PRICES OF MILK.

Sir,—In your daily issue of the 14th inst., Mr. John T. Weeks takes exception to the statement published in your paper of the work done by the Emerald Cheese Factory during the past season. While I acknowledge he is correct in stating that the gross proceeds from the sale of cheese were not distributed among the patrons, he is entirely in error when he says it "could not possibly net the patrons over 55 cents per 100 lbs. of milk." It may surprise Mr. Weeks to know that we have paid 75 cents per 100 lbs., and no patron has received as low as 55 cents. I do not wish to create dissatisfaction among the patrons of any factory, and I trust the management of all our factories will do the best they possibly can for their patrons—but simply wish to state that in attempting to correct a so-called misstatement, Mr. Weeks has published another. Perhaps it would be more prudent to keep factory statements out of the press, as, no doubt factories that have a large quantity of milk supplied, if expenses are not allowed to run too high, can afford to pay higher for milk than others that get a smaller quantity, and consequently patrons of smaller factories, not considering the fact, will become somewhat dissatisfied. However, let the patrons of small factories, instead of becoming dissatisfied or discouraged, endeavor to increase the quantity and quality of the milk in succeeding years, and no doubt they will find that the business will be more profitable.
