APPOINT OBSERVERS

VATICAN CITY (AP)—The Vatican secretary for Christian unity announced Monday the appointment of an American engineer and a British priest as its observers to the World Methodist council to be held in London Aug. 18 to 26.

They are Daniel Meaney of Corpus Christi, Tex., secretary-treasurer of the U.S. National Council of Catholic Men, and Rt. Rev. Anthony Hulme, rural dean of the Roman Catholic diocese of Bedford, England.
