Opening lead—four of spades. Part of the skill in defensive play consists of giving declarer the opportunity to make an error. The defender who never gives declarer rope with which to hang himself can hardly expect him to commit suicide.

Here is an elementary case which brings out the point we want to make. Suppose we follow the play of the hand to see what's wrong with the picture.

Declarer plays a low spade from dummy and wins East's jack with the king. He leads a heart towards dummy and loses the queen to the ace. Back comes the deuce of spades, won with the ace.

Struggle Shapes Up Between Banks, Quebec Credit Unions

Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA (CP)—A struggle between the chartered banks and the credit unions—causes popular in Quebec—is haping up for a multi-million-dollar business in personal savings accounts and small loans.

At present, the banks appear to hold the upper hand after increasing their charges for cashing cheques drawn on credit union members' accounts and by levying other charges against the co-operative financial institutions.

However, the credit unions may hold a trump card. There is increasing talk about the possibility of their setting up their own co-operative chartered bank through which they would deal at lower rates.

HEALTHY ORGANIZATION

There now are some 4,300 credit unions and caisses populaires with some 2,000,000 accounts. Credit union members are usually family men and one estimate is that 6,000,000 Canadians are directly or indirectly concerned in credit unions.

It is understood the view of the caisses populaires in Quebec, where some 450 municipalities are without banks, is that the additional charge on cheques is a penalty on their rural members who have no nearby bank branch.

Motor Vehicle Output Higher

TORONTO (CP)—Canadian motor-vehicle production last week is estimated at 9,198 vehicles compared with 6,361 in the preceding week, says the Canadian Automobile Chamber of Commerce.

Production was made up of 7,979 cars compared with 5,563 and 1,219 trucks compared with 798.

Total production to Jan. 10 is estimated at 10,524 vehicles compared with 10,502, made up of 9,134 cars compared with 9,078, and 1,390 trucks compared with 1,424.

Hydro Workers Sign Contract

TORONTO (CP)—The Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission and its employees' union agreed Tuesday on a two-year contract, ending the threat of a strike.

Final wording of the agreement is to be completed today and the new contract submitted to the union's 16-man executive committee later in the day.

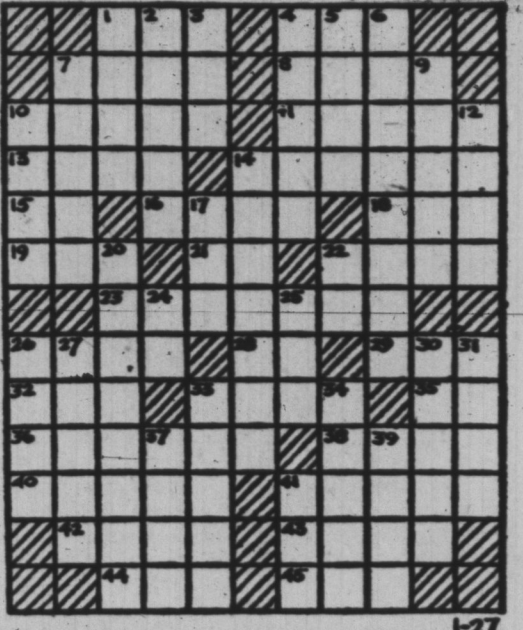

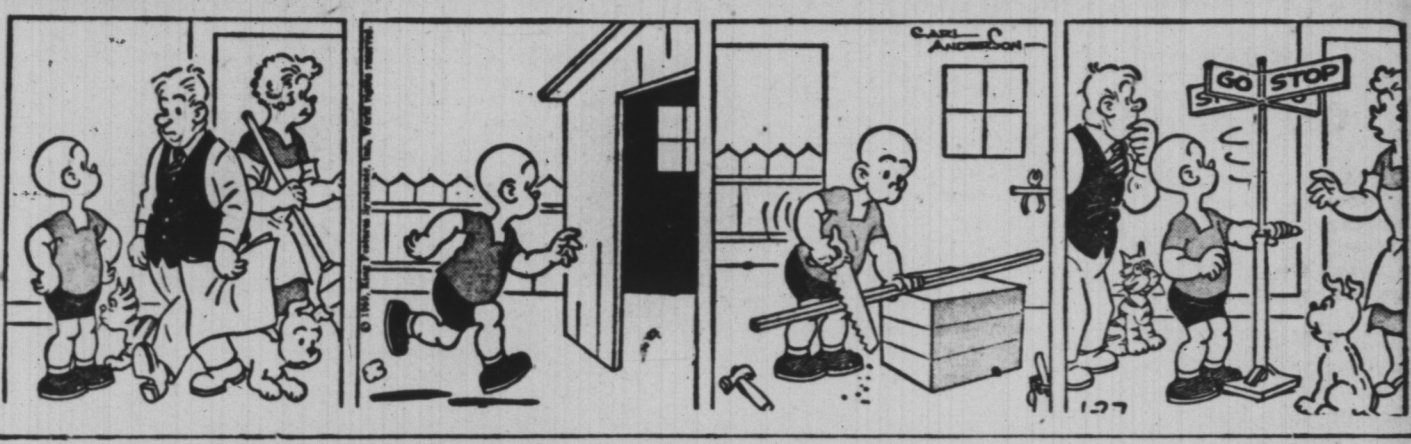


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
