

# Detroit, Boston, Toronto Leafs Win NHL Games Sat.

DETROIT (AP)—Detroit Red Wings killed Chicago's hopes for a National Hockey League playoff berth Saturday night when they shut out Black Hawk 2-0.

The shutout was the 12th of the season for Glenn Hall, tying a club record reached three times by Terry Sawchuk, now with Boston Bruins. It's one short of the league mark of 13 set by Harry Lumley, now of Toronto, while with Detroit.

The loss mathematically eliminated the last-place Hawks, who have been in the four-team playoff race twice in the last 10 years. The last time in 1953. They now have no chance of catching Toronto Maple Leafs in fourth place.

Both Detroit goals were scored in the second period. Alex Delvecchio got his 25th of the season at 1:25. He stepped out of the penalty box, trailed Lorne Ferguson into the Chicago zone and converted a perfect pass.

**ROYAL APPROVAL**

**PLAYER BARRED**  
ROME (AP)—An Italian baseball star who worked out with Washington Senators last spring was barred from Italian baseball for life Saturday because he overstayed his American welcome.

The action was taken against Angelo Rizzo, 25-year-old pitcher. The Italian Baseball Federation said Rizzo violated U. S. immigration laws by continuing in the U.S. after the two-month visa was up.

It added that, as a result, he caused "serious moral damage" to the Italian federation because since then the U. S. state department has extended no further invitations to Italian ball players.

**BREAKS RECORD**  
DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP)—Bates Moynaux, navy aviation mechanic from Corpus Christi, Texas, won a record-breaking victory in the American Motorcycle Association's 100-mile beach and road race for amateur riders Saturday.

The 25-year-old Moynaux, averaging 93.58 miles an hour, crossed the finish line a scant six seconds ahead of Jack Schlamann of Riverside, Calif.

Moynaux rode a U. S. Harley-Davidson and Schlamann was astride a British-made BSA.

The old record was 92.43 miles an hour set last year by Dan Richards of Little Rock, Ariz., on a Harley Davidson.

EDMONTON (CP)—Edmonton Eskimos announced Saturday they will play exhibition games at Montreal, Ottawa and Vancouver before start of the 1956 Western Interprovincial Football Union season.

Eskimos will meet British Columbia Lions at Vancouver Aug. 4 to open the exhibition series.

Aug. 8 they will be in Montreal against the Alouettes and will meet Ottawa Rough Riders in Ottawa Aug. 10 before returning home for the start of the WIFU season Aug. 18.

**INVITED TO CLINIC**  
CHICAGO (AP)—Foreign track coaches have been invited to an "international" clinic to be conducted at the University of California, Berkeley, Calif., June 11-20, by the U. S. National Collegiate Track Coaches' Association.

K. L. (Tug) Wilson, president of the U. S. Olympic committee, Saturday disclosed the invitation was being channeled to Olympic track coaches in all countries through the U. S. Olympic office in New York.

Wilson said the clinic was aimed at an "exchange" of coaching ideas.

## Landy Passes Up Chance At Record To Help Teammate

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP)—John Landy, world's mile record holder, earned a special spot in Sport Saturday by passing up the chance of another record to help a fallen teammate.

The Australian star was on his way to another under-four-minute

mile in the Australian champion ships at Melbourne's Olympic lark arena. Then another runner tripped—fell 500 yards from the finish. Landy stopped, turned to help, but was urged on by the fallen runner, Ron Clarke, who said: "Get going, John. See you later. Don't worry about me."

And Landy got going. He made up 30 lost yards, overtook the leaders and won in 4 minutes, 4.2 seconds. That stop lost him the chance of bettering his own time of three minutes, 58 seconds.

Franz Stampfl, the Austrian coach who trained Roger Bannister to the world's first four-minute mile, said "It was the most gallant action I have seen in a lifetime of athletics."

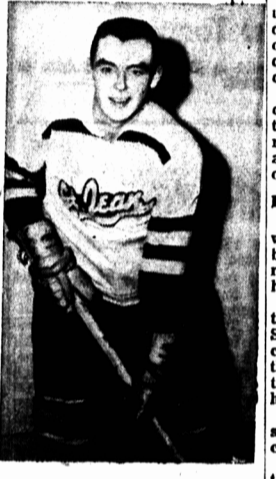
**ROAR APPRECIATION**  
"Landy is the sort of man who would do that. An Olympic Games berth was at stake but that did not matter to Landy. All that worried him was the man on the ground."

And the 20,000 fans who crowded the stadium openly agreed with Stampfl. They roared their appreciation as Landy stepped on to the winner's rostrum after taking the championship by 15 yards from his nearest rival.

The 30 yards that Landy lost by stopping to help Clarke probably cost him five or six seconds.

"When the accident happened I thought I was responsible for it," Landy explained later. "That is why I turned and stopped."

Landy said he covered the last lap in 57.6 seconds—his fastest ever. He did not take the lead until the last-220 yards.

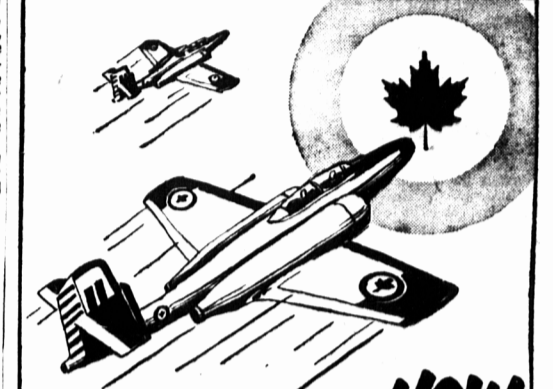
Even the Saint John netminder, Jim Shirley, suffered a penalty. His minor for slashing in the third was served by Gerry Smith.

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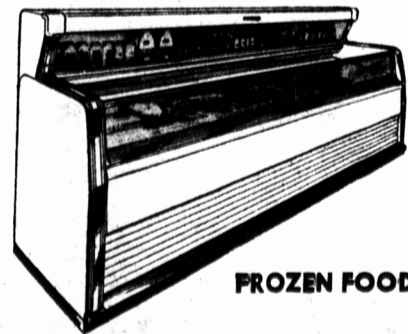
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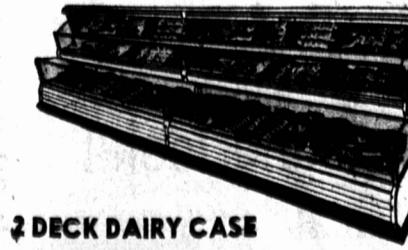
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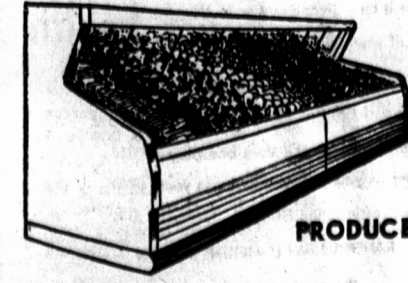
