MISS MCGARRY COMING.—The many friends in this city of Miss Jennie McGarry, the gifted and universally popular elocutionist, will learn with delight that there is a probability of her paying another visit to Charlottetown, most likely in the first week of July.

MISSION.—We understand that the Redemptorist Fathers will open a mission in this province on the 29th inst. In consequence of the mission the picnic to have been held by the Benevolent Irish Society on Dominion Day is indefinitely postponed.

THE BEATRICE.—The steamer Princess Beatrice, Captain A. H. Kelley, arrived from Halifax, at nine o'clock last evening, bringing a general cargo. Captain Philipps was the only passenger. She will sail on return this evening, with a cargo of pork, potatoes, lobsters, eggs, etc.

I. O. O. F.—It is probable that the Union Degree Staff of this city will exemplify the secret work of the Order before the Grand Lodge at the session at St. John's, N.B., on the 13th August next. They have been written to in the matter and will hold a meeting tomorrow evening to consider the subject.

A SUGGESTION.—Now that the Artillery and Engineer Corps have received their new uniforms would it not be in order to parade at Victoria Park for drill with one or more of the military bands some evening next week. THE EXAMINER feels sure that citizens generally would greatly appreciate such a treat.

MACREREL FISHING.—We are pleased to learn that Mr. McPherson, City Clerk is enjoying his holiday, improving in health, and having good luck in his fishing excursions. He reports that a few days ago, five hundred splendid mackerel were caught by the boat in which he was out, besides a number of codfish and herring.

ALMOST A CATASTROPHE.—Late yesterday afternoon, a well known citizen who lives on Sidney Street, between Great George and Queen, fired a shot from a revolver at a cat in the rear of his premises. Instead, however, of the bullet striking the object aimed at, it struck a stone near by, and, glancing upward, went crashing through one of the windows of B. S. Davies & Co's tailoring establishment on the top story of the Cameron Block, and whizzed past the pressman who was at work in the room. Such reckless use of firearms should be put a stop to at once.

BOARD OF HEALTH.—A meeting of the Board of Health was held yesterday afternoon to consider a letter from His Honor Judge Alley complaining of the non-enforcement of the by-law relating to the keeping of pigs within city limits, and stating that he had advised the attention of the Sanitary Officer to a breach of this by-law, but that official declined to take any action in the matter. The letter was discussed at length but no action was taken, the Board deciding that the enforcing of the by-law was a matter for the Stipendiary Magistrate and the police. Dr. Johnson, Health Officer, who was present, reported that the health of the city was fairly good.

DAMAGED BY LIGHTNING.—The telephone line from Summerside to Centreville was completed on Tuesday evening last, and on the following morning all the coils in the instruments at Centreville and some of those at Summerside were injured by the lightning. The necessary repairs were made yesterday afternoon, and the line is now in good working order. The Georgetown, Eldon, Orwell and Vernon River lines were also interfered with, and workmen are to attend to them at once. Some of the poles at Orwell were shattered. The wires throughout the city were not damaged. Last night's storm did not do any damage to the wires.

SCHOOL MEETINGS.—The annual school meetings throughout the country on Tuesday last were well attended, and supplements to teachers voted in the large majority of districts. It is pleasing to note that people are becoming more and more interested in educational matters every year. Parents, as a rule, are anxious to have their children educated. There is no part of the Dominion where the advantages of education are more highly prized than in this province. The consequence is that our schools are in good running order and our youths are distinguishing themselves both at home and abroad.

HEAVY THUNDER AND LIGHTNING.—A heavy thunder and lightning storm, accompanied by a downpour of rain, swept over the western part of Prince County on Wednesday morning, and without doubt has done considerable damage. So far, the accident to Bloomfield Catholic church is the only one reported. The lightning struck the spire at about half past four o'clock in the morning, and set fire to it. The storm blew as fast as the wind, and the parishoners were quickly upon the spot, where, with saws and axes, under the direction of their pastor, Father Von Bierk, they succeeded in cutting down the spire below the flames, and thus saved, by a herculean effort, their beautiful and well-beloved church. It is certainly nothing short of miracle that church, presbytery and dependencies were not reduced to ashes. The church was insured.

