The Public Accounts Report.

THE Departmental reports submitted by the Hon. Mr. Sullivan are, with one exception, very neatly printed. They reflect great credit upon Messrs. Coombs & Worth, the more so that they were so promptly issued as to completely upset the calculations and dissipate the hopes of the editor of the Patriot, who stated that they could not be ready to lay before the Legislature till late in the session.

The report of the Commissioner of Public Works gives clear statements, showing the expenditure of the Department, the contracts entered into, the contracts unfinished at the end of the year, a comparison of estimates and expenditure, with the amount of arrears of 1878 paid in 1879, and also amount of claims unfurnished at the end of the past year. The expenditure amounts in all to \$135,216.75. The estimate amounted to \$137,484.72. So that the expenditure was \$2,267.97 within the estimate. The services on which the money was expended, with the estimates and the arrears of 1878, are thus enumerated:—

The statement from which we extract the above also shows that the arrears of 1878, paid in 1879, amount to \$30,012.00; that the accounts and contracts of 1879, paid in 1879, amount to \$105,204.15; that the amount paid last year to repair damages by the storm, was \$2,421.46; that the claims against the Department unfurnished on the 31st of December, 1879, were only \$1,895.40.

From these figures it will be seen that had it not been for the storm of the 29th October last, the expenditure would have been within the estimates no less than \$4,639.43, a sum almost sufficient to have covered all the outstanding claims upon the Department.

The public contracts accepted and entered into in 1879, cost \$12,523.78. Of this amount \$12,143.43 was paid. So that the balance due for unfinished contracts at the

end of 1879 was only \$654.30. Last year the amount due was \$20,244!

The Engineer's report gives a succinct account of the work done by that officer. It shows that thirty-eight large bridges and wharves, and a great many bridges and culverts of minor importance were built or repaired during the year.

A report of Messrs. Sterling & Harris, respecting the new Hospital for the Insane, is submitted. It shows that the total cost of the building was \$100,753.59. Of this amount \$94,160.59 has been paid; leaving \$5,592.99 still unpaid.

The statements in the report, taken in connection with the fact that the public works have been so well attended to that there is little, if any, complaint throughout the country, afford indisputable proof of the energy, capacity and economy of the Hon. Donald Ferguson; and show the utter baselessness of the charges of his calumniators.

The Cape Tormentine Railway.

The project of a railway to connect Cape Tormentine in Westmoreland with some point on the Intercolonial, in order to secure uninterrupted communication with Prince Edward Island, was strongly advocated in the House of Commons yesterday, by the Island members and Sir Albert J. Smith. Sir Charles Tupper seems to have given something like a pledge that this line of railway would be built by the Government, in which case the Province of New Brunswick and the County of Westmoreland would have some forty or fifty miles of additional railway, passing through a tract of country that would be greatly benefited thereby. The heart of the editor of the Sackville Post will rejoice at the prospect of this cherished scheme being carried out.—St. John Telegraph.

LEFURGEY, THE FORGER, IN THE PENITENTIARY.—John LeFurgey, who has been sentenced to the penitentiary for life, for passing counterfeit money, was visited at that institution on Saturday afternoon, by the chief of the police and Detective Weatherhead, with a view of ascertaining from him, if possible, the names of the parties whom LeFurgey stated, were implicated in the forgeries. The statement of the prisoner, on his arraignment, was doubted and no action was, at that time, taken. Since then, the chief, on examining the papers found on LeFurgey, when he was arrested, found sufficient in them to corroborate the prisoner's statement, in regard to accomplices, and on Saturday started out to interview the prisoner on the subject. LeFurgey, however, refused to enlighten the chief as to the other parties. LeFurgey is learning the blacksmith trade.—Telegraph.

MR. JOHN CAMPBELL, who died at Liverpool, N. S., last Monday, was sixty-four years a Mason, probably the oldest in the Province, having joined the Order in 1816, and was a regular attendant at Lodge until within the last five years. His last request was that he might be buried by his brethren.

KEARNEY and some of the other agitators who have been introducing Communistic principles in San Francisco, appear to be in imminent danger of being hanged by a Vigilance Committee of citizens.

A FIRE broke out on McDaniel's wharf, Halifax, on the 10th inst., resulting in the partial destruction of three buildings and total loss of stocks.

THERE was a great fire at the weaving works in Moscow, on the 10th inst. Twenty-four persons were burned to death and 29 injured.
