#### Where is the Prosecutor?

SIR.—Liquor is being freely dispensed at Victoria as usual, and the prosecutor, Henderson, has not put in an appearance here since last summer. If the Scott Act is not in force in Charlottetown, there is no reason why it should not be put in force in the country. If the government is paying those officials, we claim that they should do their duty and not allow the country to be flooded with liquor, and we hope that the prosecutor will pay a visit to Victoria and see the way the Scott Act is being violated.

Where is our Temperance Lodge that they allow the illicit sale of liquors to be freely dispensed at the Ledge Room? It seems to me that they only convene for the sake of meeting together—not that they have the temperance principles inculcated in them, or for the sake of doing good for their fellow beings.

I advise our young men and women to wake up to a sense of duty and stamp out this iniquitous traffic, which is causing degradation and ruin to thousands of our fellow countrymen. Let us stand shoulder to shoulder in the great battle of temperance, and let no influence be brought that will induce us to give up the standard of doing good, not only for ourselves but for the good of the community in which we live.

#### Crops in the States.

The Breeder's Gazette, (June 17) says: "Speaking generally, a very material improvement in the crop situation has to be noted since our last. Kansas has begun harvesting the greatest wheat crop in her history. The rains of last week and the higher range of temperature being experienced at this writing throughout the corn belt have given the great forage crop of the West an excellent start. Wisconsin was still quite dry at last accounts, but from nearly all other leading agricultural states come cheering reports."

BREACH OF PROMISE.—At the recent sitting of the supreme court at Sydney, Mary Ann McAuley sued Angus McDonald for \$1,000 damages for breach of promise, and got a verdict for \$100. Angus was 65 and Mary Ann only 32 years of age.

COTTON MILL ENLARGEMENT.—The alarmists who predicted about election time, that the new management would close the Moncton Cotton Mill, made a great mistake. Under the management the works have been running steadily under vigorous management, and about \$12,000 worth of additional machinery, some of it from Upper Canada mills, has been set to work. The Moncton mill is now turning out very superior goods and the new owners are evidently well pleased with the facilities for manufacturing here.—Times.

### The Magdalen Islanders.

TERRIBLE SUFFERING OF THE INHABITANTS FROM STARVATION AND DISEASE.

The condition of the unfortunate people of the Magdalen Islands rapidly grows more intolerable, as will be seen by the following touching signaligram from Mgr. Bosse, Vicar Apostolic of Labrador, published in the Montreal papers on Saturday:—

ESQUIMAUX POINT, Magdalen Island, June 19.—A awful calamity here. All inhabitants suffering with death and twelve in danger in the village now, and majority of those people afflicted, all having two or three relapses; no doctors; remedies exhausted. Assistance of every kind needed. My household stricken also. People depressed, but glad to learn the government are sending doctors and aid; ascertain immediately officially when doctors leave Quebec. Very anxious awaiting answer.

The appeal is made more pathetic by news received at noon of the same day that his lordship had been stricken, and that 24 hours after inditing the above call for help for his dying people his own life was despaired of.

#### News Notes.

The British Parliament will be prorogued on August 6.

The Prussian Minister of Public Works maintains that Koch's lymph has scientific value, and is sanguine of its therapeutic qualities.

The Brazilian Government has issued a decree directing that in the collection of customs duties the rate of exchange is fixed at 20 cents on the dollar.

The North American Commercial Company has filed a protest with the United States treasury department against the arrangement limiting the catch of seal's recently entered into with Great Britain.

Henry C. Fanning, the engineer who was found guilty of the murder of his mistress, Emily Taylor, by cutting her throat in the streets of New York, has been sentenced to be electrocuted during the week of July 27.

The department of State at Washington has been notified that the British Government has appointed Sir George Baden-Powell and W. Dawson agents for that Government to visit Alaska and collect information respecting the seal fisheries; the statement coming from London that these men were appointed arbiters is erroneous. Negotiations looking to arbitration of the claims by the United States to the jurisdiction over Bering Sea have not yet progressed to a point that would permit of the appointment of arbiters; in fact, the nature of the arbitration itself is not agreed upon.

#### Personal.

Mr. Frank Slavin, the celebrated Australian fistic artist, made a speech in New York a few nights ago. He intimated that if Mr. John L. Sullivan would go to Australia to fight, the Antipodeans would receive him "like a lion."

At an audience given by his Holiness the Pope on the 17th May last to Cardinal Jacobini, Archbishop of Lyons and Secretary of the Sacred Congregation of the Propaganda, Mr. Richard F. Quigley, LL. B., barrister of St. John City, was created a Doctor of Philosophy. On Sunday, 21st inst, the feast of St. Aloysius, he made his profession of faith before His Lordship Bishop Sweeney.

CANNED BEEF DID IT.—Joseph Gallant and Philip Arsenault of Shediac, were poisoned at that place on Saturday, by eating some canned beef which had been open about two days and allowed to remain in the tin. Shortly after eating, the men suffered intense pain and became purple and swollen. Dr. Legere saved the lives of the men with difficulty.
