### NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

UNITED STATES.

MEMPHIS, Aug. 29.

A negro hung himself because his sweetheart was nursing his rival, who is sick with fever. J. V. Graves, a train despatcher, who died of fever last night, came from Elmira, N. Y. His wife is also in a critical position. Twenty new cases. Seven deaths since last evening.

NEW ORLEANS, Aug. 30.

General J. B. Hood, died this morning. It is believed his daughter Lydia will not recover; Edith is also very sick.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.

The actual amount of gold received at the Assay office here from London shipments since August 12th has been four millions; manifests already received will amount to as much more. In addition to this, cable despatches show over 5 millions were shipped yesterday.

DEADWOOD, Aug. 30.

Armonda Hudson and George Beecher, freighters from Port Pierre, reports while encamped at Spine Springs on Friday night were attacked by Indians, their waggons riddled with bullets and arrows and some horses killed. They escaped on one horse to the next station, and returning in the morning found their waggons undisturbed, but the balance of the stock gone.

FORT SMITH, Aug. 29.

Henry Stuart and William Elliott were hanged here to-day for murders committed in the Indian country.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30.

A special to the "Herald" says it is believed if Sitting Bull's presence aggravates the trouble in Canada, our Government will be called upon to receive the fugitives.

NEW YORK, Aug. 30.

The "Times" says the Royal Canadian Fire Insurance Company claims to have lost \$100,000 in the United States the last six months.

MONTAGUE, Tex., Aug. 30.

Chas. Harris was executed on Friday in the presence of 5,000 persons for the murder of his brother in January, 1877. He was convicted on his own confession. The drop fell while the assemblage sang "Sweet Bye-and-Bye."

TROY, N. Y., Aug. 30.

Capt. J. Grant Thompson, editor of the Albany "Law Journal," died of diphtheria, last night, at Saratoga Springs.

EUROPEAN.

LONDON, Aug. 30.

The steamer *Britsol*, from New York, reports:—Spoke the vessel which picked up the crew of the *Uncle Sam*, Aug. 21. [Note.—It is not stated whether it is the crew of the bark *Uncle Sam* or the *Tug-boat*.]

W. S. & S. Caine, iron merchants, Liverpool, have failed. Liabilities £150,000.

It is announced that a Royal Commission, under the presidency of Lord Carnarvon, Colonial Secretary, has been appointed to report upon the defence of the British Colonies.

BERLIN, Aug. 30.

The treaty for the cession of Kuldja to China is expected to be signed at Livadia shortly. The Chinese plenipotentiary at St. Petersburg will proceed there.

The value of railways the government is negotiating the purchase of, is £75,000,000 sterling.

VIENNA, Aug. 30.

Andrassy has postponed his retirement for a fortnight, that his successor may not be embarrassed with difficult questions now pending.

LONDON, Aug. 30.

Consols, 7 7-17; 4's, new 5's, 5 5-8; Erie, 5 1-2; preferred, 48.

LIVERPOOL, Aug. 30.

Cotton steady, uplands 6 13-16d; Orleans, 15-16d; sales, 7,000 bales, speculation and export, 1,000 bales; receipts 3,900; American, 9,400; futures partially 1-16d. cheaper.

LONDON, Aug. 30.

All the checks of John Mackintosh, of Cornhill, E. C., London,—a large speculator in American railways—was returned last night. He will be declared a defaulter on the Stock Exchange to-day or Monday.

About \$400,000 worth of bullion is expected to be shipped by the Liverpool steamer to-day.

At Paris gold continues to be sent to the United States for the purchase of wheat. Steamer *St. Laurent* to-day takes \$600,000 part on English account.

The following is from the west coast of Africa:—At Axum the French Gold Mining Company has discovered a valuable vein of gold. It is reported from Sherbello that the natives are expected to attack Benedoo, on Roquelle river. A threatened attack on the British Custom House at Scarcees has not been made.

The population of Novi Bazar is inclined to resist the entry of the Austrians.

A despatch from Fort Marshall, of the 6th, says: "Messengers have been sent to Cetewayo warning him if he delays submission beyond the 15th that the Swazies will no longer be prevented from invading Zululand."

