TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

[SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER.] Another Yachting Disaster. A Pleasure Party Lost. PROMINENT CANADIANS PERISH. TORONTO, Aug. 7. Three weeks ago a pleasure party left Sarnia for a cruise to the northern waters of Lake Huron. The party consisted of Messrs. Telfer, of the Bank of London, at Waterford; Wm. Vidal, a son of Senator Vidal; W. C. Morrison; Wm. J. Sinclair, a law student and Secretary of the West Lambton Reform Association; and Hope Mackenzie and Fleming Mackenzie, nephews of the Hon. Alexander Mackenzie. The yacht was wrecked near Port Franks and all hands were lost. The bodies of Messrs. Telfer and the two Mackenzies have been recovered.

Preparing to Resist Invasion. New Quarantine Stations. ASIATIC CHOLERA APPROACHING.

OTTAWA, Aug. 7. In view of the existence of Asiatic cholera in Europe, and of smallpox in the United Kingdom, a proclamation has been issued by the Dominion authorities which puts supplementary quarantine regulations into operation. Port Hawkesbury and the harbor of Miramichi have been made additional quarantine stations. Milwaukee reports an outbreak of Asiatic cholera in Wisconsin with eight deaths to date.

Sayings and Doings in Halifax. HALIFAX, Aug. 7. A colored girl, living in an Albermarle Street dive, exclaimed yesterday "My God, I am dying," and dropped dead.

No efforts are being made to sift the mystery of the finding of a woman's arm in the ash dump. It is said to have been dissected by medical students, but a student so brutal as to carelessly throw portions of a human body into an ash barrel is not fit for this world. General Booth, Commander-in-Chief of the Salvation Army, is to visit Halifax on October 8th.

Commissioner Coombs has returned to Toronto, accompanied by several Hindoos, who will shortly visit Charlottetown. A prominent member of the Nova Scotia Legislature has been on a prolonged drunk in Halifax. The Commissioners in Insolvency have refused to again remand Rupert Johnston to jail, on a charge of defrauding his creditors. They hold that the six months in jail, already served by Johnston, is a sufficient punishment to cover the case. The matter will be carried to the Supreme Court. Johnston is alleged to have got to windward of his creditors to the extent of some \$60,000.

Still Rioting in Belfast. BELFAST, Ire., Aug. 7. While 500 workmen were going home last night, a bottle was thrown amongst them from the window of a dwelling near by. The workmen retaliated with iron bolts, and a furious tumult ensued. Police and soldiers made a charge and fired upon the mob, seven of whom were seriously wounded.

Fearing Absorption. LONDON, Aug. 7. The Times fears that the Gladstonian faction, being the larger one, will absorb the Hartington and Chamberlain wings of the Liberal party.

Non-partisan temperance has been promoted in Ohio by the Murphy blue ribbon meetings, which have enrolled thousands of signatures to temperance pledges. These meetings were begun under the auspices of the Woman's Non-partisan Temperance Union, which was organized in Cleveland two years ago, when the ladies of the W. C. T. U. of that city refused to go with the State Union into the third party movement. Non-partisan unions have been formed on the same basis in the various towns in which the Murphy meetings have been held, and now a State Association has been organized, with Mrs. Finney, who for years was the State Executive of the W. C. T. U., as its president. The new organization will wholly eschew politics.

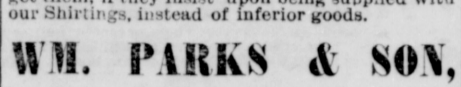
