

# U.S. Takes 2-0 Lead Over Canada In Davis Cup Play

TORONTO (CP) — The United States Friday ran up a commanding 2-0 lead over Canada in their North American zone semi-final Davis Cup round as Whitney Reed of Alameda, Calif., defeated Canadian champion Bob Bedard of Sherbrooke, Que., 9-7, 6-2, 6-4 in the second singles of the five-match series.

Reed, 25, ranked eighth in the U.S. and playing in his first Davis Cup competition was given a rousing battle by the 27-year-old Bedard. The Canadian never quit trying and came close to winning the extended first set.

Bedard, noted for his retrieving ability, was unable to match the stroking power of his American opponent. Reed, unruffled at all times, was the more polished player at the net and was able to play a forcing game throughout.

He never lost his service as he came through to crack Bedard's serve four times, once in the first, twice in the second and once in the third.

U.S. LED 1-0

The U.S. went into Friday's match leading 1-0 on Barry McKay's victory over Don Fontana of Toronto in the opening singles Thursday. The second singles between Reed and Bedard was postponed until Friday.

The doubles, originally scheduled Friday, now is to be played today and the two concluding singles on Monday. The winner of the best-of-five series will advance into the final round of the North American zone against either Argentina, British West Indies or Israel. The victor of this final will take on the European zone winner for the right to meet the defending champions, Australia, in the challenge round next December.

Reed played exceptionally well in coming through with a victory in his first Davis Cup test. He served with shattering effect and along with his volleying it kept him on the offensive in each set.

The big service break in the opening set that led to his ultimate victory came in the 15th game after each held their own serves for 14 games. A double-fault by Bedard after the score went to deuce in the 15th game opened the way for Reed.

The American went on to take two straight points with a passing shot and a backhand placement to break through.

SO NEAR, SO FAR

Twice in the preceding game Bedard was within a single point of breaking Reed's service and winning the set. Each time, however, Reed came up with big shots that dashed the hopes of Bedard.

Bedard fought tenaciously in the final game of the third set ahead 3-2 with a service break in the fifth game. Bedard scored love victories on his next two services to make it 5-4. He then forced Reed to deuce five times in the final game on the American's service before Reed managed to win the game.

The American broke through in the third and seventh games to win the second set. The third game went to deuce twice before he won it and in the third Bedard was unable to get a single point on his own service as Reed won the game with a love decision.

# Aussies Favored In B.E. Games

CARDIFF (CP) — It wouldn't surprise many people if Australian athletes won 40 of the 92 British Empire Games gold medals at stake July 18-26 to make the greatest one-country haul in the 28-year history of this Commonwealth sports extravaganza.

The svelte green-clad Aussies are the world's fastest hurdlers in the water and on land at distances from 100 yards to a mile.

The Aussies have a simple explanation for their world-recognized greatness: Sacrifice of pleasure for hard work.

"That's the only reason we've reached the top," team manager Bill Young said in an interview Friday at St. Athan, an RAF station converted into an Empire Village for athletes 17 miles west of this Welsh capital.

"We'll win these games because this team is the greatest we've ever entered in international competition, including the 1956 Olympics," Young said. "We won 20 gold medals with 75 athletes in the 1954 Vancouver games and there's no earthly reason why we shouldn't double that with our 109-athlete team here."

His mile from where he went away, must have been a second faster, Connie French (Sid Stead) was a close third, and Royal Train (Chappell) was a fourth.

In the sixth dash, with the same field, Gallant Way trotted beautifully for driver Don Seaman to win, with Connie French finishing a close second in 2:18. Winning owners were: Blake Hanover, Stanley Mayhew, Kin-kona; Gallant Way, Andrew Perry, Summerside.

FROM BEHIND

Propane, driven by G. Kenny and owned by Frank Arnett of Summerside, came from behind in the latter part of the mile to win from a good field in 2:14 2/5, and in the seventh dash, with the same field Murphy's Abbe, (C. O'Brien) surprised and delighted his friends by stepping the last half in about 1:06 to win from Propane in 2:17. Murphy's Abbe is owned by Charlie O'Brien, Covehead.

Great interest was taken in dashes 5 and 8, and it was Taurida Bay, driven by Joey Arsenault, that headed stable companion Jolly Jim (Joe Hennessey) in 2:14. The real excitement came in the last dash of the night when Jolity Leigh, driven by Harold Stead, uncorked the type of speed that he showed last season, winning in 2:11 1/5 to equal his record. Jolity Jim was second and Jolly Dick (H. Poulton) was third. A great deal of the credit for the fast time is due to Downtown, driven by youthful J. Bernard, who stepped the first half in close to 1:03 and finished fourth. Taurida Bay owned by Ray Stewart, Murray Harbour, and Jolity Leigh by the Mapco Stable, Summerside.