A despatch from Cape Town announces that the chief of the Pondas has expressed anxiety to make reparation. The matter may be settled by the imposition of a heavy fine.

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The American ship *Reunion*, last reported at Mejillonnes, Bolivia, May 21st, for Europe, was wrecked on the Island of Heli-goland. The crew was saved.

An Arcachon despatch says—King Alfonso would prolong his visit if Premier Campos had not informed him that surprise is felt in Spain at his prolonged absence.

A despatch from Warsaw, Poland, says Czar has arrived to witness the military manoeuvres.

BRUSSELS, Aug. 30.

Independence Beige says the United States Council has refused to allow a vessel which sailed from Flushing with a company of French Catholics and Royalists for the Island of Papua to hoist the American flag.

EDINBURGH, Aug. 30.

The "Scotchman" says the reduction of 10 per cent in the salaries of officers and 7 1/2 per cent on the wages of employes, has been resolved upon by the North British Railway Co.

Dean Stanley has consented to the interment of the remains of the late Sir Rowland Hill in Westminster Abbey.

MEETING OF THE EVANGELICAL ALLIANCE.

BASEL, Switzerland, Aug. 30.

The seventh general conference of the Evangelical Alliance began its session here to-day. A large number of delegates have arrived and more than 1500 visitors, to attend the session which will continue one week. Several delegates from the United States will deliver addresses.

SYDNEY, Aug. 30.

Trickett again won the sculling championship of the world, defeating Laycock to-day by nine lengths over the championship course on the Paramatta river, in 22 minutes and 36 seconds.

PICTOU, Aug. 30.

About 12 o'clock to-day, a man named Rogers, a brakeman employed on the Inter-colonial Railway at Pictou landing, met with a painful accident which resulted fatally. He was engaged in shunting in the yard, and in attempting to jump on the cow-catcher as the engine was passing the switch, his foot slipped and the wheels of the engine passed over both his legs.

Drs. Kirkwood and Stewart, from Pictou, and Johnson, of Stellarton, were called, and attempted to amputate the injured limbs, but the unfortunate man died before this could be accomplished. He leaves a wife and two children, who reside at Stellarton, N. S.

MISCELLANEOUS.

It is on the 25th of next month that the eighteenth centenary of the destruction of Pompeii is to be celebrated at Naples.

The Bank of Africa has been formed, with a capital of £1,000,000, in £25 shares to carry on the business of bankers in South Africa.

The manager of a Home for Friendless Girls at Depford has been acquitted, after a protracted trial, of the charge of manslaughter by starving one of the children under her care.

The Inland Revenue returns for the month of July amount to \$319,730.03, making a total of \$3,466,378.74 for the first six months of 1879. For a similar period last year they were \$3,017,285.34.

The Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa and Occident railway and Canada Central railway have offered to give ten per cent. of their earnings during the Dominion Exhibition to the Ottawa Demonstration Committee.

The athletic sports and harvest home in connection with the Ontario Agricultural College were held at Guelph Saturday. The affair was a great success, and was thoroughly enjoyed by the large number of visitors present.

Lizzie Rompf, of Louisville, married Joseph Drago when she was only 15 years old, and within three months obtained a divorce. At 16 she was united to him again by a second ceremony, and this time six months elapsed before a separation. She is now nearly seventeen, and Drago is wooing her anew.

The report of a shocking affair comes from Brighton, Carlton county, N. B. Donald McLeod was employed by James Page to watch his orchard from depredations by boys. Late on Sunday evening a son of McLeod's passed through the orchard to shorten the walk home and was shot by his father. Fatal results are anticipated.

The farmers who sailed from Liverpool on Wednesday for New York, are from Northern Yorkshire and Durham, of various classes, from the small tenant farmer upward. Several command a capital of £500 to £600; others have entered into partnership, one group having a capital of £1,200.

The Memphis *Appeal* says: "Notwithstanding the fever, marriage licenses are procured as usual. But few white people engage in matrimony these times in Memphis, but the colored people are not to be frightened so easily from uniting in wedlock for better or for worse."

The little sailboat *Golden Gate*, which sailed from Boston on the 9th July, bound to Melbourne, was spoken on the 18th, in latitude 41 deg. north, long. 59 deg. west, with mainsail boom fished. All on board were well, and she required nothing.
