

# Zuger Guides Tiger-Cats Into Grey Cup Classic

**HAMILTON (CP)**—Quarterback Joe Zuger, supported by an unyielding defense, guided Hamilton Tiger-Cats to a 17-7 victory Saturday over Ottawa Rough Riders and another shot at Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Grey Cup football classic.

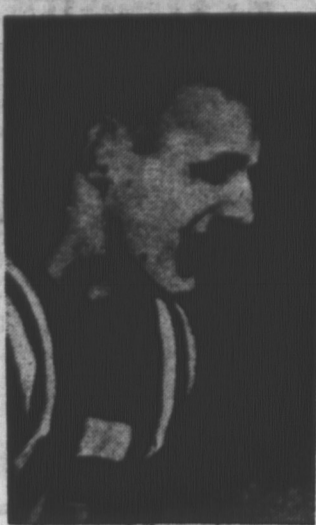
Ticats' triumph, coupled with an 18-13 victory over Ottawa a week ago, gave them the Eastern Football Conference two-game total - point final series 35-20.

Bombers won the western title with a 19-12 victory over Calgary Stampeders Saturday in the deciding game of the WFC best-of-three series.

The teams meet Saturday, Nov. 27, at Toronto in the Grey Cup.

It will be the sixth clash between the clubs since 1957 when Hamilton began its EFC domination. Only once since then—in 1960 when Ottawa won the cup — has Hamilton failed to reach the Grey Cup game.

However, they have been no ball of fire in the national classic, winning only in 1957 and 1963.

Only once in previous seasons as an understudy to Bernie Faloney did he manage an outstanding performance. That was in his first game as a starting quarterback when he set a single-game Canadian Football League record of eight touchdowns passes against Saskatchewan Roughriders in an interlocking East-West game here.

Since then he has been relegated mainly to second-string quarterback and front-line defensive half, who handled the club's punting.

## Brawl Highlights Contest

**NEW YORK (AP)**—A wild melee involving fans, officials and New York Ranger players, who poured into the spectators' area, developed in Madison Square Garden Sunday night during a National Hockey League game with Detroit Red Wings.

No major injuries were reported. Special police took at least one unidentified man into custody.

The whole thing appeared to have been touched off when Detroit's Norm Ullman scored a disputed goal in the third period breaking a 2-2 tie.

The Rangers argued vehemently with goal judge Arthur Reichert, who said the puck went in. Referee Art Skov allowed the goal, and the players went back to centre ice to line up.

About that time, however, at 9:50 of the third period, a man began berating Reichert, then began to throw punches. A dozen other spectators quickly joined in, some attempting to protect the judge, and a general melee followed.

The Rangers' Vic Hadfield skated to the sideboards, scaled the 10-foot glass partition and leaped into the middle of it, attempting to protect the official.

# Leafs Throttle Chicago; Boston Outhustles Habs

**CHICAGO (AP)**—The revitalized Toronto Maple Leafs won their third National Hockey League game in a row Sunday night, whipping the slumping Chicago Black Hawks 7-3.

The triumph, second over Chicago in two nights, pulled the Leafs to within a point of the second-place Black Hawks, who remained two points back of league-leading Montreal Canadiens.

The Hawks now have lost four of their last five games.

Chicago lost scoring star Bobby Hull because of an injured left knee in the first period.

The Leafs sewed up the game with four goals in the first period, the first two by Eddie Shack and Tim Horton, coming while two Hawks were in the penalty box.

Dave Keon and rookie Brit Selby completed the rout.

**SCORED ON REBOUND**  
 Black Hawks' Matt Ravlich, who had drawn two minor penalties for fighting in a scrap with Larry Jeffrey, Bill Hay, and Pierre Pilote, were in the box when Shack put a rebound shot in. Mike Walton's shot behind Hawk goalie Glenn Hall, who was down on the ice after having made three successive stops. The time was 5:03.

Pilote and Hay still were in the penalty box 31 seconds later when Horton knocked in a 40-foot screened shot after taking passes from Selby and Peter Stelmowski.

Phil Esposito scored late in the first frame and Chico Maki boosted Chicago's hopes early in the second period with a neat conversion of a rink-wide pass by Esposito but the Leafs drew out of danger at 17:50 of the middle frame when Bob Pulford mugged a rebound of Shack's shot under Hall.

Orland Kurtenbach and Mike Walton added the Leafs final tallies in the third period, while Esposito scored his second.

**BOSTON (CP)**—Tommy Williams scored twice Sunday night to lead the last-place Boston Bruins to a 3-2 National Hockey League victory over the first-place Montreal Canadiens.

It was the Bruins' third win of the season and their second over the Canadiens in the clubs' three meetings this season.

Johnny Bucyk scored the third — and winning — Boston goal from 20 feet out in the third period.

And as has been the case almost every game since he came to Boston from the minors, rookie goaltender Bernie Parent was a key factor in the Bruins' victory.

Montreal, defending Stanley Cup champion, outskated the Bruins all the way. But the 20-year-old Parent kicked out 40 shots, many from close up. Canadiens goalie Charlie Hodge had only 24 saves.

