Instructive Talk On Tuberculosis At Summerside

Dr. E. M. Found, provincial director of chest clinics delivered an interesting and instructive address on the "diagnosis, prevention and care of tuberculosis" on Tuesday evening in the Summerside Presbyterian Hall to registered nurses, student nurses and other interested people.
Mrs. G. A. Bohner, matron of the Prince County Hospital presided. In giving an overall picture of the problem of tuberculosis across America and across the world the speaker stated that in the year 1900 two hundred out of every 100,000 Canadians who died were victims of this disease, and in 1947 the death rate in the same group was 38 per 100,000, which should be encouraging.
However, in spite of this low rate, there were some 5,500 deaths from this preventable disease in Canada in 1947. Dr. Found stressed the importance of education of the public with the idea in view of directing patients to the diagnostic clinics through the three main channels: the family doctor, public health nurse and the mobile unit. The speaker paid tribute and great praise to the pioneering work carried on through the years by such clinicians as Dr. Brink, now director of the Ontario Tuberculosis Association, Dr. Wherret, now secretary, Canadian Tuberculosis Association, and others who conducted travelling clinics which were organized and supervised by Miss Mona Wilson and her staff.

After 1929 this work was continued and expanded by our present Director of Tuberculosis Control, Dr. P. A. Creelman, through whose tenacious efforts and constant vigilance we now have a set-up for tuberculosis control which is up-to-date and abreast of all the provinces in the Dominion.
Without the close cooperation of our Minister of Health and Welfare, Hon. A. W. Matheson, along with his deputy, Col. P. S. Fielding, and without the foresight of Dr. Harold Shaw, chairman of the Health Planning Board, our program could never have advanced as it has in the past two years.
The education effort on P. E. I. has been greatly advanced by the sale of TB Christmas Seals. Undergraduate and affiliate training for nurses is of paramount importance, not only for the sick but as a protection for themselves. It is now universally accepted that this disease is not hereditary, but rather contracted by contact with an active infected case.
The disease can be prevented and if discovered early can be treated and cured. Dr. Found stressed the importance of B. C. G. vaccination, checking of contacts and especially sanatorium care where through the cooperation of well trained personnel every attempt is made to bring about an arrest of the patient's disease. The Provincial Sanatorium at Charlottetown is a well organized institution where modern treatment is carried on through the coordination and cooperation of the Sanatorium Commission, the superintendent and two staff physicians, a part time surgeon and anaesthetist, a nursing orderly, dietary, housekeeping, laundry and engineering staff; also an X-ray technician, a school teacher, an occupational therapist, a rehabilitation officer and several stenographers as well.

The Sanatorium treatment may be outlined under three main divisions: 1. Routine nursing care, regular rest under medical supervision, fresh air, full nutritious diet, education, occupational therapy and vocational training leading to rehabilitation. 2. Medical treatment - antibiotics. 3. Surgical treatment - collapse or immobilization of the affected area in the body, also resection of affected areas when indicated.
In closing the speaker presented a report relative to their tuberculosis work in 1949 as carried out by a program which had been previously outlined. -S
