OTTAWA, (OP) — The Labor Department said Thursday it is "too early" to forecast possible government moves to avert the threatened Canadian shipping strike.

The department said neither the Seafarers' International Union nor the shipping companies have replied as yet to a letter asking whether they accept or reject the findings of an arbitration board.

The spokesman added that if the report is officially rejected by the union or the companies the department "would almost certainly" take action in an attempt to prevent a strike. However, he said, "it is too early to say what's going to happen in the future."

No immediate effect. A nationwide shipping strike would not affect movement of Canadian grain unless it were prolonged or spread immediately to longshoremen and other waterfront workers, an official of the transport controller's office said.

The official said that Eastern elevators which receive the bulk of their grain by lake ship are plugged at present due to lack of export sales.

The other two export outlets, the west coast and Churchill, receive their grain supplies by rail, and the majority of boats which load at the two points are foreign.

Vote Next Week. Orders for a strike vote have gone out to 6,500 members of the Seafarers' International Union which wants a 40-hour week for Canadian seamen.

The order for the coast-to-coast vote to start at 11 a.m. next Monday followed the union's rejection Wednesday night of conciliation board reports on its disagreement with four companies operating some 300 inland and deep-sea ships.

The results of the vote will be known late next week.

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Faster Weather Information For Canadian Air Stations

MONTREAL, Aug. 27—High ranking RCAF and Department of Transport officers will inaugurate the world's first fully automatic facsimile weather chart transmission service at Dorval airport tomorrow afternoon at 3 p. m. E.D. T.

Air Marshal C. R. Slemmon, C.B.E., C.D., will press the button that will start recording machines from coast to coast. Hon. Lionel Chevrier, Minister of Transport will place the first chart on the transmitting drum.

The "Weatherfax" system is designed to provide faster, more economical means of getting weather information to air force stations. With a master chart transmitted over the network showing the weather picture from the Aleutians to Iceland, meteorologists at the air force stations will be freed of much of their present map making and devote more time to an intensive study of conditions over the operating area.

Key stations in the network, the central analysis bureau at Dorval, will transmit the master chart four times daily to the entire network. Regional forecast officers at Vancouver, Edmonton, Winnipeg, Toronto, Montreal and Moncton will, in turn, transmit area charts to air force stations in their territories.

Series of Charts. The national transmission consists of a series of charts that plot the weather in the form of pressure patterns and fronts for altitudes all the way from sea level to 50,000 feet. They also indicate such information as temperature, wind velocity and direction, precipitation and dew point.

The high altitude plot is valuable to jet-powered military aircraft although the Department of Transport sees future advantage in the facsimile service for commercial airlines. At present, sufficient machines are available for only a limited national network.

By the end of November all forecast centres and flying stations will be supplied with Muirhead equipment of British design and manufacture.

Light and Compact. Comparatively light and compact, the equipment used can be set up quickly. The recorder, for instance, is a unit less than two feet square. In the transmitter an electric exit scans the weather chart creating a fluctuating current that is passed through electro sensitive paper in the recording machines throughout the network. The current sets up a chemical reaction which stains the paper.

Both transmitting and recording machines have rotating drums moving at exactly the same speed. Thus what the scanning eye picks up on the other, it takes 35 minutes to transmit a 22 by 18 inch chart. Recording is done on a continuous recording roll. To interconnect the various forecast offices and air force stations across Canada, Canadian National and Canadian Pacific Telegraphs, owners of the facsimile equipment, have set up 5,000 miles of specially designed telephone circuits over which the recorders and transmitters will operate.

"Code Two," new M-G-M offering at the Capitol Theatre, Summerside, is a fast-moving, realistic and tension-pitched drama of behind-the-scenes excitement with the Los Angeles Police force, and, particularly, its motorcycle division.
