BRITAIN PUSHES MISSILE PROGRAM

LONDON (AP) — Britain outlined Tuesday her growing reliance on guided missiles for over-all defence and highly mobile tactical forces for use in limited warfare. A government white paper tabled in the House of Commons reported: 1. Bloodhound ground-to-air rockets are being deployed in an operational role to defend Britain's deterrent bases against air attack and a more advanced weapon with higher performance is being developed. 2. Development is proceeding of the Blue Streak missile. It is a British-made medium-range rocket with a reported range of 2,200 miles. 3. Work has begun on four guided missile ships for the Royal Navy. 4. Greater use of air-to-air guided missiles, especially in new aircraft coming into service during the year. 5. The army has started receiving deliveries of mobile anti-aircraft surface-to-air Thunder Bird missiles. Work is proceeding on the development of a more advanced version. Two artillery regiments have been equipped with the U.S.-developed Corporal guided missiles. New aircraft are being developed and brought into service to carry nuclear bombs, troops or mobile guided missile units. Many of these are well suited to limited war operations. SPENDING ESTIMATES The white paper estimates defence spending in the 1959-60 financial year will be £1,514,000,000 (\$4,239,000,000). This is £2,000,000 more than actual expenditures in the 1958-59 financial year. The white paper said that in addition to the growing stock of kiloton bombs, equivalent to 1,000 tons of TNT, production of megaton weapons, equivalent to 1,000,000 tons of TNT, is proceeding steadily. "The last series of British tests and the valuable exchange of information with the United States have enabled important technical advances to be made in the design of nuclear warheads," it said. "This will permit a significant increase of production." The development of flying bombs, to be launched from bombers, continues to progress satisfactorily. NUCLEAR SUBS On naval defence, the white paper noted that progress of the nuclear submarine project is being greatly advanced by the assistance of the U.S., from whom the first propulsion unit is being bought. The first of three new cruisers was to be commissioned next month. The three services are halfway to achieving the planned manpower reduction of 300,000 by 1962, when conscription is to end; the white paper reported.

CONTRACT BRIDGE

By R. JAY BECKER turned out to be divided 4-2, he came to an unhappy end, going down one. Our point is that declarer had a sure thing from the time the opening lead was made. Nothing could have defeated him had he played the hand correctly. No method of defense and no possible distribution of the adverse cards could prevent him from scoring nine tricks. What he should have done at trick two was lead the queen of hearts and overtake it with the king when West played low. He would thus have assured himself of three heart winners, regardless of where the ace and jack were located. No amount of ducking by either opponent could prevent the establishment of three of dummy's hearts into tricks. It must be said there is quite a natural reluctance to spend both the queen and king on one trick. But the failure to indulge in the expenditure constitutes parsimony which may later ricochet and prove to be as it did in this case—quite expensive. The view to be taken by declarer from the opening gong is that he had six high card tricks in spades, diamonds, and clubs, and that all he needs to do is manufacture three heart tricks. If this requires the play of the K-Q of hearts on one trick, the cost is cheap enough when it is considered that the contract thereby becomes certain.

Opening lead—jack of spades. We are taught to be prudent in our daily expenditures, and this admonition can also be applied with justification at the bridge table. But there are times when a seeming extravagance is justified by a particular set of circumstances and prodigality becomes a necessity, whether in life or in cards. South was playing three no-trump and got a spade lead. He won with the ace and led the Queen of hearts. West, North, and East playing low. He then tackled clubs, hoping the suit would break 3-3. But when the clubs
