LONDON. (CP) — The North Refreshment Booth Concession at Stanhope Campground, Prince Edward Island National Park

Russians Name New Ambassador To Great Britain

LONDON. (Reuters) — Jacob Malik, former Soviet delegate to the United Nations, will replace Andrei Gromyko as Russia's ambassador to Britain.

Gromyko paid farewell calls Thursday on the minister of state, Selwyn Lloyd and Prime Minister Churchill who is acting for Foreign Secretary Eden. The 43-year-old Russian is expected to leave for Moscow this weekend after serving less than a year in Britain. His departure comes as a distinct surprise here since his wife Lydia arrived only today from Moscow to take up residence in London.

Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov was reported to have personally requested Gromyko's recall to have him by his side during the current shifts in East-West relations. The two men are close friends.

\$18,600 Paid For Removing Ashes

OTTAWA. (CP) — Douglas Harkness (PC-Calgary East) drew attention to an \$18,600 item in defence estimates Friday for "removal of ashes" at the Petawawa, Ont., military camp.

He asked Associate Defence Minister Campney how much coal was used at the camp to produce ashes to such an extent that it cost \$18,000 to remove them. The minister replied he wasn't competent to compute coal in terms of ashes without reference to the Dominion coal board or some other such body.

He promised to look into the matter adding: "All I can say now is that that's a lot of ashes."

Campbell brought Steele safely to shore and enabled Mr. Connell to make his own way to safety.

They'll Be Prepared In Kirkland Lake, Ont., 20 Boy Scouts are learning first aid under the direction of the superintendent of a mine rescue station. Another Group of 20 scouts is learning fire-fighting methods from a local fireman. The Groups are working for their Ambulanceman and Fireman badges.
