HALIFAX MARKETS—CUSTOMS REVENUE, ETC.

Since last report three West Indianmen have arrived with 190 puns, and 6 hhd. molasses, 75 hhd. and 120 bbl. sugar. The exports to the West Indies have been 433 bbl. mackerel, 724 bbl. herring, 3,456 bbl. potatoes, 756 quintals, 1,122, tierces, 700 drums, 340 casks, 285 boxes and 396 half-boxes of dry fish. The receipts at this port were 15,785 quintals. The West Indian market for dry fish is bad and advices warn against shipments. Mackerel receipts for the week were 1,355 bbl. and shipments 2,051 bbl., chiefly to the New York market. All the stocks of small mackerel are cleared off, and quotations do not govern any but small lots remaining. Compared with Oct., 1878, there has been an increase of \$17,176 in the Customs receipts at this port for Oct. During the months of July, Aug., Sept. and Oct. the Inland Revenue receipts have increased \$46,726 compared with corresponding period last year.

MONTREAL PROVISION MARKETS.

Butter.—Demand continues good; prices have advanced about 2c; holders are now wanting outside quotations, which are rather above buyers' views. Cheese market steady at 12c to 13c, according to make. Ingersoll advices on Tuesday reported offerings of 8,500 boxes September and October make; no sales; buyers offer 12c, 12½c asked. Pork firmer at \$14.50 to 15.50 for New Mess. Lard: Chicago pails scarce; nominally firmer; Canada pails, 10c to 10½c.

COTTON AND WOOLLEN MANUFACTURES.

The vote for the establishment of a cotton factory at Farnham, Que., offering a bonus of \$25,000 therefor, was taken in that place on Tuesday, and carried by a majority of 80—98 being for and 18 against the by-law. The rate-payers of St. Johns, Que., are seriously considering the advisability of establishing a woollen or other manufactory there. At a meeting of citizens held last Tuesday, the Mayor of the town said that a large manufacturer and capitalist was willing to start a factory of some kind in that place, provided the people voted him a bonus of \$20,000 to \$25,000. His Worship was requested to call another meeting of ratepayers to consider the matter.

ADVANCE IN THE PRICE OF RUBBER GOODS.

At a meeting of the representatives of the principal rubber manufacturing companies, held on the 1st inst., at the office of N. Southwick & Son, New York, it was unanimously resolved to advance the prices of all kinds of rubber boots and shoes 20 per cent over those hitherto prevailing.

RAILWAY NOTES.

The Montreal Witness says: The freight traffic on the Grand Trunk is the heaviest known for years. In spite of the immense rolling stock, great difficulty exists in obtaining cars to accommodate shippers.

The Grand Trunk Railway have received from England per steamship "Quebec," 150 steel-tired 42 inch wheels for passenger service. These wheels are gradually replacing the old 36 inch chilled iron wheels, as they last longer and are more economical in mileage.

BEET SUGAR REFINERY.

The Windsor, N. S., Mail says:—The State of Maine Sugar Beet Refinery has offered to invest capital to the amount of \$400,000 in erecting a refinery in Nova Scotia, provided that the Counties of Annapolis, Kings, Hants and Colchester will guarantee each to put under cultivation 1000 acres of land to raise sugar beets. The order of Grangers have the movement in hand.

CATTLE FOR ENGLAND.

Says a Quebec despatch of last evening: 239 head of cattle and 286 sheep will go to England per S. S. "Scandinavian."

OATS AND BARLEY IN MONTREAL.

Oats have, in Montreal, sold at 32 cents. Malting barley is quoted at 60 to 70 cents.

IMPROVEMENT IN VESSEL PROSPECTS.

The Annapolis Journal says: "We are informed that one of our Nova Scotia spruce ships has just been chartered to load grain at San Francisco at 80s. per qtr. Two such freights as this would pay for a ship at present cost of building." And again: "We are glad to learn by our English and Scotch Freight Circulars that there is a good prospect for return freights of coal, iron, etc. for our Nova Scotia vessels. Already from 12s. to 15s. per ton for pig iron and rails are offered to the United States North Atlantic ports, with a fair prospect of higher rates. This looks like old times when our vessels used to make their freights out and home, while during the past three three years ships have had to return in ballast."

TEA.

The advance in the price of tea in England has been most extraordinary. From the lowest point it has advanced 5d. stg. per lb., or 11½ cts. per lb. here on ordinary grades of congo.

ONIONS ADVANCED.

We understand that onions have bounced upwards in the States, being now held at 50 cents per bbl. higher than they were three or four days ago. The stock in the city is not large.

A SUCCESSFUL CATTLE SHIPMENT.

The SS. Corinthian, from Quebec on the 13th ult., landed at Glasgow on the 24th Oct., 56 head cattle, 17 horses, and 300 sheep, save two sheep, which died on the passage.

PORT OF MONTREAL.

The arrivals of ocean-going vessels at the port of Montreal up to Monday last, number 435, the departure numbering 497. For the same date last year the arrivals footed up to 473, and the departures 435, which shows this season an increase of 62 arrivals and 60 departures.

GREAT SALE OF MACKEREL.

We find the following in the Yarmouth, N. S. Herald: "One hundred and five barrels of the largest and fattest mackerel ever brought into Gloucester were caught off Thatcher's Island a few days ago. It took only eighty of them to fill a barrel, and they brought at wholesale \$40 per bbl., the highest price ever obtained in Boston."

GOLD FOR NEW YORK.

A New York despatch says: The steamship "City of Brussels" brought \$200,000, and the "Weser" brought \$950,000 in British bars and American gold coin.
