Safe in Jail—A Clever Capture.

John A. Power, Paul White, Allan Kennedy, and Daniel Kennedy are the names of four prisoners at present incarcerated in the Georgetown jail and awaiting trial in the Supreme Court. They are charged with shop breaking and theft at Souris, and were sent up by Frank H. White, Esq. J. P. after a rather sensational trial.

It seems that Mr. Amoswald Currie, a Souris merchant, found a lot of his goods missing one Monday morning. Broken matches were scattered over the floor and stuck in the cracks of the counter. A window over a back kitchen and leading to the second story of the building had been forced open and an entrance effected in that way. Ephraim McKenzie, another merchant, also found that his shop had been broken into and goods stolen. The case was placed in the hands of Mr. Arthur Mellish, who, after carefully examining the premises and marks made on the snow, and the nature of the goods stolen, considered that sufficient evidence existed on which to issue a search warrant for the premises occupied by John Kennedy. One was accordingly signed by John McLean, Esq. J. P., directed to Frank Conroy and James O'Hanley. On entering the building Mr. Conroy found a bed-tick he suspected might contain some goods, and although Mrs. Kennedy strongly protested that there was nothing there he ripped it open, finding a sleaze and a salt bag stuffed with scent, fiddle strings, studs, soap, tobacco, and a lot of other missing articles. He at once put Mrs. Kennedy under arrest and went for more help.

Returning, he met John Kennedy, whom he at once arrested. John Kennedy asked to be taken to Mr. Mellish to whom he gave information that led to the immediate issue of warrants for the apprehension of the prisoners now in goal. Bailiff Meade had in the meantime earned up and was pressed into service and bailiffs Currie and Campbell were telephoned for from Dundas. Bailiff Meade arrested Power at six o'clock. He also searched Powers premises under a search warrant from Frank H. White, Esq., and recovered a lot of goods hidden in a barn. Later he searched a Knight estate building and the premises of one Mooney. At the first, he discovered pants, socks, and a lot of other stuff hid under a stairway and hoarded up. The court sat about ten o'clock at night and the prisoners were remanded in charge of constables until the next day. Strict instructions were given not to allow the prisoners to communicate with each other. All spare constables were pressed into service and the constables still at large were systematically searched for. At midnight bailiff Meade captured Paul White, with a pair of stolen mitts on his hands and at 6:30 in the morning he was again successful in capturing the two Kennedys. The magistrate's orders were well obeyed and the prisoners were kept without a chance to speak or communicate with each other. John A. Power was tried first for breaking and entering Mr. Currie's shop and stealing goods therefrom. All witnesses were kept in the lobby out of hearing and the other four prisoners were put on the stand against him. The evidence was direct and was to the effect that he and Daniel Kennedy broke in on Currie's store on Saturday night and stole goods while White and the two Kennedys broke in again on Sunday night. The goods were all identified by Archd. Currie and Ephraim McKenzie. The next case was that of Ephraim McKenzie against Power. There was no evidence to connect White or the Kennedys with this case. The evidence was circumstantial; the shop had been broken into with a hatchet to judge from the marks. It was learned that Power had a hatchet with him Saturday night. There were certain goods found hid in Power's barn. These were identified by McKenzie as those stolen. The cases against the other prisoners were each in turn proved and they were sent up for trial. Mrs. Kennedy and John Kennedy were released as they did not seem to be actual participants in the robbery. The magistrate and bailiffs received a great deal of praise for the thorough manner in which the case was sifted out. The prisoners left for jail in the midst of a blinding snow storm and had to stay all night at Dundas. As the sleighs passed through Souris the prisoners caused considerable merriment by playing "Some Day We'll Come Wandering Back Again" on mouth organs.

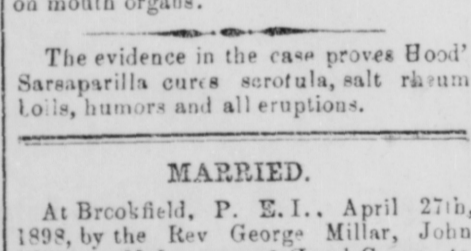