Bucyk took a pass out from Ed Westfall in the corner and drilled a shot to Hodge's left for the decisive goal after only 58 seconds of the third period. It was Bucyk's second tally in 11 games and enabled the Bruins to reach the three-goal mark for only the second time. They defeated the Canadiens in Montreal 3-1 earlier.

# SDU Down Dalhousie 7-0 In Intercollegiate Opener

 The Saint Dunstan's University Saints began another Maritime intercollegiate hockey season on the right foot Saturday afternoon, at the Saint's arena, when they scored an impressive 7-0 victory over the rugged Dalhousie University Tigers.

The Saints are the defending Maritime intercollegiate champions and finalists in the Canadian intercollegiate playoffs, which were held at Winnipeg last March.

A large and exuberant crowd, estimated to be about 900, saw Rick O'Donnell, a newcomer to Jack Kane's squad, score two goals and collect two assists. Maurice Roy, O'Donnell's linemate, and Mike Kelly each scored two goals and one assist. Glen Hughes got the Saint's other marker.

Mike Kelly opened the scoring in the first period, after both teams had settled down to play the game, at the 9:34 mark. His goal was the outcome of a scramble in front of the Dalhousie net and it was only after a few dazzling stops by goalie Ron Steniewicz that Kelly was able to put the puck past him. O'Donnell put the Saints ahead by two goals at 14:51 when he let one of his booming slap-shots go from a faceoff pass from Roy.

Another scramble in front of the Dal net resulted in another goal. This time Maurice Roy found the mark at 15:26. Glen Hughes rounded out the scoring in the first period at 18:44 when he beat the Dal goalie with a high shot from the point.

The Saints went into the second period with a 4-0 lead and it looked as if the Tigers were going to hold them at this count, however, the superior play and conditioning of the Saints payed off and they came out of this period with a six goal margin on goals by O'Donnell and Kelly.

O'Donnell stole the puck from the stick of a Dal defender and skated in all alone and beat Steniewicz for his second goal of the afternoon. This goal came with LeClair, of the Saints sitting in the penalty box. Kelly got his second goal at 19:38 of this period.

Although Carl MacQuaid, in the Saints net, was not being overworked he had to save his own shut-out a few times in this period. One time was when a Dal marksman skated in with only one defender back and got

a good shot away but MacQuaid turned it aside.

The referees were on the spot and nothing serious occurred.

Contrary to the first two periods, the only goal came early in the period. At 1:36, Maurice Roy took a pass in front of the Dal net and shot it past Steniewicz who made a desperate attempt to stop the shot. This was Roy's second of the game.

**U Of Toronto Blues Capture College Bowl**

**TORONTO (CP)**—The "hot-potato" play sparked University of Toronto Blues to a 14-7 win over University of Alberta Golden Bears on a muddy field here Saturday in the Save the Children Fund College Bowl.

The play, last of the third quarter, saw Blues quarterback Bryce Taylor float a 24-yard pass to end Mike Eben at the Alberta goal-line. Eben, who had trouble eluding Bear defenders all day, was backing away from the play to make the catch.

Taylor started the play by handing off to halfback Gerry Stenberg who gave the ball to flanker Jim Ware on a reverse play. Ware pitched out to Taylor who had dropped back out of the play and he had time to find Eben in the clear.

Taylor's convert gave Toronto an 8-7 lead. On the last play of the game the Blues quarterback romped over from seven yards out for the clinching touchdown.

The victory gave Blues the Vanier Cup in the first of what hoped will be an annual bowl game bringing together the two top college football teams in the country.

The Pope Motors Aces management had to import three Charlottetown players to ice a team against the Junior Legionnaires last Friday night. They benched their regular goalie, Tim McLaughlin, and put Donnie Frizzell of Charlottetown in his place. They also had Frank Driscoll and "Diddles" Doyle in the line-up. Frizzell who has quite a reputation between the pipes put up a glibbed game as did the junior net minder, George McNeil, but the Aces, with Greg DeGahan back, put up a much better offensive game than in their first three outings. And only Summerside players figured in the six scoring plays.

The Charlottetown market, with no intermediate league in the Capital City, should be pretty ripe for plucking as the boys naturally like to play in the Aces. They have started this "help from the Hillsboro" business, Borden should follow suit. They might pick some big plums like Angle Carroll and "Farmer" Josey. All this is hardly fair to the Legionnaires, as Charlottetown has a fine junior league going, and it might be difficult to get such fellows as Jamie Kennedy, Alan Flood, Bill Weatherie or Bobby Deberry. We doubt anyway if Winny Steele and Grant Grady would want to bench any of their regulars for imports.

The way Warren Grant is playing for the Aces (he scored two goals, one in each of the games he's played) we think he should be lining up with the juniors as he can't be more than 16 or 17 years old. The Legionnaires Friday night paid him the compliment of making him the target for the night. Grant, who packs a good shot, didn't seem to be looking for trouble, but he did get into a few hassles.

Some of the R.C.A.F. personnel including F.L. Logan and referee-in-chief Glen Matthews, are still attempting to organize the Aces to enter the P.C.H.L. We think the Aces should be in there even if their club is a bit weaker than last year. Quitting after winning the title last year is too much like a gambler who leaves the table after raking in the first pot.
