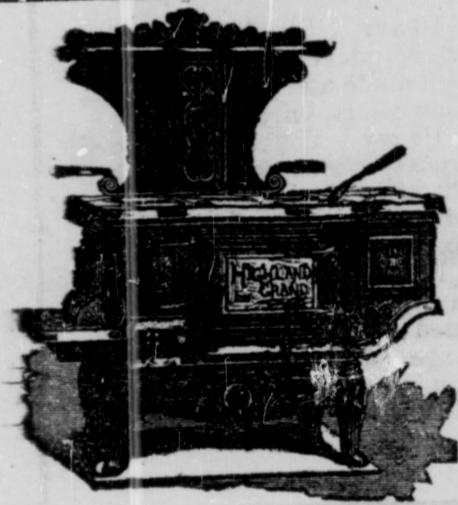

## DIFFICULTY OF PRONUNCIATION.

The difficulty of applying the rules  
to the pronunciation of our language  
may be illustrated in these two  
lines, where the combination of the  
letters o u g h is pronounced in no  
less than seven different ways, as:  
o, uff, off, up, ow, oo, and och:—

Through the tough cough and hic-  
cough plough me through,  
O'er life's dark lough my course I  
still pursue.

The difficulty of the same sound  
differently written is well illustrated  
by the following examples in prose  
and verse:

Having no way to weight to weigh  
the load, they had to await a weight  
scale, constructed not on the prin-  
ciple of the load stone, but of the  
balance, whereupon they found it  
weighed a wey, which was a long  
way from what they thought it  
would weigh. The seller, much dis-  
appointed in the weight, declined to  
wait longer, but, in nautical phrase-  
ology, weighed anchor, and went his  
way to dump his load in the cellar,  
while his oxen lowed as they turned  
homeward.

Write, we know, is written right,  
When we see it written right;  
But when we see it written wright,  
We know 'tis not then written right,  
Must not be written right or wright,  
Nor yet should it be written rite,  
But write—for so 'tis written right!

## TEMPER.

It has been said that "temper is  
three-fourths of human life"—certainly

temper: it sours the disposition of  
those who indulge in it, and destroys  
the possibility of peace and happi-

which the household lived in con-  
tinual fear.
