

Rainbow Clegg Highlights Card With Double Victory

What a racing program! Charlotte's Old Home Week racing programs got underway in fine style last evening with only one double dash winner on the eight dash card.

Rainbow Clegg, an Island bred bay gelding, sired by Abner T. Clegg, won both dashes of the first division free-for-all, equaling his own record of 2:07 on his first time out and dusting the oval in 2:07.1 in the final dash of the evening. Rainbow Clegg is owned by D. Pikney of Pughwash, N.S.

Sir Joseph and Royal Onyx, both Charlottetown owned horses, shared in the second division free-for-all. Sir Joseph took the first dash of this event in 2:08.4, and Royal Onyx owned and driven by James 'Roach' MacGregor, captured the second dash in 2:08.2, a new record for the 5-year-old bay gelding. His old record was 2:10.4.

The largest crowd of the season jammed the stands and the grounds to see this exciting race card.

Morley's Pride, a three-year-old bay gelding, also took a new mark in the three-year-old race, the first dash of the evening. The gelding, owned by J. Anear, Montague, toured the oval in 2:15.3 on his first time out. Canadair, in the second dash on the card, equalled his record of 2:14.2.

Other winners of the card were Vesta Wick and Leah's Girl.

The first daily double on a combination ticket of Canadair and Sir Joseph returned lucky betters \$88.00 and the second daily double paid \$17.80. The quinella in the fourth dash paid \$19.10 and the exactor in the fifth paid \$55.

Morley's Pride paid \$31.50 to win and \$15.50 to place in the first dash of the night.

In the third dash a win ticket on Sir Joseph returned \$27.40 and a place ticket on Royal Onyx paid \$23.40. A win ticket on Leah's Girl in the sixth dash paid \$18.50.

3rd Playoff Spot In WIFU Is Subject Of Speculation

Attention is focused on third place in the Western Interprovincial 'Football Union, with the opening game of the 1959 season Thursday night in Vancouver.

The top rungs are expected to be occupied by Winnipeg Blue Bombers, 1958 Grey Cup champions, and Edmonton Eskimos, who finished second last season.

There hasn't been too much talk about the Eskis upsetting the Bombers, who are stronger this year if anything.

But third place—the last playoff berth—is the subject of plenty of speculation.

TOUGH FIRST STEP
British Columbia Lions, who haven't made the playoffs in their five seasons in the WIFU, take their first step and a tough one Thursday against Winnipeg.

Calgary Stampede and Saskatchewan Roughriders, the other playoff hopefuls, meet Friday in Regina in the second game of the season.

The schedule is in full swing next Monday, with the Eskis host to the Lions and the Stamps going to Winnipeg.

Calgary was blown out of third place by Saskatchewan last year after a fast start, B.C., losing the first 10 games, finished a poor last.

Lions are determined to do better in 1959, though rookie coach Wayne Robinson isn't promising much right away.

ACE PIVOT MAN
The club pins its hopes on quarterback Randy Duncan, a highly-rated 21-year-old from Iowa, halfback Willie Fleming, also from Iowa, a more experienced line and the results of last season, all are returning.

Rookie coach Eagle Keys, with 21 imports in camp, has tough choices to make at tackle and half. The four offensive halfbacks in camp all have shown ability.

Winnipeg, under coach Bud Grant, has done the least reorganizing and essentially the same team that caused the other WIFU clubs to rework will face them again. Quarterbacks Jim Van Pelt and Kenny Ploen, backs Leo Lewis, Charlie Shepard and John Varone, Canadian stars Ron Latourelle and Gerry James, out with a broken leg most of last season, all are returning.

Giants Edge Cardinals 3-2; Yankees Defeat Red Sox

ST. LOUIS (AP) — San Francisco Giants, blanked by Larry Jackson for eight innings, staged one of their famous ninth inning rallies Monday night, a three-run explosion for a 3-2 victory over St. Louis Cardinals.

