

Local and Other Items.

TO DAY is the anniversary of American independence. The Boston steamer and other vessels are gaily decked with bunting.

THE steamer "Worcester," Capt. Hedge, arrived from Picton yesterday evening. She will sail for Boston at the usual time on Thursday.

THE machinery for the Mill View Creamery has arrived. It will be set up immediately, and Mr. Bourke expects to see it in operation within a few weeks.

THE Supreme Court was engaged yesterday and this morning trying a case between Moore vs Jardine, of Pownal. The jury this afternoon returned a verdict for Moore for \$45.

MESSRS. E. A. HARRIS and W. H. C. CARVELL returned home from King's College last evening to spend the holidays. Mr. Rattenbury, who takes "the Binney Exhibition" this year, returned on Saturday evening.

A TELEGRAM, received by his friends in Souris, reports that Peter O'Healy was accidentally drowned, in Lake Michigan, on the 30th ult. The deceased was well known in this city, and was for a short time in the employ of John Quirk, Esq.

STRAWBERRIES.—At this time of the year we are usually in the midst of the strawberry season. But this year the first strawberries appeared in market only to-day. They are from a variety of Mr. G. Herbert Hazard, and are of a very fine large early variety.

QUEEN'S COUNTY ELECTION.—Judge Alley began this morning to count the Ballots. He holds his Court in the Law Library, and admits no person besides the Returning Officer, the Election Clerk and the Candidates. We have not been able to obtain any information as to what has taken place.

THE Dominion Act for the suppression of railroad ticket scalping came into effect on Saturday, and the ticket brokers will cease operations. People who have tickets to dispose of will now have to go to the railroads from whom they were purchased. The Grand Trunk people were the chief movers in having this Bill passed.

THE SCOTT ACT.—The decision of the Privy Council in England, confirming the constitutionality of the Canada Temperance Act, has given great satisfaction to the advocates of the measure. The end, however, has not yet been reached. We are informed that Mr. Benjamin, the leading counsel of the opponents of the Act, has moved for an arrest of judgment on account of one of the members of the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council not sitting in the case.—Herald.

REDUCTION IN THE RATES OF MONEY ORDERS.—Commencing on Saturday, a great reduction took place in the rates of money orders between the Dominion and other countries. The rate of exchange will also be reduced from \$45 90 to \$48 for £10 sterling. Orders for all countries will be issued in "dollars and cents" only, and the conversion into foreign money will be effected at the chief office through which the outgoing relative advices pass. In like manner the English post office will convert orders on Canada into dollars and cents before leaving England. A saving of two-thirds will thus be effected. Printed notices containing full information and tables, together with examples, have been prepared, and will be at once placed in prominent places in the various post offices throughout the country.

FAREWELL SERMON.—A large congregation attended St. Andrew's Church last evening, when the Rev. Thos. Duncan preached his farewell sermon. He chose for his text a portion of the 4th verse of the xvii chapter of St. John: "I have finished the work which Thou gavest me to do." After a few minutes consideration of our Saviour's great work of redemption, Mr. Duncan gave a resume of his labors as a minister of the Church of Scotland during his sojourn in Canada. Landing in the city of Halifax twenty-six years ago, he was received by two ministers of the Gospel, one at present a member of St. Andrew's, the other now in Scotland. He was sent to the mission field of Prince Edward Island, and labored there long and with great success. In concluding a most interesting discourse, the rev. gentleman made a very affecting farewell to the members of St. Andrew's congregation, and said his only motive in leaving was a desire to do something for the cause of Christ in his native land. The choir of the church rendered some appropriate music in an admirable manner.—Halifax Herald.

THE Tavernier-Lewis Co. appeared last night in "Rosedale" fair house. It should have been crowded, and those who were not there missed the greatest theatrical treat of their lives. "Rosedale" was presented in a manner never before equalled in the production of any play in this city. Mr. Burroughs enacted the Star part "Elliott May" with his usual ability, portraying the easy-going nonchalant Dragon Officer to the very life. He was ably seconded by the Company, especially prominent being Mrs. Tavernier as the romping jolly Rosa Leigh, Miss Fairfax, a lively Lily Florence, Mrs. Morse a capital Libby, while "nothing of the sort housekeeper" brought down the house. Mr. Tavernier is equally at home in Miles McKenna as in Bardwell Slope, evincing thus a great versatility of talent, while as Matthew Leigh, Mr. Lewis created a fine impression. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

LONDON, July 3. The Times' Calcutta correspondent says the Press considers that a campaign in Egypt will be hailed with the liveliest satisfaction by the native Indian troops.

BOSTON, Mass., July 2. Despatches to the Boston Herald contain the following:—

A despatch from Cairo says that in consequence of the maneuvering of the British fleet Arabi Pasha proposes to send an Egyptian officer on board the flagship to ask for an explanation of the movements of the vessels.

Ruter's correspondent at Constantinople says that the Ambassadors expect that the Porte will be the first to make a commencement with regard to the sending of Turkish troops to Egypt without awaiting a request from the conference.

A Vienna despatch says the Political Correspondence positively asserts that with the agreement of all the Powers, including England, eventual active intervention in Egypt, to be carried out in the first place by Turkish troops alone, is contemplated.

A rumor was circulated in Paris to-night, but is now contradicted that the Government would, on Monday, ask the Chamber to vote 100,000,000 francs to defer the cost of eventual intervention in Egypt.

Arabi Pasha is alarmed at the general immigration of Europeans and Turks, and proposes to confiscate their property.

ALEXANDRIA, July 2. This morning a rumor spread that the Khedive was going aloft. There was great excitement in consequence. Arabi Bey is now commencing operations against the Suez Canal. Barges laden with stones have been sent down to be sunk when necessary. Explosives are also being hurried down. England is most dilatory in not sending gunboats to guard the canal. Arabi is now at Danielta looking after the coast defences. Gen. Stone, it is feared, is throwing in his lot with Arabi and endeavoring to do his utmost to hamper English action. His conduct, generally insupportable, is universally blamed.

The Bedouins are crossing from the Syrian side into Egypt, and are a very serious source of anxiety.

LONDON, July 3. The Commons, in committee, continued its session throughout the night on clause 17 of the Repression bill. At 9.30 this morning, Dr. Lyon Playfair, chairman of the committee, said there had been a deliberately planned obstruction to the business of the House. Parnell, O'Connor, Sexton, Dillon, Healy, Redmond, Power, Biggar, McCarthy, and seven other Irish members were then suspended and they quitted the House. Several of the suspended members denounced the chairman's action as infamous, but it was sustained by a vote of 126 to 27. Clauses 17, 18, 19 and 20 were then adopted. Shortly after 6 p. m. a number of de utry motions were offered which were rejected, and resulted in the chairman naming nine more Irish members, the suspension being confirmed by a vote of 128 to 7. The remaining clauses of the bill were then adopted and the House, at 8 p. m., adjourned.
