Bevan Opposed To Keeping British Troops In Europe

TREDEGAR, Wales, (AP) — Anurin Bevan, British Labor party left-wing leader, said Sunday night a "wave of dismay" will sweep Britain when the country realizes it is committed to keep an army of 120,000 men in Europe for the next 44 years.

Bevan told a political meeting here this is the effect of the concessions made by Foreign Secretary Eden at the recent London conference to sell France on the idea of West German rearmament. "The situation is pretty grim," said Bevan.

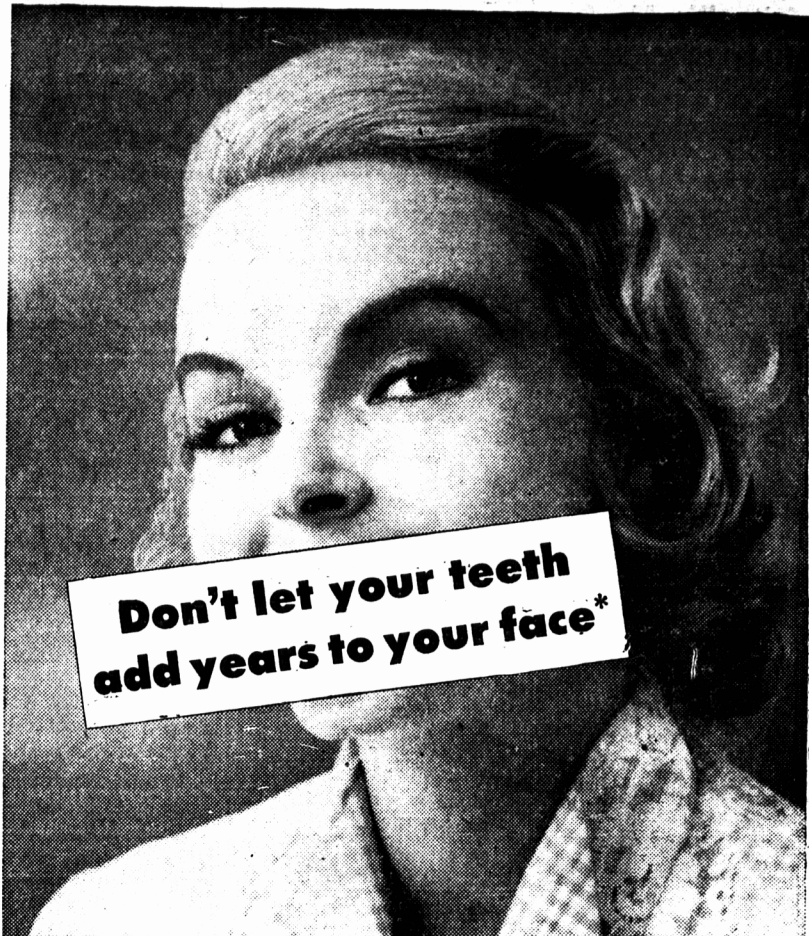

"But his laurels will look pretty tawdry in a few weeks' time, when the country has the opportunity to learn the consequences of what he had done—unless, of course, the wisdom of France prevents us from reaping the results."

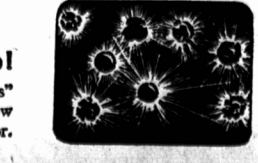
