

Committee to prepare and bring in a Bill, pursuant to the Second of the above reported Resolutions. Then the House adjourned.

FRIDAY, January 28th.

This day at half-past twelve o'clock, the Legislative Council waited upon the Lieutenant Governor, with their Address, which we subjoin, together with His Excellency's reply.

To His Excellency Sir HENRY VERE HUNTLEY, Knight, Lieutenant Governor, &c. &c.

May it please your Excellency; We the Members of Her Majesty's Legislative Council, in General Assembly convened, request that your Excellency will be pleased to accept our thanks for the Speech delivered by you, at the opening of the present Session of the General Assembly.

We heartily coincide with your Excellency in your congratulations upon the birth of a Prince—heir apparent to the British Throne—and also upon the perfect restoration of Her Gracious Majesty to health—events which not only fill all hearts with joy, but also call forth, throughout every portion of Her Majesty's dominions, sentiments of profound thankfulness to the Almighty, and feelings of the warmest and most devoted loyalty to Her Majesty's Sacred Person, and attachment to Her Royal offspring.

We fully concur with your Excellency upon the important influence which education and instruction have upon society, and that they should be widely disseminated among the younger portion of the inhabitants of this Colony. We beg to assure your Excellency that this all important question shall ever receive our fullest consideration; and we further assure your Excellency, that we shall carefully examine and inquire into the system by which the Central Academy is governed, and that we will readily unite in giving our support to such a measure as may be best calculated to give that Institution that exalted position which would render it permanently useful.

Your Excellency may rely on our best attention being given to the replies that have been received from Her Majesty's Address passed during the last Session, and also to such other matters as your Excellency may be pleased to lay before us by Message.

We feel that your Excellency is sincere, when you express your desire for the prosperity of this Island; and we beg to assure your Excellency that our best and most earnest attention shall be bestowed on every measure that may be conducive to the general welfare and prosperity of this Colony.

[His Excellency's Reply.]

Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council;

I receive your address with the sincerest thankfulness. The sentiments expressed by you upon the blessings lately granted by Almighty God to the nation, are well calculated to prove how deeply they are appreciated in this Island, foremost in loyalty to Her Majesty our beloved Sovereign.

I thank you for the assurances of your examination into the state of Education generally, and that also of the Central Academy, with other matters as they may be submitted; the Colony has much to hope in this exercise of your talent and care.

At One o'clock the House of Assembly presented their Address, to which His Excellency delivered the following reply:—

Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly; I receive your Address with deep gratification. The language in which you have expressed your thankfulness for the blessings so recently vouchsafed to the Nation by the Almighty, and that which conveys your feelings towards our beloved Sovereign, well becomes the representatives of the People of this loyal Colony.

I thank you for the cordial manner in which you have entertained the several subjects submitted to your consideration by me; it is by calm investigation and unanimity, that the prosperity of this Island (our mutual first desire) will, under Providence, be ensured.

In the House of Assembly, Mr. Thomson moved, that the House will, to-morrow, in Committee of the whole, take into consideration the expediency of issuing a copper currency for this Island—Agreed to.

Mr. Maclean moved, that a Message be sent to the Lieut. Governor, to ascertain if any contract has been entered into for the erection of a Light House on Point Prim, and for any other information relative thereto—Motion agreed to, and a Committee appointed.

The Bill to confirm and render valid the proceedings of the Executive Government during the administration of the Hon. George Wright, was read a third time and passed.

A Bill to further amend the Road Compensation Act, was read a second time, and committed. The intention of the Bill is to enable any two Road Commissioners, not being parties interested, to determine the amount of compensation to be paid to parties through whose cultivated land roads of small extent may be run, instead of incurring the expense of a Jury, in every instance, as at present.

A public Meeting was held at Park Corner, New London, on the 4th inst., for the purpose of organizing an Auxiliary Agricultural Association, in that district. J. C. Sims, Esq., was called to preside during the preliminary proceedings, and it was resolved, that the Office-bearers for the current year be as follows:

CORONER'S INQUEST.—An Inquest was held, on Tuesday last, before Daniel Hodgson, Esq. Coroner, on view of the body of Martin Macdiarmid, a Private in the detachment of the 64th Regt., stationed in this garrison, when a verdict of Manslaughter, under very aggravated circumstances, was returned against John Dornon, also a Private in the same detachment. It appears that Dornon and the deceased—who up to that time, had been on terms of the greatest intimacy—quarrelled—blows followed—and the prisoner, who was intoxicated, received rather a rough handling from his antagonist. They were, however, ultimately separated by their comrades, and got to their beds. In a few minutes afterwards Macdiarmid and Dornon again left their beds, and the prisoner, seizing a sleigh-stake which he found in the room, struck the deceased a blow across the head, which fractured the unfortunate man's skull and caused his death.
