**DiMaggio, Stengel Scoff At Report Rift Between Them**

NEW YORK, Aug. 3—(AP)—New York Yankees today scoffed at reports of dissension between Joe DiMaggio, their star outfielder, and manager Casey Stengel.

The two principals involved and general manager George Weiss termed a recent story by Joe Trimble in the New York Daily News that DiMaggio was not on speaking terms with Stengel as "ridiculous."

"It's silly to say that Stengel and I are not getting along," DiMaggio said. "We haven't exchanged a harsh word. I've always followed orders, have never broken a training rule and always do my best to respond to all that is asked of me. In my book the manager is the boss."

Weiss issued the following statement:

"Anyone who knows Casey Stengel's reputation as a manager and DiMaggio's reputation as a team player will realize how ridiculous is any talk of a disagreement between them."

"For this reason the Yankees will not dignify the story by making any further comment on it," Stengel, obviously embarrassed about the entire situation, said.

"I've been in a baseball a long while and I've known a lot of team players. DiMaggio is one of the greatest and I'd be a poor sort of manager if I didn't think the world of a guy like that."

Trimble, in a story last Tuesday, criticized DiMaggio "for sulking like a son-of-a-bitch" because Stengel had dropped him from the cleanup spot in favor of Johnny Mize.

Trimble wrote: "This great player, is carrying things too far when he refuses to talk to his manager, curtly cuts the newspaper man who has been his friend for years and maintains a stony silence toward all but a few of his teammates."

Stories of DiMaggio's changing moods have found their way into print lately. Although aware of such stories circulating about him, DiMaggio characteristically has refused to say anything about them. That is, until now.

"I have played under various Yankee managers including Joe McCarthy, Bill Dickey and Buckey Harris," he said. "And I never had indulged in much talk with any of them. My idea is that they don't pay me for conversation."

"Newspaper men always have had free access to ask me any questions they want. I've always tried to answer them. I don't whine when untrue things are printed about me, however. And I definitely don't go running around asking guys where they dug up such dope."

**Ontario Gov't Grapples With Amateur Status**

TORONTO, Aug. 3—(CP)—The Ontario Government took a stab today at answering the thorny question: "What's an amateur?"

Premier Frost said in an announcement that, for purposes of taxation under the Provincial Hospitals Tax Act an "amateur" athlete will be one whose services are worth \$20 a game or less. Any team which pays its players more than that will be taxable.

Last session, the Legislature broadened the hospitals tax act to take in the activities of various athletic clubs—hockey, baseball and football, among others—whose gates and salaries had reached the proportion of big business.

"It has been found difficult to know just where to draw the line for taxation purposes," the Premier said. "We now have set up the arbitrary figure of \$20 a game."

Under Provincial regulations all athletic clubs will have to file a statement showing salaries paid players.

**Detroit Tigers' Pennant Hopes Soar After 5-2 Victory Over Yankees**

Detroit pennant hopes soared to a new high Thursday as young Art Houtteman pitched the Tigers to a 5-2 six-hit victory over the New York Yankees before 31,713 fans in Briggs Stadium.

Houtteman's neat job enabled the Tigers to sweep the three-game series and it dropped the Yanks out of second into third place. The idle Cleveland Indians moved into the runner-up slot, two and one-half games behind the Tigers. The Yanks are three games back.

The young Tiger ace, who missed his regular turn two days ago because of a strained muscle in his side, had little difficulty gaining his 13th victory.

Detroit stowed the game away in the first inning, scoring four runs off lefty Ed Lopat, the Yanks' biggest winner. Joe Page finished up with the bases loaded to drive in the first two runs and boost his R. B. I. output to 99. Hoot Evers and Don Kolloway drove in the others.

Fred Sanford relieved Lopat in the first and held the Tigers hitless and runless until he bowed out for a pinch-hitter in the seventh inning. Joe Page finished up with the bases loaded to drive in the fifth run in the eighth when George Kell doubled, moved to second on a bunt and scored on a long fly by Evers.

Houtteman lost his shutout in the fourth when Johnny Mize followed a walk to Hank Bauer with his 12th home run, a blast into the upper deck in right field.

In the only other American League game the Chicago White Sox edged the Philadelphia Athletics 1-0. Randy Gumpert won a pitching duel from Hank Wyse. Gumpert granted four singles and Wyse five hits. The Sox scored the lone run in the seventh on a triple by Ed Robinson and single by Hank Majeski.

The Boston Braves whipped the St. Louis Cardinals, 5-1, in the only action in the National League. The victory allowed the Braves to take over second place from Brooklyn Dodgers by three percentage points.

Righthander Vern Bickford chilled the Cards on four hits, one a homer by Red Schoendienst in the fourth. The Braves reached lefty Al Brazle for seven bloopers, including home runs by Bob Elliott, Sam Jethroe and Walter Cooper.

The Dodgers' scheduled game with Pittsburgh Pirates was rained out as was the night game between Cincinnati and the league-leading Phils in Philadelphia. Other teams were idle.

**Scottish Pence Wins \$50,000 Two-Mile Pace**

WESTBURY, N. Y., Aug. 3—(AP)—Scottish Pence, from the Castleton Farm, Lexington, Ky., stood off a challenge by the favored Jerry the First to win the \$50,000 Nassau two-mile pace tonight at Roosevelt Raceway.

Wayne Smart of Delaware, Ohio, drove the five-year-old son of Scotland-Millie Worby under the wire in 4:17 1/5, excellent time considering the fact the track was labelled only "good" after a day-long rain.

Grattan McKillo, winner of the race last year was eighth. He set the world record of 4:16 4-5 in that event.

Third place in a photo finish went to Indian Land, owned by William W. Erving of Haledon, N. J., with Highland Ellen, from the stable of Ralph Korening, Milwaukee, fourth.

Seventeen of the country's fastest pacers contested the race—largest field ever to start at the Roosevelt half-mile oval.

The winner, in chalking up his 12th victory in 14 starts this season, returned \$10,200, \$440 and \$390. Jerry the First paid \$410 and \$320, and Indian Land, \$480.

Scottish Pence was in either the lead or in a good contending position most of the way in the race that took the flying sulkeys four times around the track.

Jerry the First, owned by Burdick and Cobb of Washington Courthouse, Ohio, and driven by Eddie Cobb, made his challenge after the field travelled a mile and three-quarters, ranging up to the leader, but Scottish Pence had it in the bag to win by 1 1/4 lengths.

**All-American Golf Tourney**

Mrs. Zaharias' scintillating 36-74 round of Tam O' Shanter's women's par 36-72 course, was two strokes under men's par in the all-American 72-hole merry-go-round.

Babe, who collected \$500 for breaking her own course record of 71 set in the 1948 all-American, had seven birdies and was over women's par on only one hole, the 380-yard No. 1 which she three-putted.

Babe finished six strokes ahead of professional Betty Jameson of San Antonio, Tex., and the day's top amateur, Beverly Hanson of Pasadena, Calif., who tied for second at even-par 76.

**Major Baseball Leagues In U.S. On Wartime Basis**

CINCINNATI, Aug. 2—(AP)—Baseball Commissioner A. B. Chandler announced the national defence list rules, as adopted the Second World War, have been adopted as of today for major league baseball.

The original regulations, Chandler said, were adopted so that baseball players called into military service would retain their status and "not lose any time in baseball" during the time they were in the armed forces. The order today affected only the major leagues but would apply to the minors as soon as they vote approval.

That any player accepted in any branch of the armed service shall automatically be placed on the national defence list and shall not count in the player limits of his club until removed from such national defence service list.

That a player on the national defence list "must be reinstated before he can be unconditionally released."
