. Such is unprecedented in the history of our local weather prophets, one or two of whom have passed their three score years and ten. The contract for the construction of a new bridge at Naufrage has been let. Messrs. Wnelan and Manning are the contractors. The bridge is much needed, and when finished, in connection with the new road opened by the late Government, will prove a valuable acquisition to the travelling facilities of the north side. The lobster business is not likely to be neglected next season. Several new factories are being built at different points along the coast. As this is one of the principal industries of the country, it is hoped that no false step will be taken by either the packers or the Government in establishing new regulations or in repealing some of those already in force.

Tarte's Dish of Crow.

HE HUMBLLY APOLOGIZES FOR SLANDERING A RESPECTABLE CITIZEN. A Montreal despatch of the 17th says: The famous J. J. Tarte has received his first check and to-day has eaten humble pie like a little man. Le Canadian published an article Friday on the royal commission, in which Tarte added that "Austin Mosher, the Montreal correspondent of the Toronto Empire, had for several years daily written all the injuries imaginable against the good people of the province of Quebec, against his matriculation and their public men. The article also stated that there was no fifth that he did not seek to cover the people of Quebec with, that he was a stranger, a fanatic, and an insulter of the French race in Quebec." Messrs. MacMaster and McGibbon, Q. C.'s, at once demanded a full apology, and slandering Tarte came to time promptly as follows: I am responsible for these words although I am not the writer. I readily recognize the fact that they are injurious to Mr. Mosher, consequently I retract whatever has been written and apologize for the same, although I completely fail to have confidence in Mr. Mosher and his methods as a newspaper correspondent. I admit that the words complained of were such as to leave me no alternative but to retract them.

Personal

Prince George of Greece, who saved the Czarevitch from a Japanese assassin several months ago, has recently performed another heroic deed. While on board a vessel in the Bay of Piræus during a heavy storm he saw a boat with a sailor bound for his ship. Instantly the Prince sprang overboard, seized the drowning man and swam with him to a point where help was possible.

Captain Kise, the heroic commander of the British man-of-war Galilee, at Samaras, in the famous hurricane of three years ago, has been promoted to the office of flag captain to Admiral the Earl of Clan William.

The recent achievement of T. P. O'Connor in producing within one week a complete life of Mr. G. S. Parnell is no exorbitant but by no means unexampled instance of fast literary work. Goldsmith wrote his classic "Vicar of Wakefield" under even greater pressure, for an officer of the law stood at his elbow to expedite matters. Marion Crawford's "Mr. Isaac" was the result of a month's work; and other authors, when the frenzy was on, have exhibited remarkable bursts of speed in composition. Horace Greeley, for example, wrote his "Printer" in thirty minutes. It was composed to be read at a Press Club benefit, and Mr. Greeley rose from bed at midnight to write it, after the poet chosen for the occasion had shown himself unequal to the task.

Educational Journal: There is no more common, or, to our thinking, more mischievous educational heresy than that which claims that the teacher stands to the child, for the time being, in the relation of parent. The teacher cannot take the place of the parent, and should not attempt to do so. One of many reasons is that the instinctive affection is wanting on both sides, an indispensable factor. The teacher should, in the interest of parent and child, as well as in his own interest, impress upon parents that he or she does not usurp their functions, but relies on the parental training and discipline for those elements in the child's character which alone can make the latter subservient to the authority of the teacher.
