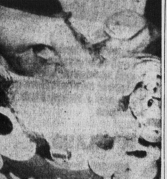

The Greek Line said the next group of survivors will not reach London until the Arkadia arrives Sunday morning.

Meanwhile, 1,000 miles away, the Lakonia continued to smolder. A Norwegian salvage tug, the Herkules took the fire-spattered tug in tow about 185 miles northeast of Madeira. Two Portuguese tug boats stood by to help if necessary to ease the vessel over the grey Atlantic rollers to a port.

Weather in the sea was getting worse as the vessel was off. The Greek liner Centaur signalled a final "well done" to other rescue ships and headed for Gibraltar with its tragic cargo of dead fish from the sea.
