This amount does not include the price of the farm, which sold for a high figure by private sale to Mr. Frank Lawless, of Graham's Road. Mr. Ronaghan was the proprietor of the Kinkora Race Track, on which good races were held for three years. His purpose was to engage in building operations—a big building boom is taking place in California cities. He has worked at the building trade in California and New York some years ago, and is perhaps still in contact with the same kind of a virus which caused the great stampedes to California, Oregon and the Great West in "covered" wagons across the prairie and plains nearly a century ago. It is rather unfortunate for Prince Edward Island to lose men of Mr. Ronaghan's popular and progressive stamp, but his friends and acquaintances may rest assured that his progressive-ness and popularity will be felt and appreciated in whatever society he moves and hope that at some convenient time in the future he may see fit to return and again make his home in the "Garden of the Gulf."—K.