Ottawa Notes.

OTTAWA, June 28.

Chief Engineer Schrieber reports that the Cape Breton Railway will be open for traffic on August 1st.

Lobster packers have been petitioning the Minister of Fisheries for an extension of the season of catch, on the ground that cold weather has made the season later. The reports of officers of the Department, however, show that the catch has been excellent, owing largely, it is believed, to the enforcement of the close season for the past two years.

In view of the vote of last session for tidal observation, the Minister of Marine has ordered a number of tidal gauges which will be placed at different stations along the Gulf and Atlantic Coast for the purpose of accurate registry.

Lord Salisbury's Despatch.

LONDON, June 17.

Salisbury's despatch to the British Ambassador at Berlin, containing an agreement with Germany, declares that Germany's claim that where one power occupies the coast another may not without consent occupy the unclaimed regions in the rear cannot be allowed in cases where the country is already occupied by Englishmen, but where there are no English settlements England has no right to advance against the German claims. England retains the Stevenson Road which will be the boundary line between the English and German spheres, under the terms of agreement between England and Germany. Concerning the African question, it is stated that Germany cedes Vita and Semaliland to England, and England in turn cedes to Germany the territory of Heligoland.

A Disastrous Washout.

TORONTO, June 18.

A washout took place 28 miles east of here yesterday afternoon on the C. P. R. A locomotive was sent out, picking up on its way J. Wanless, jr., the bridge inspector, and division foreman Moriarty and one of his men. When they reached the culvert at Myrtle, running at slow rate, it collapsed, precipitating the engine to the bottom, killing all the occupants. The killed are: J. Wanless, jr., engineer Allen, fireman Oliver, section-hands Moriarty and Lott.

The Tariff Bill.

TORONTO, June 18.

A Washington special to the Mail says the Finance Committee have finished the Tariff Bill. There was a change at the last moment in the agricultural schedule. Barley is left in the mill at 25 cents.

MONTREAL, June 18.

By the latest election returns the parties stand: Government, 45; Opposition, 25; with members for Chicoutime, Gaspé and Lake St. John yet to hear from.

Thunder and Lightning.

HALIFAX, June 18.

A severe thunder storm passed over portions of the Province to-day. At Wolfville lightning struck the American Hotel. The building was considerably damaged, but though full of guests, fortunately no one was injured.

At Little River John Ogilvie's barn was struck by lightning and the building and contents cremated.

The Turf.

LONDON, June 18.

At the Ascot to-day the Stakes were won by Surefoot, the Ascot Derby stakes were won by Battleaxe, and the Fernhill stakes were won by Bumptious. The Royal Hunt Cup was won by Marion, the Triennial stakes by Peter Flower, and the Coronation stakes by Hersey.

Cornell Wins.

ITHACA, June 18.

The boat race between Bowdoin and Cornell eights, this afternoon, on Cayuga Lake, was won by Cornell by four lengths. The course was three miles, straightaway. Time, 17 min. 30 1-5 sec.

The North American Squadron.

HALIFAX, June 18.

The North American Squadron will remain in this harbor until the first of August, when they will visit Quebec and other St. Lawrence ports.

A MAGNIFICENT STEAMER.—The Sun reports the arrival at St. John a few days ago of the steamer Winthrop, which is to ply between that port and New York. The Winthrop is a handsome steamer. Her gross tonnage is 1,445 tons, and her net 1019 tons. The saloon is large and magnificently finished. Her staterooms, of which there are over 70, are airy, well lighted and ventilated, and comfortably furnished. She has great freight accommodation; indeed, it is surprising how much room there is in her for freight. The steamer, which is only a little over two years old, is very fast. She averaged about 15 knots an hour on the trip and made the run from New York to Bar Harbor in 31 hours. The commander of the Winthrop is Capt. H. H. Homer, for several years in charge of the Lucy P. Miller, running between New York, Rockland and Bangor. He is an efficient officer and has a very capable crew. The Winthrop is lighted throughout by incandescent lights. She sails from St. John for New York every Wednesday morning.
