Unique Program Of Stream Improvement

The Prince County Fish and Game Association has started a unique program of stream improvement. This plan is to create holes in shallow streams and brooks by the use of dynamite, and on Saturday afternoon the first work in this regard was done. During the afternoon a group of men blasted holes at five different locations on the Little Pierre Jacques River in Hebron. The work is done by members of the association and the dynamite is supplied by the Provincial Department of Industry and Resources. The work is being supervised by a federal fisheries protection officer and the actual blasting is done by a man qualified in explosives. Every precaution is taken to see that as few fish as possible are killed and on Saturday afternoon not one fish of any kind, large or small, became a casualty. The idea of the holes is to provide a place where the trout can lie in deep water. Experts say that if trout come up a stream and find only shallow water they go out again. Quite a number of streams have been recommended for this treatment and it is the intention of the association to continue the work throughout the fall. Mr. Norman MacLeod, secretary of the association, explained that it is an experiment and it is hoped that these holes, which are from four to seven feet deep, will keep washed out for ten or fifteen years. Otherwise, he said, it would not be worth the time or effort.

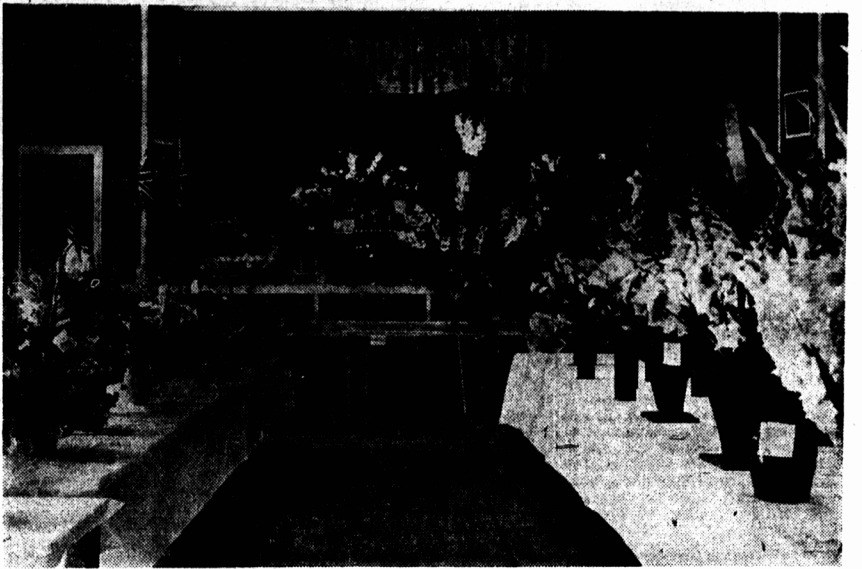
Farewell Gathering For Kensington Pair

Tignish C.W.L. To Sponsor Donor Clinic

Under the convesnership of Mrs. James F. Gallant the Tignish Sub-division of the Catholic Women's League are making all the necessary arrangements for the Red Cross Blood Donor Clinic to be held at Dalton School on Tuesday September 1st, between 2 and 4 p.m. At least 100 donors will be required during the two hour period when residents of Tignish and the surrounding districts will have the opportunity of depositing their donations in the Blood Bank and thereby insure the continuance of this free Red Cross Transfusion Service. It takes on an average of 250 bottles of blood per month to supply the needs of patients in P. E. I. Hospitals. It is imperative that each week reach Clinics to be held next week reach or exceed objectives and in this way make up the 950 required.

Inquest Held In Death of Mr. Edward O'Rourke

A coroner's jury empanelled by Dr. Wilfred Callaghan heard evidence last night in the Summerside Town Hall as to the cause of death of Edward O'Rourke who died in the Prince County Hospital on Thursday, August 20th. The deceased had been brought to the Summerside Hospital from the Alberton Hospital after being found unconscious on the right side of the paved highway leading from Tignish to Alberton. Medical evidence given by Dr. J. K. Beer, who had performed a post mortem examination, revealed that death was due to shock caused by multiple fractures of the extremities and skull and the nature of the injuries indicated that he had been hit by some heavy object in motion. He said it would have been impossible to do anything to save the man's life. Despite desperate efforts which had been made by means of transfusions, to which he had not responded, he never regained consciousness after being brought to the Prince County Hospital. After hearing all the evidence the jury brought in a verdict that death was caused by multiple fractures caused by being hit by a car driven by Mr. Emmett McCue on the night of August 20th, and the jury attached no blame to the driver of the car. Evidence was also given by Dr. Wilbert Shea and Dr. Sydney Bandler of Alberton who had examined the deceased at the scene of the accident and later at the Alberton Hospital. Dr. Hubert MacNeill of Summerside who had assisted in the post mortem agreed in his evidence with that given by Dr. J. K. Beer. Mr. Emmett McCue, the driver of the car, said he had been driving from Montrose on the evening of the fatality and near Alberton he had met another car, both had dimmed their lights. After passing the car he said that when he put his lights on full again he saw an object on the highway, on the right side, and that he hit the object at the same time he first saw it. Brakes were applied immediately and when he got out of his car he went around and looked at all his tires to see what had caused the crash. None of the tires were flat and he concluded that he had hit something and went back some distance when he found a man lying in the ditch. He recognized him as Mr. O'Rourke. He asked a man standing near to get the doctor and the Mounties from Alberton. Mr. McCue said that at no time during the evening had he been drinking at all. He was alone in his car when the accident occurred. Evidence was taken also from James Arthur Bernard who was driving along the highway on his bicycle at the time of the accident and also from Mr. R. C. Baker of Clermont, Ont., who was following the McCue car in his own car. Their evidence corroborated that given by Mr. McCue. Mr. Donald Stewart, Q. C. conducted the hearing as representative of the Crown.-S.