Successive singles by pinch batter Leon Wagner and Jim Davenport and Willie May's run-scoring single routed Jackson. Rookie Willie McCovey grounded to second but Davenport beat the throw for the tying run.

Willie Kirkland then clouted a two-out double of the rightfield screen, scoring Mays with the winning run.

Little Stu Miller (5-6) was the winning pitcher in relief of starter Sad Sam Jones. Jackson, now 9-11, seemed headed for his second shutout when the roof fell in. Dean Stone pitched to McCovey and Ernie Broglio faced the last three batters in the ninth but Jackson put all three runs on base and was the loser.

BOSTON (AP) — Aroused New York battled to a tie in the ninth inning, then defeated Boston 7-4 in the 10th Monday night on successive singles by Yogi Berra,

Elston Howard and Hector Lopez. Southpaw Whitley Ford, fourth New York pitcher, and the winner, nipped rallies in each of the last two frames with the aid of a pair of swift double plays. The Red Sox had two runners aboard when Ford retired Gary Geiger on a grounder to end the contest playing before 32,004.

Loser Al Schroll lost his control in the top of the 10th, walking Yankees Tony Kubek and Mickey Mantle with none out. The three singles followed and New York had completed a remarkable comeback.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Outfielder Bob Bowman turned pitcher Monday night as Philadelphia Phillies beat Washington Senators, 3-1 in the 12th annual Philadelphia Junior Baseball Federation exhibition game.

A crowd of 21,762 saw the strong-armed righthander take over for winning pitcher Ray Semproch in the seventh inning. He gave up one run and three singles during his three inning stint. He struck out four.

The Phillies scored their three runs off Washington starter and loser Hal Woodeshick.

THIS AFTERNOON Mighty Lee tries his speed at the local raceway. The big roan gelding holds the record of 2:08.4 which he established on July 30 of this year. He's got a big task on his flying feet this afternoon but there are many who insist that he will grab another new mark today.

Mighty Lee will have two chances this afternoon to lower both the track record and his own record. He will go two exhibition miles and the large gallery will be pulling for the big fellow to lower the boom.

He'll be seen again Friday when a free-for-all is staged with the top horses from the junior free-for-alls giving him battle. We like his chances better when he's in competition but he may like the rail all by himself today.

Time alone will tell.

Yvon Durelle Complains Over Return Match Pact

MONTREAL (CP)—Yvon Durelle Monday threatened not to sign a contract for a return bout with light-heavyweight champion Archie Moore unless it guarantees him more money should he win the crown in their battle Wednesday.

"The return bout contract calls for each of us to get 30 per cent," Durelle said after finishing a light workout in the gym where both he and Moore are training.

"That's not enough for me. I haven't anything to show for 14 years of boxing. If I should win I want to get at least \$100,000 for a title defence."

ban, not present when the Baie Ste. Anne, N.B. challenger made his complaints, said later "there's no doubt we'll have to sign. After all, Moore is the champion and we are after the title."

Durelle, obviously keyed up for Wednesday's night fight, was adamant. "The return bout contract is in my room," he said, "and I'm not going to sign it. They can throw it out the window. If my manager signs it, and I win, then let my manager fight the return bout."

Durelle also complained about the terms for the Wednesday fight for which he has been guaranteed \$15,000 or 20 per cent of the gross receipts, including television rights. Moore has been guaranteed \$175,000 or 40 per cent.

For their battle last December, when Durelle had Moore on the deck four times before being knocked out himself in the 11th round, the challenger got \$20,000 and the champion \$75,000.

Both were kept indoors Monday by the intermittent rain, the first in the area for nearly a month. Each did a little skipping and a couple rounds with the bag.

Both fighters said they want the lighter gloves, used in championship bouts in the United States. Commission rules here provide for eight-ouncers.

"We've had no official request from anyone," a commission official said. "If they want a ruling they should let us know."
