planned for the fiscal year which began April 1.

Bulk of the added estimates are concerned with defence production and stock-piling. As promised by Prime Minister St. Laurent last week, the estimates included \$7,100,000 to be distributed among universities on a population and attendance basis, and \$1,500,000 to tide the CBC over immediate financial difficulties.

Pensions legislation was the main task of the day and it included a bill to put pensions for the blind in a separate act providing a "blindness allowance" widening the scope of its application.

Heretofore a blind person, to be eligible for the allowance, must have had 30 years residence in Canada. This is now reduced to 10 years and will bring in about 3,000 additional pensioners making a total of about 10,000.

The allowance otherwise closely matches the old age pensions provisions, being subject to agreements with the provinces sharing in the costs. Up to now the assistance to the blind was provided for in old age pension legislation.

The new old age pensions legislation changes the system under which the provinces now pay 25 per cent of the pensions cost and handle the administration while the Federal Treasury pays 75 per cent. It will now be on a straight 50-50 basis with the provinces retaining the administration.
