Rovers Come Through In Late Innings Of Game To Whip Anchors' Squad 11-6

Their fourth victory in as many
starts was the proud record the
Rovers boasted of last night as
they batted their way to an 11-6
victory over the west-end Anchors
in a City Baseball League fixture.
Displaying the power at the
previous games, Whiskey McEach-
ern's crew last night came through
in the late innings to chalk up
their victory.
But for 5 innings and a half it
was a real ball game with the
Anchors coming from behind three
times to enter the last half of the
sixth on even terms at 5-5. But
here disaster struck for the Rovers,
centre gardener of the winners,
ignited the spark as he lashed out
a home run to deep left field after
the Anchor fielder had fallen in
his attempt to make a snatching
catch of the hard hit ball. Before
the side had been retired Rovers
combined three more hits and a
hit batsman for three additional
counters and the game was theirs.
The north-end team added another
brace of tallies in the last of the
sixth on Whittlock's triple, Mc-
Neill's single and an infield error
which the counters were not needed.
Anchors, battling desperately val-
lantly, lost the Rovers' hurler for
three safe blows in the first of
the ninth after the first man had
been retired, but the best they
could do was account for one run;
Larter was bearing down hard to
beat the final two hitters on strikes.
Emmer Larter, big righthander
was on the hill for the Rovers and
although nicked for ten safe blows
the speedball ace was stinging in
the pinches, leaving seven Anchor
runners stranded on the paths.
George Ayers, workhorse of the
Anchors' staff, was touched for
fourteen safeties during the en-
counter.

ORANGE, N. J., June 27 (AP)—

a boxing glove looks like, joined
husbands, fathers and older
brothers in speculating on Tony's
chances against heavyweight titel-
holder Joe Louis tomorrow night.
The stock question, as people
met on the streets, was: "How do
you think Tony will do?"
The usual answer was: "T. G.
will win."

Mayor Ovid Blanche, who pre-
dicted Galento will become champ-
ion at 11:16 P. M. ADT tomorrow,
said he expected at least one-
quarter of the city's 30,000 popu-
lation to be at the battle scene.
Attending in a body will be the
Tony Galento Association 250 of
whose members will travel in six
special buses to New York. The
Association—of which Tony is hon-
orary president—has engaged sev-
eral bands to escort the "new
champion" in a parade up-cen-
tral main street on his return
tomorrow night. The celebra-
tion, if there is one—will terminate in
Tony's North Day Street tavern,
where the genial host has ordered
"all drinks on the house."

Mayor Blanche has decreed an
official city holiday—if Tony wins.
But whether Galento wins or not,
Orange will have its celebration.
Over on the far side of town in
the negro section—plans have been
completed for a night of fun if
Louis beats the hometown boy.
