## SIR CHARLES TUPPER

TUESDAY last was the forty-fifth anniversary of Sir Charles Tupper's entrance into public life. His friends in Parliament took advantage of the occasion to place on his desk a vase containing a collection of beautiful roses, maidenhair ferns and forty-five rose-buds for the forty-five years the veteran statesman has been occupied in the public service.

Upon his entry into the House Sir Charles was warmly greeted by the honorable members on both sides. He made a felicitous acknowledgement of the beautiful gift and kindly demonstration, after which the Leader of the Government, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, delivered a short speech in the course of which he said:

"I am sure, though I have no right to speak in this House except for one side of it, that on this occasion I voice the sentiments not only of those who are here present, but of the whole Canadian people, when I express our pleasure that we are able to see this day and to congratulate my hon. friend, the leader of the Opposition upon the completion of the forty-fifth year of this public service to his country. (Applause.) It is one of the blessings of political life that it is possible sometimes to forget that we are divided in opinion. It is one of the redeeming features of public life that, though our fights are keen and sometimes bitter, still after all we can realize that beneath, or I should say, above, there are nobler sentiments that guide us. 'I do not share the views of my hon. friend on many questions. Those who are associated with me have taken issue with him upon many matters of public interest, but I am proud and glad to bear this testimony to the public career of my hon. friend that, though I might take exception to it in many ways, it will live and live for the best in the history of Canada. (Cheers.)"

"It has been his good fortune to be associated in some of the great events of his time; it has been his fortune to be associated with the great event which brought Canada to the proud position it now occupies, which brought it from the condition of diverse, scattered provinces to that of a united nation. (Applause.)"

These words of Sir Wilfrid are a pleasing testimony to the truth that great ability and high character will be recognized and may at times be admitted even by those who are most unwilling to do so. We unite in the congratulations that are being showered upon the veteran and venerable Leader of the Opposition, and trust that he may be spared to lead the government of this country back to safe paths.

## "A MISERABLE ARGUMENT."

THE JOURNAL, of Montreal, is one of the leading French-Canadian newspapers of Canada, and it cannot be suspected of complicity with any of those who are disposed to insult or even to depreciate the French-Canadian race or nationality.

Le Journal has taken an intelligent interest in the Prince Edward Island crisis. Here is what it says concerning the action of Pineau and the chief argument by which it is supported:

"The Liberals of Prince Edward Island are just now resorting to one of the most miserable of arguments in defence of Pineau, who has betrayed the party that he was elected to support. They say that those who denounce him insult the French-Canadian race! Not long since, in Montreal, the same language was adopted in regard to those who stood charged with boodling and putting their hands into the municipal treasury: 'Do not touch them', their accomplices would cry out, 'they are Canadians.' But these rascally fellows lower to the last degree their nationality when they try to cover with its colours the traitors and thieves who unfortunately are accounted in its bosom."

We are glad to note that our esteemed contemporary is in complete accord with THE EXAMINER concerning this matter. French-Canadians are, out of regard for the character of their race, in duty bound to condemn, punish and vote out the French-Canadian traitors and boodlers.

## WHAT ARE THE PEOPLE TO THINK?

PREMIER FARQUHARSON has not denied that he agreed with Mr. Wise to open the Second District of Queen's; and Mr. Pineau has not explained why he joined the Farquharson party. What are the people to think about the matter?

### NOTES AND COMMENTS.

—The Mail and Empire quotes portions of Mr. Wise's address to his electors, and intimates that "Sir Louis' garrison" is in danger.

—Sir Louis Davies had the hardihood to contend in the House of Commons, a few days ago, that the fishing regulations were never so rigidly enforced as now!

—Unless we are misled by the name, Colonel Mahon is another Irishman, and unless we are misled by the face, Colonel Plumer is still another,—remarks the Mail and Empire.

—In the supplementary estimates the only item particularly interesting to P. E. Island are China Point wharf \$700; and Prince Edward Island Railway \$20,000!

—President McKinley did the right thing in respect to the Boer delegates. It will be interesting to note its effect upon the free and independent electors of the United States.

—The French government was recently sustained, in the Chamber of Deputies, by a decisive vote; and the Dreyfus matter, which was re-animated by the Opposition, is regarded as settled.

—The revenue of Egypt last year amounted to over £11,000,000 sterling. There was a surplus of £400,000. These results are accompanied by decreased taxation. They are the proof of increasing prosperity under British rule.

—Bishop Hartzell told a Chicago audience that every black man in America and every friend of the black man in all the world should pray for the success of the British arms in South Africa, and his thousand auditors made the building ring with cheers.

—It is interesting to learn that the lioness which Mr. Cecil Rhodes sent to President Kruger, and which was returned, had two cubs. It is probable that

two British African lions may be added to the list of Britain's procreations as a result of Kruger's refusal to deal justly with the British people in South Africa and his invasion of British rights and territories.

—The expenditures of the Laurier-Tarte Government for the year ending 30th June next will amount to \$54,767,763. Think of it, independent farmers who responded to the cry of "extravagance" raised against the Conservatives who expended \$36,000,000 to \$40,000,000 a year!

—The St. Paul Trade Journal tells of a man who sat at his desk ripping open his morning mail. It included many circulars, which were tossed unread into the wastebasket. After the last circular had been disposed of, the merchant said, "We have determined to change our method of advertising this year. We are going to send out circulars and write soliciting letters, and send out thousands of hand-ome catalogues instead of advertising in newspapers."

—Premier Farquharson's conduct is proving too odious for some of the more respectable Liberals. The St. John Globe mildly expresses its judgment, thus: "In Prince Edward Island the political situation remains unchanged. The government has a majority of one in the legislature and expects to carry on the business with safety through the session, but this will not be an easy task. Meanwhile there is one vacant seat, besides the seat vacated by the absence in British Columbia of Mr. Peters."

—In an editorial on the Queen's birthday, the "Journal," of Montreal says: "In the course of its long and perilous pilgrimage throughout centuries, history has seen many a powerful sovereign rise among nations to preside over their more or less ephemeral destinies; but nevertheless the reign of Her Majesty remains one of those that most profoundly strike the thinker with wonder and one that will leave imperishable monuments in the memory of nations and in the annals of the present age. If it be true that presently the constitutional regime which governs Great Britain simply leaves a semblance of initiative in the hands of the sovereigns whom birth calls to royalty, it is equally true that Victoria, by her high intelligence, her domestic and social virtues, her profound knowledge of politics, has been able to exercise over her century, her court, her government and her people an undeniable influence and to give to events, with an efficiency the more constant since it was exclusively based on kindness and persuasion, a solid direction towards the realization of a perfectly well defined political ideal."
