

A Mans Heart Discovered on His Right Side.

The Rochester (New York) Express says:—An autopsy on the body of George Vail, of Whitby, Ont., was held by Drs. Seely, Whitcombe, and Stone yesterday, which is of interest to the medical profession at least. Mr. Vail had been under treatment for abscess of the right lung for some months. Dr. Stone noticed, upon the first examination when the patient came for treatment, that there was what is technically called juxtaposition of the heart, which is a very rare condition. He had called the attention of a score or more of people to it, and was gratified at the autopsy to have his diagnosis confirmed, the heart being found on the right side of the body instead of on the left. The human heart ordinarily is situated as follows:—The base is attached to the spinal column just back of the upper portion of the breast bone. It takes a direction downward, forward, and a little to the left, the apex or point striking the walls of the chest near the left nipple. In the case of Mr. Vail the heart occupied the same position on the right side of the body.
