Premier's Daughter Wins Acting Award

REGINA—(CP)—The ambition of 18-year-old Shirley Douglas, daughter of Premier T. G. Douglas of Saskatchewan, is to do her life work on the stage.

But diminutive Shirley has not hankering for the political stage. Ever since childhood she has wanted to be an actress.

Shirley, five feet two, weighing less than 100 pounds, took an important step in that direction recently when she won the "best actress" award in the Annual Saskatchewan Regional Drama Festival.

Her first part was at the age of five when she played an angel in a Sunday School Christmas pageant in Weyburn, Sask., where she was born.

Shirley's first lead was as a fairy in a school play, also at Weyburn. She was in Grade Two at that time.

Since then she has taken many parts in school plays, first at Weyburn and later in Regina when the family moved here.

Last summer she attended the Banff School of Fine Arts and took part in two Shakespearean dramas, "Midsummer's Night Dream" and "Comedy of Errors." She likes this type of role exceedingly well.

Her success in the Regional Drama Festival is made all the more remarkable by the fact this is her first year in the Regina Little Theatre. She won the award while playing only her second role in a Little Theatre production.

She played a 12-year old girl in "Tomorrow the World."

Adjudicator Pierre Lefevre said she "sustained her role with variety and was in character throughout."

Mr. Lefevre said he thought a 12-year old girl had been exceptionally well cast for the role and was amazed to find that it was taken by "a young lady of 18."

"Never for a moment did she step out of character," he said.

Shirley has also done extensive modelling in Regina fashion shows, taken on deliberately to help her pose in walking on stage.

Sales of Fluid Milk Increase

OTTAWA, Feb. 29—(CP)—Sales of fluid milk and cream were up in Canada last year compared with 1950, milk by two per cent and cream by one per cent.

The Bureau of Statistics, reporting estimates based on data from 80 markets, said today fluid milk sales in 1951 totalled 1,969,610,000 quarts. Cream sales amounted to 24,772,000 pounds.

There were increases in total fluid sales of milk and cream in all provinces except Manitoba and British Columbia. Sales in Ontario rose one per cent to 1,603,576,000 pounds; Quebec two per cent to 1,365,377,000; Alberta four per cent to 304,807,000; Saskatchewan two per cent to 183,425,000; Nova Scotia five per cent to 138,733,000; New Brunswick two per cent to 81,837,000 and Prince Edward Island two per cent to 22,674,000.

Total Manitoba sales dropped one per cent to 189,312,000 pounds and British Columbia dropped three per cent to 325,859,000.
