GREAT HURRICANE IN WEST INDIES. Two Hundred Persons Were Killed.

WAS ACCOMPANIED BY TIDAL WAVE AND HEAVY RAINS.

Storm General Throughout the Island. Many People Homeless.

LONDON, Sept 15.—Advices received here state that a terrible hurricane has swept over the Barbadoes in the Windward group of the Lesser Antilles.

Two hundred persons were killed and 40,000 rendered homeless.

St. THOMAS, Danish West Indies, Sept. 15.—According to the latest reports from St. Lucia, the storm which broke upon the island on Sunday night developed almost unprecedented violence being accompanied by a tidal wave and tremendous rains.

Numerous land slides were caused and many houses bridges and cocoa estates were destroyed.

At least twelve lives have been lost. Guadaloupe, the French island in the Leeward group experienced very heavy weather. Nineteen deaths are reported and there have been destructive land-slides.

St. Vincent has experienced the most violent and destructive cyclones ever known there.

Kingston, the capital of St. Vincent, is totally destroyed.

It is estimated that 300 lives have been lost on that island and that 20,000 people are homeless.

The bodies of the dead are being buried in trenches.

Thousands are starving or being fed at the public expense.

The amount of property destroyed in St. Vincent cannot yet be estimated.

Every small house is down and many large ones have been destroyed.

The demolished buildings include churches, stores and almost all estate buildings.

Three large ships are ashore on the Windward Coast and many smaller vessels are stranded.

ELECTRIC LIGHT SPORTS.

Witnessed by a Large Crowd—
Summary of the Events.

That electric light sports are a drawing card, and a big one at that, was once more made evident last evening. The stand was almost entirely filled, while a crowd more than sufficient to closely pack it lined along the stretches. The night was a fine one with just about sufficient frigidness in the air to make the racers keep at it all the time out of consideration for their own comfort, if for nothing else.

Sometimes the boys do forget that they are not on the tracks to demonstrate their slowness; but last evening, loafing was conspicuous by its absence. The track was in good condition and well lighted, the band played sweetly and the crowd though evidently pleased were somewhat lacking in the article of enthusiasm dealt out on former occasions. The reason is plain: The contestants were all local men, and being such, the knowing ones had them all labelled in their respective order of merit long before the starter's pistol flashed. Some of the finishes were close ones nevertheless, and altogether the management of the C. A. A. are to be congratulated in the enterprise exhibited.

The officers were: Referee, Dr H D Johnson; Starter, A E Ings, Judges, Geo J Rogers, B C Prowse, W L Harvie; Clerk of Course, H Large; Timers, J M Campbell, H Dingwell.

RESULT OF HIGHER TAXATION.

Inland Revenue for August Over \$800,000—The Highest Figure Ever Reached in one Month.

OTTAWA, Sept. 15th.—The increased tax on spirits of twenty cents per gallon additional and on tobacco of ten cents per pound on raw leaf has brought up the excise revenue for August to over \$800,000, the highest figure it has reached in any single month.

RACING AT THE PARK.

Fine Weather and Large Attendance.

PROVIDER AND OTHER HORSES DO GOOD WORK.

Exhibitions by Royal Canadian Dragoons—Some Hoof Prints.

The large number of people in attendance at the races on the Driving Park yesterday afternoon thoroughly appreciated the splendid manner in which the different events on the card were pulled off. It is true that those who expected the races to be called at one o'clock and had to wait until two before the sport began were somewhat disappointed; but this feeling wore off when the horses appeared and the programme was entered upon.

Mr. Frank J. Power, of Halifax, acted as starter, and he had for his associate judges Mr Geo Hughes, of Charlottetown, and Mr A C Rogers of Summerside. Mr. Harry Horne was distance judge.

Messrs W A Brennan, of Summerside, and Dr H D Johnson, Charlottetown, were the official timers.

Mr CE McKinnon was clerk of the course, with Mr A E Hogan as assistant.

THREE MINUTE CLASS.

This was the first event on the racing programme, and of the seven entries six came up for the word. These were Rilla May, Beatrice Mac, Meddlesome Miss, Parkside jr, and Romp, taking positions in the order in which their names are given. Parkwood was drawn.

The race was decided in straight heats, Romp doing the trick very neatly. Beatrice Mac put up a good race, but was not successful in winning from the Halifax mare. Meddlesome Miss finished third in the first heat, but was put back a place for hitching. Parkside jr, got the flag in the first heat. The summary follows:—

THE 2.26 CLASS.

There were even starters in this race, viz., Minnie, Flashlight, Bonny F, Provider, Beau Prince and Button. Shaver and Belnut were drawn. Minnie had the pole, and the others had positions in the order in which their names appear.

Provider demonstrated his superiority in this race, which he captured in straight heats. In the first heat he took the pole from Minnie at the three-quarters, and in the other two he led from start to finish. Provider trotted in grand shape throughout the race, never lifting his nose. Minnie finished second in the first heat, but fell behind in the other two. Flashlight, which finished sixth in the first heat, came up better in the succeeding ones, landing a good second to Provider. The summary:—

THE 2.40 CLASS.

All the horses entered came up for the word. They were Peter Clinch, Ranvolona, Joe Younghart, Herdie, Vernon River Boy and Lady Chief. Peter Clinch drew the pole, and the others scored up in the order given above.

It took four heats to dispose of this race, and the shades of evening were stealing over the track before it was concluded. The first heat was won by Peter Clinch, which led from start to finish. Vernon River Boy was second and Joe Younghart third. The

three following heats were taken by Joe; but every inch of the ground was stubbornly contested by Peter. In the last heat Joe and Peter passed under the wire almost neck and neck. Following is the summary:—

New features are promised for today.

The officials performed their several

duties satisfactorily. Starter Power showed a disposition to give all the horses a fair show, and he handled the large fields very cleverly.

Nineteen fine horses came up for the word yesterday. There are also good fields for today.

The music yesterday was good. It was furnished by Galbraith's Band.
