LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS

ST. PETER'S SCHOOL.—St. Peter's School reopens Sept. 7th. Fees for girls \$15 per annum; boys \$24 per annum. The schools have been enlarged and remodelled. For further particulars apply to the Rev. James Simpson. 200—td.

FIRE.—A fire occurred yesterday in one of the bedrooms of the Campbell Hotel, Summerside, which caused considerable damage to the furniture therein. The fire is supposed to have been caused by some matches left on a bureau becoming ignited by the heat of the sun coming through the window.

MEETING OF PRESBYTERY.—The Presbytery of this province met in Zion Church yesterday. The resignation of Rev. J. F. McCurdy was accepted, his pastorate to terminate at the end of October. The call from Maitland, N. S., to Rev. S. J. McArthur was accepted by that gentleman, and the Presbytery agreed to grant the translation. Standing Committees were then appointed, after which the Presbytery adjourned to meet at the Synod.

EXCURSION PARTY.—The Brooklyn Eagle excursion party touring Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, will leave St. John for home via Boston on Friday morning in one of the International Line's steamers. Each day the party sends to the Eagle an account of the day's outing. They also publish a daily paper called "The Cheerful Lyre." The number of the "Cheerful Lyre" for Sunday last, which day the party passed in Halifax, is before us. It is the first Sunday paper ever published in Halifax, and its contents are very interesting.

COAL IN NEWFOUNDLAND.—According to a recent despatch from St. John's, there is a great boom in Newfoundland owing to the recent discoveries of coal on the west coast. The deposits are very extensive and the seams vary in width from 6 to 13 feet. The quality of the products is believed to be equal to the best Welsh steam coal. Experts pronounce the prospect excellent. Sixty thousand tons are already visible, and it is expected that coal mining will become one of the most promising resources of the island.

A NEW KIND OF WHEAT.—A recent visitor to the Indian village at Church Point noticed a patch of wheat in Peter Ginnish's garden, and said to the owner, "Why, you raise wheat." "Let me tell you about that wheat," replied Mr. Ginnish. "Me killum bird and find inside few grain o' wheat. Spossum bird come froia south. Wheat look good. Next spring me plantum and ketch little more. This spring me plantum all of it, and now come dis patch. You savvy altogether new kind o' wheat." Mr. Ginnish should send a specimen to the Agricultural Bureau at Ottawa to be tested on the experimental farms. It may be that Ginnish's Bird-of-Passage or Shot-on-the-Wing wheat will be the favorite variety in a year or two.—Chatham World.

McLeod, on Wednesday, the 15th day of September, under the auspices and in connection with the meeting of Pownal District Lodge No. 3, I. O. G. T. McDonald. For many years Mr. McDonald had been foremost in all undertakings which were calculated to promote the moral and material welfare of the community in which he lived, and his demise will be regretted by all who had the privilege of his acquaintance. His funeral takes place tomorrow at St. Andrew's where a pontifical mass will be celebrated by the Bishop of Charlottetown. His remains will be interred in the family plot of his native parish. May his soul rest in peace.