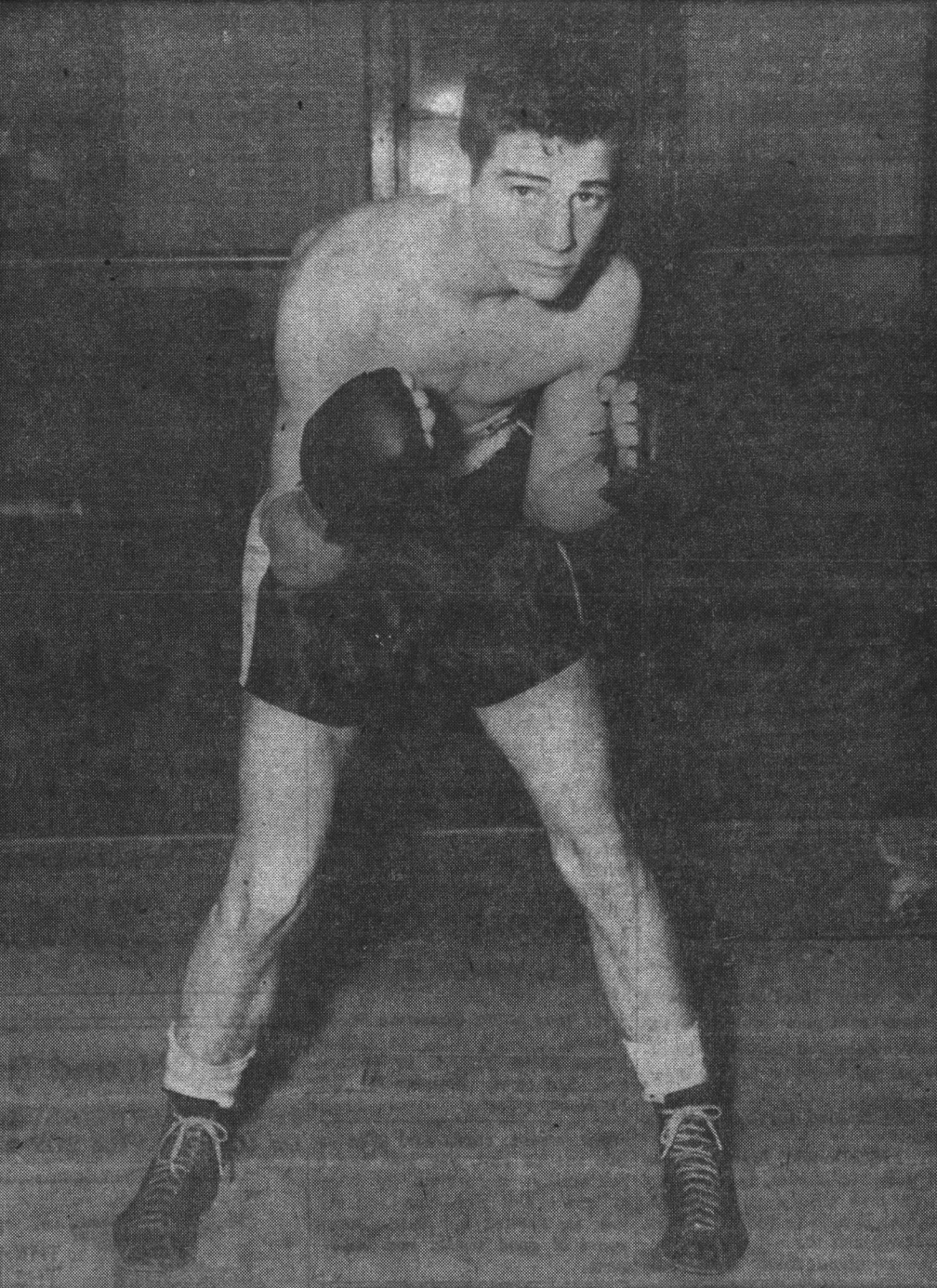

Time after time Ortega bulled Mickey to the ropes and fired away with both hands. At long range Crawford was able to score points with his quick moves but he was outmanned inside.

There were no knockdowns in the interesting match that swung back and forth in the early rounds and finally appeared to lean in Ortega's favor.

The two judges voted for Ortega but referee Mark Conn scored it a lopsided 7-3 for Crawford. Judge Harold Barnes had Ortega on top 8-2 and Judge Leo Birnbaum voted 6-4 for the Mexican. The Associated Press was 7-2-1 for Ortega. Most of the crowd seemed to agree with the judges.

A ringside poll of boxing writers showed 8 of 12 thought Ortega won it.
