Canada's Newest Carrier Arrives Unseen In The Fog

HALIFAX (CP)—The new aircraft carrier Bonaventure, pride of the Canadian navy, docked at her home port for the first time Thursday, but fog fouled up plans for her Canadian welcome.

The muck was so thick in Halifax harbor nobody could see the 20,000-ton flat top until she was within yards of her dockyard jetty.

The 1,000 men aboard heard the welcome before they could see it; ships in port raised a whistle chorus through the fog.

The weather disrupted plans of Nova Scotia's Lieutenant-Governor Alistair Fraser to board the carrier from a helicopter at the harbor entrance.

He and Rear Admiral R. E. S. Bidwell, Atlantic coast naval commander, and Halifax Mayor Leonard Kitz finally reached the ship on a harbor launch. The governor inspected a guard of honor on the flight deck, and Tracer and Ban-shie aircraft and helicopters from Shearwater naval air station.

Historian Approves Habit Of Making Heroic Figures

WINNIPEG (CP)—The author of the biography of an early Canadian politician said Thursday that the instinct of Canadians to make national heroes of their early politicians "is essentially right."

Mr. Kilbourn said for more than 100 years no biography of Mackenzie was published in Canada because biographers were repelled by what they found.

Mackenzie was not a success, but a failure, he said. He did not fight for responsible government, he denounced it.

"He was not only a crank but he lived most of his life on the verge of outright madness, and more than once he crossed the border to madness," Mr. Kilbourn said.

Anticipates Conservative Sweep In Quebec In 1958

WINNIPEG (CP)—A party caucus of CCF members elected to Parliament in the June 10 federal election gets under way here today to plot future plans for its role in the new House of Commons.

CCF Leader Coldwell has said that since his party holds the balance of power in the Commons the Winnipeg meeting will be the most important CCF caucus in some time.

Two CCF MPs who declined to be identified, said Tuesday that, in their opinion, the Progressive Conservative government will not call another election this year.

They predicted a June, 1958, election for the next election and that the Progressive Conservative party will sweep Quebec in the next election with up to 60 seats because "Quebec will get on the band-wagon."

Mr. Coldwell said in Ottawa Monday that the party caucus will "talk over the results of the election" and generally get organized for the next Parliament.

He said the caucus will discuss campaign proposals by Prime Minister Diefenbaker.

Both the CCF and Conservatives have advocated higher old age and other pensions. The CCF have urged raising the old age pension to \$75 a month.

The CCF with its 25 members hold the balance of power in the 285-seat Commons. The Conservatives hold 109 seats to the Liberals' 105. Support from the 19-seat Social Credit block along, will not be enough to win an over-all majority in the commons.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

In the majority of suits, the players make use of either the Blackwood convention or ace-showing bids in side suits.

When these conventional bids or responses are made in a suit where there is obviously no intention to play the contract, the next player is given the opportunity to double the suit named if he wants that suit by partner against the final contract.

The double, in such cases, is purely a lead-directing bid. The double is not made merely because the player is confident he can beat the contract he doubles. It demands the lead of that suit from partner.

In a recent team of four tournaments, the East player cost his side 1830 points by doubling a Blackwood response instead of passing.

The bidding went as shown, with East doubling North's five diamond bid. Of course, he could defeat five diamonds, but his opponent naturally continued on in their best suit, spades.

West, in obedience to his partner's request for a diamond lead, opened his singleton ten. Declarer, with little effort, made twelve tricks to score the slam worth 1450 points.

The contract would have been defeated had West been left to his own devices in choosing an opening lead. His best hope to beat the slam would be to open the ace of hearts and count on giving partner a ruff. This hope would have materialized and, in would have been selected at the other table against the same contract.

The big swings in bridge usually revolve around slams. Such hands are entitled to the most exacting care by the defensive as well as the offensive side. East's thoughtless action, though apparently only a minor deviation, was severely punished.

Holding a singleton heart, he should do nothing to reduce the possibility that his partner may have the ace of hearts and lead it. Little could be gained by the double, but much could be lost.
