### Parnell Commission.

SIR HENRY JAMES CONCLUDES HIS ADDRESS IN BEHALF OF THE "TIMES."

At the Parnell commission all the counsel for the London Times were present. Sir Henry James continued his speech for the Times. He said Parnell paid Redmond \$170, and promised Redmond would be called to explain why the payment was made, but he said Redmond never had been called to explain why the payment was made. Sir Henry attempted to show how the Clan-na-Gael became paramount in the body which represented the Irish-American movement and controlled and directed its operations. He emphasized the fact that Parnell did not denounce the use of dynamite, and quoted from an article in the Irishman praising Parnell for the stand he had taken. He admitted Parnell was probably unaware of the appearance of the article, but contended that the Irishman, which was Parnell's property, was enabled to proclaim the policy of Parnell and the course he was pursuing. Sullivan and Ford, Sir Henry declared, openly preached assassination in connection with the Clan-na-Gael. The Irishman said Parnell's scheme regarding the agitation in America was the best proof of his statesmanship and sagacity. Sir Henry concluded his speech at 3.30.

Presiding Justice Hanford said the court would not call for any further evidence. He congratulated the counsel on the completion of their tasks.
