

### Debate Blood Vs. Tomato Juice In Court Case

MONTREAL (CP)—Judge Willie Proulx ruled Tuesday that something is difficult to distinguish between blood and tomato juice and acquitted two men in court on charges of disturbing the peace.

Police said the trouble apparently started when Emile Derible 46, decided to take some flowers to his estranged wife who often visited a north-end market.

"She wasn't there when I arrived so I left the flowers with another woman to give to her," De-rible, accused of disturbing the peace by fighting, told the judge.

"When I returned a few hours later, my wife, sitting in a truck, started throwing tomatoes at me," he added. "Then all of a sudden I was knocked cold and I woke up the next morning."

**STRICTLY SELF-DEFENCE**

Derible blamed Germain De-vezze, 48, for the blow.

Devezze, accused of assault, testified he was behind his vegetable stall when the tomatoes started flying.

"Derible kept picking tomatoes and cucumbers from my stall to throw at his wife," he said. "And when I told him to stop, he punched me in the stomach. I might have hit him but it was strictly in self-defence."

Judge Proulx freed both men after proving them the benefit of the doubt.

### CONTRACT BRIDGE By B. Jay Becker

(Top Record-Holder in Masters' Individual Championship Play)

North dealer. Both sides vulnerable

**NORTH**

Opening lead—two of hearts.  
The number 13 carries a connotation of bad luck to many people of superstitious bent. The bridge player who is reluctant to dabble with this sinister number is well advised to give up the game if he has serious ambitions to advance his skill.

He cannot have failed to notice that the number persists in playing an important role in the best of all card games. Thus, each player is dealt 13 cards; there are 13 of each suit; the number of possible tricks is 13.

Some of the so-called bad luck to which a great many bridge players attribute unlucky results is actually traceable to a failure to take full advantage of the profound influence the number 13 plays.

Let's show how West gains a trick by making good use of this trick. South won East's jack of hearts with the king and led the queen of spades which lost to the king. The ten of hearts return held the trick and another heart was ruffed by declarer. South then lost the jack of spades to the king and the time for cogitation by West had come. He knew declarer had started with exactly two hearts. He knew also declarer started with eight spades.

How? Because East and North had only one each and he himself three. Therefore, since there were 13 in the deck, South had the missing eight spades.

Also, South had been dealt 13 cards, of which it was now known ten were in spades and hearts. Therefore, his remaining three cards were in diamonds and clubs.

If West incorrectly leads a heart, he subjects himself to an endplay because declarer cashes all his trumps, reducing West to the ace of clubs and two diamonds. A club lead then would compel a diamond return into declarer's A-Q.

Instead, West should cash his club ace and then lead a heart, and sit and wait for his king of diamonds. The play of the club ace cannot lose, regardless of how South's three odd cards are divided.

How does West know all this? Right? Just by employing the number 13.

### London Times In Comment On P-C Leadership

LONDON (Reuters)—The London Times says Canada's Progressive Conservative party should find an able successor to George Drew, who recently resigned as its leader.

"Electorally," the paper says, "the eight years of Mr. Drew's leadership have not been successful, but he has laid foundations on which a Conservative revival might be built."

But, the paper says, "his most important contribution has been to make the party a force once more in the Province of Quebec, where, with a modest exception in 1930, it has been of no account since 1911."

"His imperialist flavor and support of conscription in two world wars had alienated French-speaking voters; and there were few who believed that Mr. Drew, who was particularly associated with these things, would be the man to win them back."

"He has done so largely by taking up the old Liberal policy of provincial rights."

"His other contribution has been to make his party alive to the dangers of Canada's increasing dependence on exports."

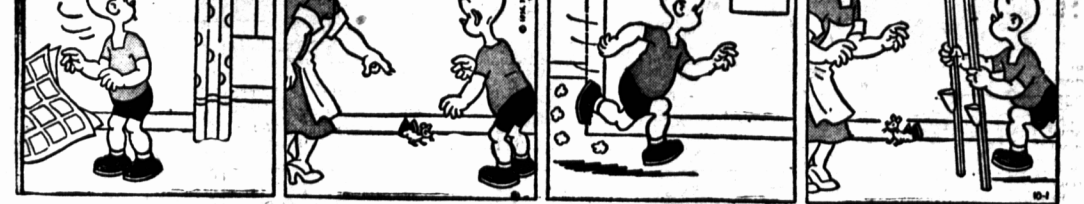
