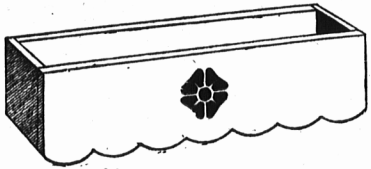

Cst. and Mrs. John E. Nightingale are spending their annual leave with the former's parents at Brantford, Ontario.

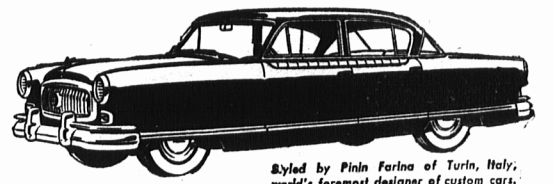
