### S'side Council Enacts Taxi Cab Regulations

Strict regulations governing the operation of taxi cabs in Summerside were passed last night at the regular monthly meeting of town council. While the councillors felt the regulations were long overdue it was also felt that certain portions of the new by-law were a bit stringent and they were deleted before the final draft was passed.  
After some discussion a section which would prohibit taxi drivers from using tobacco while driving and from taking or picking up fares at premises where liquor is illegally sold was removed from the by-law, it was felt the no smoking rule was unnecessarily harsh and since the council has not been able to act under the law against bootlegging, this form of selling liquor cannot be officially recognized.  
In future all Summerside taxi cabs will be numbered and will bear distinctive number plates while drivers will be equipped with numbered badges, which they must wear at all times while on duty. Owners of cabs must be able to provide financial responsibility before being licensed and the license fee of \$25 per year will remain unchanged. However a driver's license fee of \$5 annually will be charged in addition.

### CN Official Explains Transportation Plan

Canadian National Railways is still hoping it will be able to introduce an integrated railway service which will include freight schedules and passenger service from Prince Edward Island by 34 hours.  
Mention of the railway's aspirations was made in a speech to the Charlottetown Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by R. H. Tivy, chief and superintendent of transportation for CN's Atlantic region.  
Mr. Tivy said the proposed service could not be instituted until the railway was granted an "ex" trucking license. The company has an application before the Provincial Public Utilities Commission.  
Mr. Tivy added that without the license it would not be possible for the railway to offer piggyback service to the province either.  
He said piggyback — the transportation of loaded truck trailers on railway flat cars for long hauls — had been instituted in the other Maritime provinces. Piggyback had proved so successful it was predicted 10 per cent of all rail freight would move this way in the future.  
His speech was chiefly directed to members of the rotary club in rail transportation, and some of the solution found by Canadian National.  
Mr. Tivy said all the railway could offer the country was "service", a commodity which could not be stored, nor kept in inventory.  
It had to be able to offer the maximum of service at a moment's notice, and consequently could not cut down on plant staff when business was slow.

No more tax stands on the street will be permitted to operate and the existing ones will be required to move should the council so order. Cabs must not be used for fares except during the early morning or late afternoon.  
**CAN'T REFUSE**  
Cabbies may demand their fares be paid in advance, but are not allowed to refuse to carry any orderly person once the fare is tendered. A charge of 10 cents for carrying parcels is allowed and a similar charge for each case of beer carried provided for in the by-law.  
A schedule of taxi rates was also included in the lengthy legislation. The basic fares remain unchanged at 40 cents for most calls in the town limits and 50 cents for the fringe areas. An additional charge of 10 cents is included for second passengers at different stops.  
The by-law follows recommendations made recently by Police Chief S. D. A. Wamamaker, to the effect taxi cabs in Summerside needed more control and councillors said last night that a number of complaints had been received from citizens about cars being in a dirty shape and not in good shape mechanically.

### S'side Court Has 3 Cases

## Housing Surplus Seen In S'side Area

Summerside Town Council last night discussed the housing situation in Summerside, as it affects RCAF personnel here following a recent meeting of landlords at which concern was expressed that a housing surplus now exists.  
After meeting with Group Capt. A.G. Daig, commanding officer of RCAF Station Summerside, council had gained the impression that the situation would likely level off and no large surplus would exist, since personnel at the station are to be increased and more married men will be posted here as a housing becoming readily available, Coun. George Key reported.  
Remainder of the meeting consisted mainly of discussion of the routine reports of the various town departments and they showed November had been a most active month.  
Good progress is being made on installation of the new electric generator, and the building extension which is to house it is nearing completion.  
Report of the police chief revealed a total 50 cases have been prosecuted in court during the month and 87 convictions obtained. Of these 38 charges were for drunkenness, nine for illegal possession of liquor and eight for impaired driving. The police department collected a total of \$2,593 in fines and licenses during November and investigated 29 motor accidents. An increase in the number of offences coming under the Criminal Code was noted, including a number of cases of attempted break, entry and theft.  
**READY FOR SNOW**  
Speaking on public works, Coun. Herbert Schurman advised that all plans for winter snow clearance have been completed, with plows assigned to zoned areas and all equipment in first class condition. Public works during November included the paving of a number of streets at Hileret.  
Coun. Alex MacDonald said his water and sewer committee is working the new regulations governing this utility before submitting them to the Public Utilities Commission for approval.  
The finance report revealed the current service tax for Nov. 30 had reached \$503,923 or 82 per cent of the tax roll. Approximately \$50,000 is still owing for taxes on motor vehicles, poll tax, and education and personal property levy and a determined effort to collect will be made.  
**TO REMOVE PLATES**  
The police were ordered to remove license plates from cars on which the tax has not been paid starting Jan. 1.  
The fire department reported five alarms were answered during the month and damage was negligible in three of these. In the other two a house on Bedford Row was badly gutted and a car sustained severe engine damage. Coun. Garnet Ross expressed commendation to several wives of firemen who had telephoned members of the department when a recent alarm was sounded late at night, and some of the fire fighters had been unable to hear the alarm.  
He said the ladies have provided this protection service as a public duty.  
**EXHIBITION GAME**  
The Civic Stadium report showed November was a profitable month for the rink and if December followed the same pattern, the stadium will be well within its allotted budget. It is hoped to get a senior hockey team from Moncton to play an exhibition game here on Boxing Day. Stadium Manager Chas. Hogg reported.

