UF Campaign Starts Sept. 21; Objective Set At \$281,876

Objective for this year's United Fund campaign here, which begins Sept. 21, is \$281,876. Wilfred J. Driscoll, public relations committee chairman for the Charlottetown area, told members of Charlottetown Rotary yesterday.

Mr. Driscoll, guest speaker at the weekly Rotary luncheon at the Charlottetown Hotel, said it was "not enough to be committed to the idea of United Fund, but we must work at making this an effective and successful method of collecting monies for the various agencies... that are necessary to our community."

Charlottetown district quota in this year's campaign, Mr. Driscoll said, was \$143,200, exclusive of the federal service division and provincial government employees.

He appealed for support to make the campaign successful so that the fund could achieve its aim: "to collect money in a more efficient and streamlined manner and at the same time arrive at a more equitable sharing of the burden."

Mr. Driscoll said the Fund had already accomplished a good deal. It has eliminated 17 separate campaigns and numerous tag days; kept campaign costs low, ensuring that more money goes for the actual work of the agencies; made it possible for donors to make one donation or spread their contributions out over the year; raised \$240,000 last year.

Chairman of the meeting was A.A. MacLeod. Special guests of Rotary were Alan Holman, Fund chairman, and Jack Ambler, executive director of the Fund.

Ch'town Man Is Fined \$50 On False Reporting Charge

An offence whereby an accused pleaded guilty to reporting an automobile had been stolen when no such event had taken place, says Charles E. Lund of 7152 Dorchester Street, find \$50 and costs by Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, in Queens County Magistrate's Court Monday morning.

A Charlottetown man, James Neville Allen, pleaded guilty to theft of one bag of potatoes, property of the agriculture department and was assessed \$35 and costs or 15 days.

Charged with criminal negligence in the death of James Joseph Robinson, a city youth, James Wayne Darte was remanded to September 13 for preliminary hearing with bail to stand.

Three other city youths, Robert Allison Hennessey, James Barry Bradley and Lloyd Ernest Blacquer, charged with robbing Kenneth Albert Chapman of \$20 were remanded to Queen County jail until September 3, bail for each accused was fixed at \$1,000 with two sureties of \$500 each.

William Emmett Gerard Murphy of Toronto, Ont., was fined \$20 and costs after he pleaded guilty to a charge of causing a disturbance by fighting in the Crapaud Sports Centre.

Glen Joseph McGuigan of Oceanview, charged with permitting a person to ride on a motor vehicle in an unsafe manner, had his case adjourned to Sept. 17 to fix a date for trial.

Francis Calvin MacLeod, 19 Great George Street, was discharged, at a preliminary hearing on a charge of attempted break and entry of the residence of Lloyd Hamilton Yeo of Willow Ave., in Southport.

Giving evidence were Cst. G. W. Hopkins of RCMP Charlottetown, Lloyd Yeo and Joseph Paul Gallant, Southport.

In discharging the accused Magistrate Johnston said he felt that there was not sufficient evidence for a jury trial.

Two residents of Lake Verde and Charlottetown appeared on charges of illegal possession of liquor and were each fined \$20 and costs or 30 days while Bonshaw resident, charged with intoxication, was assessed \$20 and costs or 15 days.

Viet Cong Overrun Outpost

SAIGON (Reuters) - Communist Viet-Cong guerrillas overran a South Vietnamese government outpost 330 miles northeast of Saigon early today and left the post in flames.

No report had been received from the garrison but casualties among the defenders were expected to be heavy.

Four air strikes were conducted near the post in the early hours of this morning but they could not prevent the guerrillas from overrunning the position.

The outpost, defended by a unit of regional forces troops, is about 10 miles west of Quang Ngai city in the heart of Viet Cong controlled country.

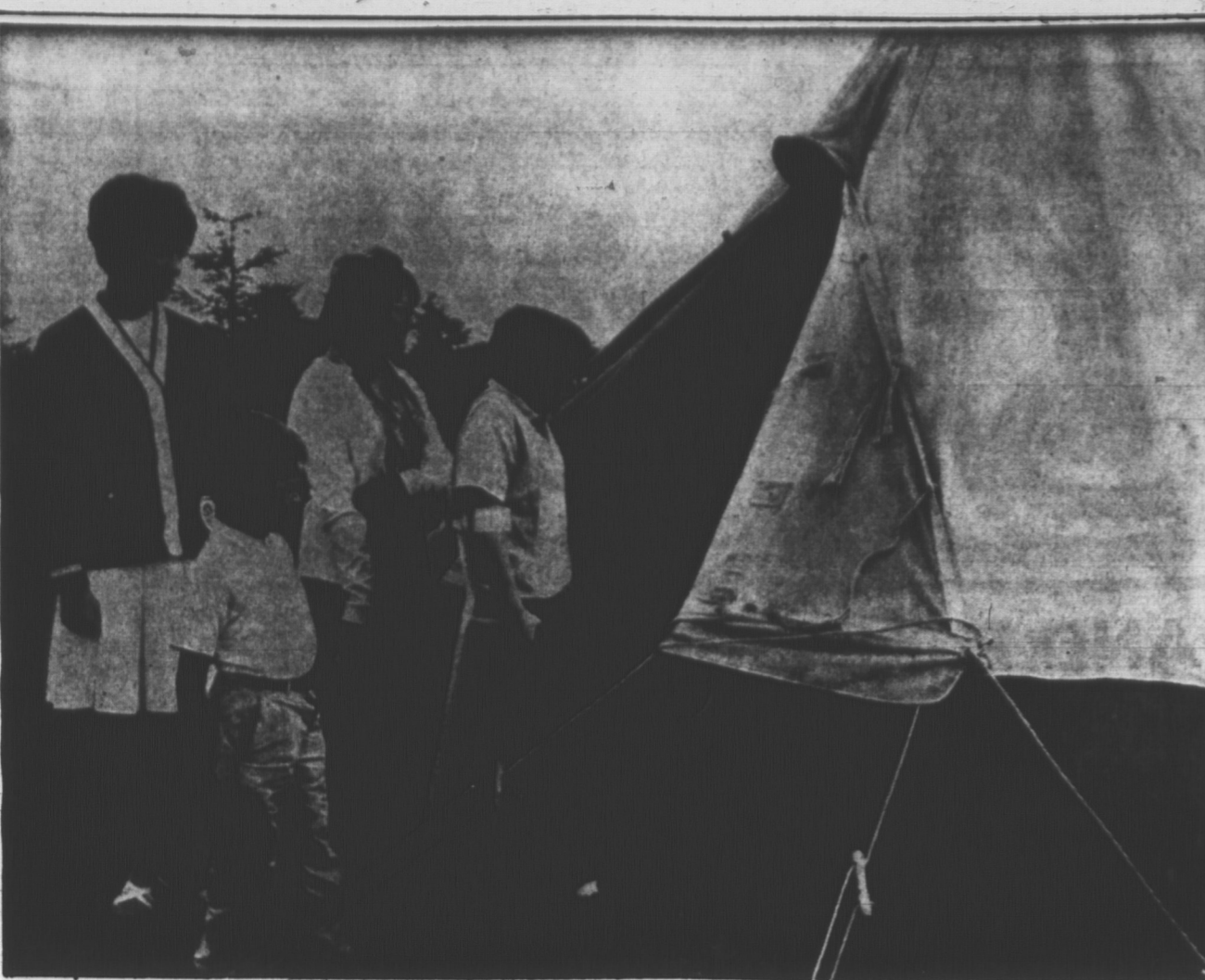
