DAIRY PRODUCE

Cheese Fairly Steady and Butter Rather Heavy.

According to the Gazette of Tuesday the receipts of cheese at Montreal the previous day were 12,303 boxes. The market rules about steady and, so far as business between traders, there was little to make a price. Fine Quebec Septembers could be quoted steady at 107-8 to 11 cents, and ditto Octobers, at 10½ to 10¾. At the wharf about 3,000 cheese were sold, and they ranged from 10½ to 10¾ with possibly the inside the ruling figure. The goods were late October make. The cable was unchanged.

The same paper says the receipts of butter were 1340 packages. The market was rather heavy in its disposition, and it understands that business was done in good sized lines of stock down to 20½. The advices from Great Britain are not very encouraging, the notable fact being heavy receipts in Australia. In fact, it is estimated that between now and the 27th November, there will be landed in Britain 123,757 packages of Australian butter.

THE PROVISION MARKET

Chicago Firm—Liverpool Quiet—Montreal Unchanged.

The Montreal Gazette of Tuesday says: There is no new feature in the provision market to note. The demand for most lines was fair at the following prices: Canadian short cut mess pork, \$16; short cut back, \$15.50; selected heavy short cut boneless mess, \$16.50; and heavy long cut mess, \$15.00 per barrel; pure Canadian lard in pairs, 7c to 7½ per lb; and compound refined at 5½ to 5¾ per lb. Hams, 12c to 13½, and bacon, 11½ to 12½ per lb.

Owing to the continued mild weather receipts of dressed hogs are still very small, there being only 15 received yesterday. The market is quiet and prices rule about steady at \$5.75 to \$6.25 per 100 lbs., in a jobbing way.

The Chicago market is firm. Pork closed \$8.15 November, \$8.20 December, \$9.75 January, \$9.80 May. Lard, \$5.07½ November, \$5.10 December, \$5.27½ January, \$5.42½ May. Short ribs, \$4.90 November, \$4.90 December, \$4.95 January.

There was no change in prices in the Liverpool provision market. Prime western pork, 57s 6d; prime western lard, 27s 6d; American refined lard, 29s 6d; long cut light bacon, 31s; long cut heavy, 30s.

CHARLOTTETOWN MARKETS

The buyers are paying 27½c for oats and 18 to 20c for potatoes. For five hogs they are paying 4½c for animals over 275 lbs, and 4c a lb for what are under that weight. Dressed hogs are worth from 5 to 5½c per lb. For eggs the buyers are offering 14½c, the market being quiet at that figure.

SILVER SPRING BREWERY

A Sherbrooke Industry Which Has Gained a Reputation in Three Years.

Expensive Machinery Recently Put in Makes it One of the Best Equipped Breweries in Canada.

While hundreds in all parts of the country know and appreciate the delicious flavors of the Silver Spring ales and porters, all have not been privileged to visit the brewery itself, see its wonderful and complete equipment and witness the remarkable process by which the far famed beverages of the Silver Spring Brewery are produced. A couple of hours' leisure time cannot be employed in a more agreeable manner than a visit to this establishment, where visitors are always sure of a cordial welcome by the proprietor, Mr. S. C. Nutter, and the members of his staff. The writer made a visit to the brewery the other day, and was shown over the establishment by Mr. Cyril Gwyn Brewer and Manager from London, England, who has had vast and valuable experience in some of the largest and best breweries abroad, and is thoroughly versed in the most modern style of brewing all classes of ales and porters.

Two things struck him most forcibly, viz. the cleanliness and neatness manifested in all parts of the brewery and the new and apparently very expensive machinery, which had been installed since our last visit to the place, some two years ago. This consists of the mechanical refrigeration plant and the carbonating plant. Both these were put in last spring at a cost of over \$11,000.

REFRIGERATION PLANT.

The Mechanical Refrigeration Plant, or the Ice Machinery, was installed by the Linde British Refrigeration Company. It equips the whole brewery, and is a wonderful and interesting arrangement. By it all parts of the brewery are kept in any temperature desired. All the liquids could be frozen into a solid

block of ice, even during the hottest months. Large tanks of ice water kept at the freezing point supply the attenuaters in the large vats. A continual flow of a two inch stream, night and day, is required for this. The Silver Spring Brewery's Refrigeration Plant is the best that could be procured and expense has not been spared in this connection.

