INTERCOLONIAL EXTENSION.

Another Hitch in the Transfer of the Drummond Railway.

Blair Has "Other Fish to Fry."

MONTREAL, Dec. 31.—Another delay has taken place in connection with the extension of the Intercolonial Railway over the Drummond County Railway into Montreal. Some months ago it was said that the Drummond Railway could not be got ready in time to permit trains being run into Montreal before January first. It is now certain that it will be some time after that before service will be commenced.

Various reasons are advanced for the delay. A statement was circulated at first to the effect that there was some difficulty about bridges on the Drummond County road not coming up to the standard required by the Government bridge inspector. Now it is stated, however, that there is another and more serious reason for the hitch. It is that Hon. Mr. Blair has suddenly discovered that he wants to make the Canada Eastern Railway and the Gibson road in New Brunswick part of the Intercolonial; and while he has no objection to the Drummond County road, he wants the supporters of that company to pledge themselves to put the Canada Eastern deal through at the same. This has caused no little excitement among the promoters of the Drummond County deal, as they do not wish the success of their business jeopardized by any such conflicting proposition.

Mr. Blair, it is stated, figures that without the support of the Quebec members he could not accomplish his object and now he wants the two arrangements put through parliament together.

LOOKS LIKE BUSINESS.

Mobilization of the British Navy.

Reserve Force Called Out.

LONDON, Dec. 31.—A news agency announces that the British naval reserves will be mobilized. According to recent estimates the reserve forces of the British navy number about 28,000 men. Of this number it is calculated that at least 10,000 men would be required in case of war to complete the manning of the war-ships of Great Britain.

A BRITISH OFFICER MISSING.

Supposed to Be Killed Or a Prisoner.

CALCUTTA, Dec. 31.—Sir Henry Havelock Allen is missing from Fort Ali Musquid. He left that place on his horse. A search resulted in finding the horse stripped and shot and it is feared that Sir Henry is dead or a prisoner in the hands of Khalakki.

Panic in Japan.

LONDON, Dec. 31.—Japan is confronted with a financial crisis and a business panic due to the over-development of the country last year.

LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL

WINNIPEG, Dec. 29.—C. H. Beauchene, one of the editors of La Patrie, Montreal, has arrived here for the purpose of looking into the educational system of Manitoba in interests of Laurier government. He will also visit Territory.

St. Louis, Mo., Dec. 29.—Uncas, the last surviving son of Lexington, the celebrated race horse, died suddenly, near Crescent, Mo. His death was due to the rupture of a blood vessel. He was 22 years old.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—A despatch to the Times from Kassala says: After six days of siege and heroic defence, the Derrish post at O-obri has fallen. Many of the Derivishes were killed, and the remainder of the garrison fled, leaving all their property behind. O-obri is the last important place between here and Khartoum.

LONDON, December 30.—The Standard and the Daily News indulge in sarcastic comments this morning as to the probable increase in the cost of sealskin garments in America, owing to the new legislation. The Daily News asks what the shopkeepers will say when they find fair Americans coming to London for sealskin jackets. It adds: "The bill seems hardly made for enforcement; more likely it is intended to cover diplomatic retreat."

NEW YORK, Dec. 29.—John Bergan, a German, handsome, poor and unhappy in his love declarations, accosted policeman Fox last night with the remark: "Here Mr. Cop, take this body to the morgue." Bergan was standing on the steps of his home, 542 Third Avenue, and his words to the officer were scarcely understood by the latter before the man discharged a revolver into his mouth and fell dead. During the day, Bergan made his will, bequeathing his body to a medical college. It does not appear that the suicide was demented.

LONDON, Dec. 30.—A despatch to the Daily Mail from Singapore confirms the report of the seizure of Hai Nan island by the French. Hai Nan island is off the south coast of China, and separates the Gulf of Tonquin from the China Sea. It has an estimated area of 12,000 miles, and a population of 1,000,000 Chinese, exclusive of wild tribes in the interior. Some of the mountains in the centre rise above the snow line. It has several large rivers. The coasts are generally rocky; but the west coast is low, and the south coast has some good harbors. Timber is a principal product. This is sent to Annam, Siam and Singapore. The other exports are rice, sugar, wax, pearls, salt and a little gold and silver. Its capital is Kiong Choo, a populous city on its north coast.