S'side Decides To Buy New Police Car

At a meeting of the police committee of the Town Council on Tuesday evening it was decided to recommend to the Council acceptance of a tender of \$2,000 for a new Motors Ltd. vehicle to be purchased in a 1933 Ford sedan Chevrolet truck was received from A. Horne and Co. Ltd., but the committee decided in favor of MacLean's because, in an effort to fairly distribute the business of the town, consideration was given to the fact that a truck had already been purchased from Horne's this year. Other tenders received was one from Reliable Motors for a Pontiac for \$2,060 and three tenders from F. Earle MacDonald Ltd., as follows: Mercury 1/2 ton truck, \$2,126.55; Meteor sedan delivery, \$2,161.32; Meteor as above with added accessories, \$2,264.53. A tender of \$2,000 for a 1931 Mercury second hand panel delivery but as this was not according to the specifications it was not considered. The members of the police committee, Councillor Steele, chairman, Jenkins and MacDougall, were all present when the tenders were opened.

Cabinet Decides On Route Of Highway

The Summerside-Borden Highway now under construction will not pass through the village of Bideford, it was learned yesterday from Premier A. W. Matheson. A delegation from the village had waited on the Executive Council yesterday in an effort to have the proposed route changed. However, engineers advised that the purpose of the new road would be best served by following the original plans.

Body Of S'side Airman Being Sent Home

The body of Flying Officer R. S. Sharp, son of Mr. and Mrs. Foster Sharp of Bideford, who died in a fire at Sandspit, B. C., Sunday night, is being sent home by train for burial but the time of arrival had not been learned yesterday. Full Air Force honors will be accorded at the funeral. F/O Sharp was the victim of a fire that destroyed a Department of Transport hostel. He had apparently been asleep and was trapped when the two-storey building used for transient accommodations at the Sandspit airport was swept by flames. Mrs. Sharp, the former Helen Stewart of Summerside, and their three weeks' old baby are expected home by plane on Friday. F/O Sharp was graduated from R.C.A.F. Station Centralia as a pilot on March 7, 1932, and was married the same day. He was serving at R.C.A.F. Station Comox, B.C., and at the time of his death had been on a search mission and was spending the night at Sandspit. He is survived by his parents, a brother, Gerald, at home and three sisters, Mrs. William Davidge of Summerside, Betty of Summerside, and Constance at home. F/O Sharp had been posted to Greenwood in September and had planned to visit his home at that time.-S.

10 Canadians Named To IODE Scholarships

Naming of Dr. Albert Sinclair, son of Mrs. Sinclair and the late Mr. Peter Sinclair, M. P., Summerside, to an I. O. D. E. Overseas scholarship as previously reported in a release from Mrs. Kathleen Drope, national president of the Order. The original announcement was made in February by Mrs. Thane A. Campbell. There will be ten Canadian students taking the post-graduate courses in universities of the United Kingdom during the coming college term. A majority of them will leave this country early next month. Dr. Sinclair served in the Active Force during the past war and on his return resumed his studies at Prince of Wales College before entering medical school at Dalhousie University from which he graduated last year. Dr. Sinclair has been doing post-graduate work in the Vancouver General Hospital as a preliminary to advanced work in general surgery at hospitals on this continent and in Great Britain. His present plans are to attend the University for London School of Post-Graduate Studies and to take the required year of basic medical science following which he will work in an approved hospital in the practice of general surgery so he will be eligible to be a candidate for a Fellowship in the Royal College of Surgeons of Canada. These I. O. D. E. scholarships are tenable at any university in the British Empire to enable young Canadian men and women to continue their academic studies at the post-graduate level and thus better equip themselves for their work in Canada when they return. There have been 227 such scholarships awarded since 1920 by the I. O. D. E. First War Memorial.