### Beef Prices Are Quoted

The price for Red brand cattle is down 25 cents per 100 pounds this week at \$44.50 not dressed weight on a rail grade basis. The price for Blue brand steers is the same at \$43.50, and the price for Brown brand is up 25 cents, at \$40.50. The prices are made available by J. Lincoln Dewar, secretary of the committee named by the beef producers association. The agreement was that the price formula agreed to on a trial basis with Canada Packers. The formula suggested by the nationally known firm be tried out for a period of up to one year.

### Rangers Top Windsor 11-2

**NEW GLASGOW (CP)** — New Glasgow Rangers drubbed Windsor Maple Leafs 11-2 here Monday in a dull Nova Scotia Senior Hockey League game played before 778 fans, lowest number to watch an NHL game here this season.  
The win left New Glasgow two points behind second-place Amherst Ramblers in the five-team league. Other clubs were idle Monday.  
Darryl McMillan paced the Rangers with four goals and two assists. The fast-skating forward now leads the league's scoring race with 27 goals.  
Rangers built up a 10-0 lead before Windsor's Jimmy Beckman fired two quick goals late in the third. It was 1-0 at the end of the first and 6-0 at the end of the second.  
Bob Serviss and Yves Sarrazin each picked up two. Other Ranger scorers were Jack Pelgerne, Stu Young and Ralph Cameron.  
Rangers outshot Leafs 31-27.

### Hornsby Has Eye Ailment

**CHICAGO (AP)** — Rogers Hornsby, 46, veteran big league baseball star who had broke Friday after he underwent a minor eye operation, was reported Monday in fair condition.  
Hornsby won a place in baseball's Hall of Fame for his outstanding batting performances. A second baseman, before he joined the ranks of managers, he has been called the greatest right-hitter of all time.  
He played with St. Louis Cardinals, New York Giants, Boston Braves and Chicago Cubs and managed the now defunct St. Louis Browns, the former Cubs, Cincinnati Reds and the Cubs.

### Island Man Dies in West

**CALGARY (CP)** — Funeral services will be held here today for Maj. E. I. H. Ings, who died in Edmonton Dec. 12 at the age of 71.  
Maj. Ings, born in Charlottetown, graduated from Trinity College School, Toronto, and Royal Military College, Kingston, Ont. He served as a king in the First World War and was stationed in Canada during the Second World War.  
He is survived by his wife, Katharine.

### To Retire His Uniform

**PHILADELPHIA (AP)** — The big green No. 80 uniform of Chuck Bednarik of Philadelphia Eagles will be retired to the professional Football Hall of Fame in Canton, Ohio.  
Bednarik retired from the National Football League Sunday after the Eagles' last game, against St. Louis Cardinals. He had played 14 years. He plans to work full time as a cement mason.  
The former member of Pennsylvania All-American from Bethlehem, Pa., probably had his greatest year in 1960 when he led the Eagles to the world championship.  
Eagles finished in last place in the Eastern Conference this season.

### Braves Play Boston Sox

**COOPERSTOWN, N.Y. (AP)** Boston Red Sox and Milwaukee Braves will play in the 1963 major league baseball Hall of Fame game in Cooperstown Aug. 5, it was announced Monday.  
This will mark the 21st retirement of the series that began in 1940. The National League leads 10 victories to nine with one game ending in a tie.

## No Change Seen In Prince County

**SUMMERSIDÉ** — No seats were lost in Prince County as the result of yesterday's declaration day results. The official count was given by Peter M. McCull, Ellerslie, returning officer.  
However, many candidates found themselves minus a number of votes when the official count was completed.  
In Fourth Prince, H. Macdonald (PC) ended with 1,702 votes, a loss of 96 from his election day total. His opponent George Mackay (Lib.) received an official count of 2,175 a total of 84 votes.  
A loss of 59 votes was suffered by F. Jardine, Liberal, in Fourth Prince when an official count of 1,713 was made. His opponent N. Reeves (PC) received a count of 1,411, a loss of 56. Mr. Jardine ended with a majority of 302, a loss of 13.  
The only other loser was Hubert Gaudet (PC) in 1st Prince, who lost 10 votes from his election day total of 1,823.

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
