P. W. C. Teacher Returns From Trip To Europe

Mr. Edward J. Laughlin, B.Sc., of Sherbrooke arrived home on Friday after completing an interesting two months tour of Europe. Mr. Laughlin is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Edward Laughlin of Sherbrooke and has been on the staff of Prince of Wales College for several years. The highlight of the trip, which commenced early in August when he sailed from Montreal, was the visit to Rome and his audience with the Pope. Mr. Laughlin was accompanied but travelled with a group from various parts of Canada and the United States. He was fortunate in obtaining a private audience with the Holy Father at which only a few others were present. During the Holy Year the Pope gives regular audiences in St. Peter's where thousands attend. In fact the previous day over 160,000 people crowded into St. Peter's Square for a public audience. There were about 70,000 in the cathedral itself. Thus it was quite a privilege to obtain a private audience. Mr. Laughlin said it is difficult to explain the thrill that is felt by people of all faiths in the presence of this saintly man. Mr. Laughlin had the additional and unusual privilege of being in a group that was photographed with the Holy Father in the centre. Mr. Laughlin arrived in Cherbourg, France, and travelled along west and south France by bus. All travelling in Europe was done by bus with the exception of the return from Paris to Cherbourg by train and the flight from Paris to London. He visited the world famous shrine at Lourdes and crossed the Pyrenees Mountains to the border of Spain. He visited the huge castle of Henry IV at Pau in Southern France. Near Toulouse is a very remarkable stone bridge called "Le Gard" built by the Romans about 58 B.C. It is a three storey structure about 200 feet high. The upper storey was used to allow water from the top of the mountains to pass over to the city of Nimes. The bridge is used now as part of the highway and was built with stone upon stone without any mortar whatever. Each stone weighs several tons. He passed over the Alps into Italy and saw evidence of much war damage in Genoa and Pisa. The drive along the French and Italian Riviera was very beautiful. In Pisa he climbed the famous leaning tower and as he approached the top his thoughts turned to Galileo and his experiments in physics. He is wondering still how the tower escaped destruction during the war as several blocks were levelled nearby. One of the most interesting places visited was Venice where the streets are waterways and he had the pleasant experience of sailing around in a gondola in the evening. Lights and songs from many happy groups can be heard over the water. Florence is a beautiful city also. The roads in Italy are superior to those in France. Hundreds of signs for advertising adorn the highways. The design resembles very much that of Canada and the United States showing, of course, the Canadian and American influence since the war. There is very little war damage in Northern Italy. He left Milan, the leading industrial city of Italy, with the thermometer hovering around 90 degrees. Less than twenty four hours later he was looking at snow in the Alps of Switzerland. Switzerland is a prosperous little country but prices for most articles are very high. He saw the League of

Kingston United Baptist Church Thanksgiving Service

The Thanksgiving service at the United Baptist Church at Kingston on Sunday evening was a special interest, as it was also the occasion of using the new electric system of lighting for the first time. The church, which has recently been renovated was tastefully decorated with autumn flowers and presented an attractive appearance. The auditorium was well-filled before the hour of opening the services with worshippers from the immediate and adjacent communities. The choir, led by Mrs. Everett Holmes, organist, was assisted by singers from neighboring churches, including Charlottetown and North River. Rev. H. Barber the pastor of the church conducted the service. Promptly at 7:30 the service opened with the Doxology and Invocation. After the first-hymn a brief service of dedication of the new electric lighting system took place. The old system of lighting was used for the last time at the opening service. Candles and oil lamps were lit in addition to the gasoline lamps in use, to illustrate the progress of artificial lighting through the years, system which are now giving way to electricity. At the appropriate moment all the old lights were extinguished and the new lights turned on. The audience rose as the pastor in a few words dedicated the lights to the glory of God and the service of the church and congregation in this community. The dedication service closed with a brief prayer by the pastor with the

audience standing. The service was enriched by special music, vocal and instrumental. Mrs. Leigh Warren of Charlottetown sang a solo in her usual good form. Roland Ward gave both a violin solo and a vocal solo which were well received. Mrs. Andrew MacEachern and Mrs. Lawrence Molyneux of North River rendered impressively a duet. The Thanksgiving Sermon was given by the pastor. This interesting service was both helpful and inspiring. The interior of the church reflects great credit on the members and congregation of the Kingston Baptist Church, along with their friends of neighboring churches of other denominations for the work that has been accomplished. More remains to be done until payment is completed, and we know that the spirit of generous cooperation will be sustained until all obligations have been fully met.
