

Big Push Given Covehead Bridge

With completion date set for July 15, an all out effort is being made to have the Covehead bridge completed before the tourist season. Thirteen hundred cubic yards of concrete will be poured before the bridge is finally opened. The old Covehead bridge, which is part of the North Shore Road, is now being replaced by a pre-stressed concrete structure under MacNamara Construction of Nova Scotia Limited. This \$467,700.20 project, started on August 17, 1964, will replace the old wood structure which was swept away in the storm that lashed the Maritimes December 19, 1963.

Hurricane winds at that time hit a peak of 110 mph and swirled a 13 inch snow blanket into towering drifts that plugged highways solid, disrupted all forms of communication and isolated dozens of communities in the eastern end of the province.

Fishermen in the Covehead area said water in the bay was four feet higher than usual. Extreme ice conditions, along with high winds at that time carried 70 feet of deck into raging seas. Thirty eight feet was recovered. 19 feet were never found and 19 feet broke off but didn't go out.

Nova Stone, sub contractors for MacNamara, are currently operating from the eastside of the entrance to Covehead Bay. The new structure, when completed, will be 661 feet long by

Break Accused Elects Trial By Magistrate

Vote Total Low Despite Wards 4, 5

A heavy vote was recorded in last month's civic election in Wards 4 and 5.

Out of 686 eligible voters in Ward 4, 503 placed their ballots in the box.

In Ward 5 where the heaviest registration in the city takes place, 1,704 showed up at the poles out of 2,529 eligible voters.

Both of these wards saw election for councillors as well as Water commissioners, whereas in Wards 1, 2, 3 and 6 there was voting for water commissioners only.

The net result was only a disappointingly small turnout of voters in those four wards to drop the total percentage of eligible voters casting ballots to only 57.5 over the entire city. Total eligible voters in Charlottetown numbered 4,524 while the number voting was 2,620.

Veteran Of Two Wars Dies At 72

Death occurred at the P.E.I. Hospital, Wednesday, March 3, 1965, of Orrin Bell of Murray Harbor in his 72nd year.

Mr. Bell was born in Murray Harbor, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alex Bell and served overseas in both world wars. He was married to the former Nellie Clifford of Fitchburg, Mass.

Besides his wife he leaves to mourn, one daughter Ellen, also two brothers, Daniel and Robert, both residing in Murray Harbor. Several brothers and sisters predeceased him.

Remains are resting at the Murray River Funeral Home until Friday, then to the Murray Harbor United Church where funeral services will commence at 2 p.m. Legion service will be held at the grave with interment in Murray Harbor cemetery.
