Accidents Keep Near To Home

WINNIPEG (CP) — Judging from accident statistics it seems that the farther the motorist is from home, the safer he is. Commissioner of motor vehicles, R. B. Baillie, says most accidents in Manitoba happen within a 25-mile radius of the drivers' home. Last year, of 7,878 drivers involved in Manitoba accidents outside the Winnipeg area, 5,974 were within a few miles of where they lived. City motorists driving in the country made up 18 per cent, while only 340 were drivers from other provinces. Mr. Baillie says residents get careless about taking the wheel after taking a drink and foolishly try to "make it home" while their reactions are impaired by liquor.

Sailors' Prank Caused Concern

HONOLULU (AP) — Prankish British sailors nearly upset Christmas Island H-Bomb test by flashing a phony "Warrior go Home" signal at that aircraft carrier, a Royal Navy officer said Friday. Cmdr. D. R. Williams, skipper of a Royal Navy craft now at Pearl Harbor, said it happened this way: Several British sailors were fishing off shore in a small boat when the Warrior arrived at Christmas Island just before the scheduled H-bomb test. "When the Warrior hove into sight they raised a Japanese flag and signalled the carrier — warrior go home, stop H-Bomb test." "The Warrior's brass thought it

It was the same necklace she had brought in five or six times before. In minutes she had the money. Then she said: "Now, remember, my husband must not know about this."

The employee smiled to himself as he thought back a week when her husband sat in the same room and pawned a valuable ring to pay gambling debts. For this was Kaskel's in midtown Manhattan — a pawnshop in the basement is nearly filled with more than 6,000 furs worth an estimated \$500,000. Every item

Fairbanks Is Popular With Royal Family—And Others

By EDDY GILMORE LONDON (AP) — Social climber? sneered an envious matron when the name of Douglas Fairbanks Jr. came up. "Why the man's the hilly of them all." (Sir Edmund Hillary scaled Mt. Everest in 1953.) Not once, but twice, the Queen and Prince Philip have dined as Fairbanks' guest, a fact that has earned up a wave of acid criticism in his wake as the 47-year-old son of the late silent film star-Douglas Fairbanks sails through London society. The younger Fairbanks made his first trip to Britain when he was five months old. Later young Douglas and his mother stayed in a hotel near Buckingham Palace. "They say it was my delight of march up and down with the sentry outside the palace," he recalls. Forty-three years later he can walk past the sentry with the assurance of a man who is on a personal friendship basis with the folks inside. Over the years he has returned regularly to England. Now he lives here. "When am I leaving?" he replied to a question. "Why, I'll stay here as long as they'll have me." Douglas Fairbanks Jr. is an enthusiastic Anglophile, but one who is dedicated to fostering better

understanding between Britain and the United States. His London home is a lovely house in a fashionable section of town. He bought it from the Duke of Leeds a few years after the war. Fairbanks claims it's an unpretentious place. "What an enormous dining room!" remarked a friend who was being shown over the house by Mrs. Fairbanks just after she and her husband moved into it. "Oh, well," said the new owner, "we mean to do some serious entertaining."

Fairbanks detractors — and he has them as any man in his position would — claim that with the house as his base he embarked on a relentless hunt for big social game. THE BANK IN FAIRBANKS Fairbanks is a busy man. Three film companies list him as a director. He's also the director of a camera company and a ball point pen business and runs a consultant company on imports-exports. A Sunday newspaper recently said of him: "Everyone knows everything about Fairbanks, except, perhaps, that he has made \$5,000,000 out of TV — and stands to make a lot more."

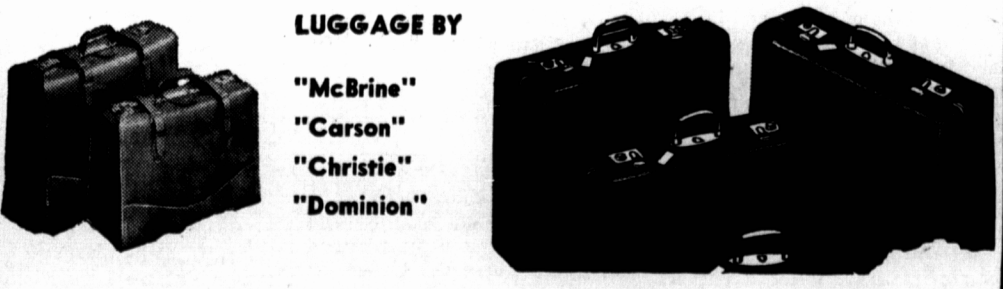
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