CARBONATING PLANT.

The Carbonating Plant, or as it is generally called, "The New Process" is composed of steam pumps and large copper coolers, connected with the ice machinery, which chills the ale to the freezing point. It passes from this to the carbonator and from thence to a very large and powerful filter and from there to a handsome German silver racking machine through which the beer passes to the barrels under pressure and is never exposed to the air. This plant together with the ice machinery has completed the equipment and made the Silver Spring Brewery thoroughly up-to-date.

CARBONATED BEER.

In the cold storage several very large storage vats made of Cypress wood, and equipped with the Heiser manhole door have been put in especially for the new process for manufacture of brilliant filtered, carbonated beer. This has been discovered by experts to be the most healthful beer in existence. The powerful filter strips every particle of yeast and clogging substance from the beer and leaves it as brilliant as champagne, and in their stead is amalgamated with the beer, natural carbonic acid gas which is received in steel tubes from a large New York brewery, which has a special plant, which cost some \$40,000, for collecting the natural carbonic acid gas from large fermenting vats and compressed in these steel tubes at a pressure of 1500 lbs to the square inch. This natural beer gas through the influence of the carbonator takes the place of the yeast in the beer, and it is therefore claimed that this beer is the height of purity. Such is the Silver Spring Brewery ale.

The branch of porter known as the Silver Spring Cream Porter has grown into popularity so fast that special brews have to be made weekly. Some of the best hospitals in the United States as well as Canada order this porter. Doctors in all of the leading cities of Canada prescribe it freely in all cases of debility and for convalescence.

None of the cheap malt extracts sold at a much higher price ever give the same results. Porters as a rule are not brewed and are perhaps not as healthful as ale, but the Silver Spring Porter is brewed from roasted malt, imported direct from John Plukett & Co., Dublin, Ireland, and Hugh Baird of Glasgow, Scotland, malt roasters for Guinness Sons & Co., Ltd., porter brewers, Dublin, Ireland.

SILVER SPRING AGENCIES.

The Silver Spring Brewery has agencies in all towns of any importance in the Province of Quebec, including the cities of Montreal and Quebec, also at Riviere du Loup, some 200 miles below the latter city. In the Maritime Provinces the trade has grown very rapidly. Agencies in these provinces so far, have been established at St. John and Fredericton, N. B., Amherst, Pictou, Stellarton, N. S., Sydney, C. B., and Charlottetown, P. E. I. Mr. A. Macdonald wholesaler, "Leith House," 32 to 38, Queen St., Charlottetown has been appointed sole agent for Prince Edward Island, and will receive the Ales and Porter by the car load in a variety of sizes of solid oak packages. All orders and enquiries in regard to supplies should be addressed to him as above. It is estimated that this latter trade will take fifty car loads of the Silver Spring's ale and porter within the next two months. At the present time, for full shipments, the brewery has over 30 car loads of beer to be shipped within the next six weeks.

The Silver Spring Brewery was established by Mr. S. C. Nutter just three years ago, and we are informed that it pays out in wages some \$16,500 annually. It is not a bonded industry and is not exempted from taxes. The whole plant is considered by brewery men who understand the business to be one of the most up-to-date brewery plants in Canada.

OUTSIDE AS WELL AS INSIDE.

Not only inside the establishment is everything the best that can be procured but outside as well, as is manifested by the fine pair of Percheron horses, which are every day seen upon our streets. They are probably the finest in Canada. Another pair were received last week from Indiana. These won all the first premiums in their class at the leading fairs of that state this fall. The harness and wagons at the stables is kept in first class order, in keeping with the balance of the brewery plant.

The Silver Spring Brewery establishment, from the "Silver Spring" from which the clearest and purest waters are drawn and from which the beautiful horses which haul the finished product to the station, everything is a credit to the proprietor and to the city of which it is one of the most prosperous industries.
