CITY COUNCIL.—Councillors Hazard, Hooper, Johnson and Fenell to-day signed a requisition, according to law, to the City Clerk, Mr. H. M. Davidson, Mayor Dawson being at present absent, asking him to call a special meeting of the City Council on Tuesday morning next at ten o'clock, to pass a resolution of condolence and consider the vacancy caused by the death of Councillor Robertson, and take the necessary steps to fill such vacancy, and to authorize the Chairman of the Finance Committee to sign cheques and transact other necessary business during the absence of the Mayor. In accordance with the requisition, notices have been served on the Councillors for the meeting.

GOT ASHLEY.—A correspondent writes: On Monday, the 10th inst., while two young men, C. A. and A. McDonald, were hunting partridge in the vicinity of East Lake, they got away amongst the dense undergrowth and could not find their way out. At about 12 o'clock, p. m., their friends became alarmed at their non-appearance, and a search party was organized, when, by the aid of horns, the missing men were enabled to find their way back to the residence of a friend at East Lake, about 1 o'clock, a. m. They were exhausted after their long wanderings through the wood and carrying a heavy load. They were kindly treated however, and were soon able to proceed to their respective homes. Young men, in the pursuit of pastime, should be careful not to follow their game so far as to lose their reckoning, thus causing their friends so much anxiety.

THE CATHEDRAL BAZAAR.

More of the Noëful.—Mr. Walter Matheson has given the Ladies' Committee for the Bazaar \$5 in cash.

The long-talked-of Bazar will soon be a veritable truth. Judging by the generous donations, and by the willing helpers who have volunteered to assist in working, everyone's wishes seem to be bent in the one direction—that of making the Bazar a huge success in every way and if appearances are any criterion, the wishes are in a grand prospect of being realized.

Foremost among the workers are the Decorating Committee, and they deserve all the praise that can possibly be accorded them. Through their efforts, the bare, cold-looking Rink has been transformed, gilded, and into a decided realistic "thing of beauty."

But like most beautiful things, it must be but a transient reality, and it seems almost a pity that the pretty draperies, artistically arranged, and well trimmed tables, should ever have to be removed. But they must needs be so, and it will amply repay anyone who visits the Rink during the bazaar days, to look at the tasteful and well blended arrangement of colors in the hangings, as well as to peep inside and see the countless good things the bazaar contains. Particulars will be given later; but it is meet to say here, that the floor has been raised to a level with the promenade, which is a very great improvement in every way.

This was the idea of the energetic decorating committee to whom also is to be given the credit of building a kitchen on the Kent Street end of the Rink, the last of an indispensable adjunct. It is convenient yet not at all in the way of those who hold tables or stalls in the main building.

Eulogisms innumerable could be written of the glories the Rink is to contain during Exhibition week, but they must be reserved until the 24th is a little nearer. But when it does come let everybody see for themselves and judge accordingly.

ASSAULT CASES.—Before J. T. Mellich, J. P. for Queen's County, William Merchant vs. James Lewis, assault and battery. This case came up before the Magistrate for hearing last Saturday, and judgment was given to-day. The facts were as follows:—William Merchant and a companion went in bathing off Mr. James Lewis' land, August 15th last. After dressing themselves they perceived two boys coming out of Lewis' field with turpins in their hands. Merchant also saw Mr. Lewis coming after them, whereupon he called out as he said himself to his companion. However, the boys took alarm and escaped from Mr. Lewis, who, thinking that the warning indicated an association with the turpin thieves, caught Merchant by the neck and dragged him a short distance.

The Magistrate held that as a property holder has power to put under arrest any one stealing from his premises, and as he had a good reason to believe from the warning call, though according to the evidence he was mistaken, that Merchant was a party to the theft that had just been committed, he had been justified in seizing him, and had all the protection of a police officer in a similar position. He therefore dismissed the case each party to pay his own costs.

Attorney-General for defendant, Angus McKenzie vs. Joseph Brown.—Assault and battery at Bradalbane on August 18th. This case was settled. H. J. Palmer for plaintiff; McLean, Q. C., for defendant.

REGISTRATION OF VOTERS.

The next general election will fall to be held on the lists now under preparation. It is, important, therefore, that all who take an interest in the affairs of the country should see that they are in a position to make it felt when the time comes. This can be done only by having their names duly entered on the parliamentary voters' lists.

Every British subject of the age of 21 years is entitled to vote if he possesses any of the following qualifications:

1. Is the owner in a city of real property worth \$300; or in a town \$200; or in the country worth \$150.

2. Has been tenant for a year of real property, under lease, at a rental of \$20 or over.

3. Is the bona fide occupant of real property in a city valued at \$300, in a town valued at \$200, or in the country valued at \$150.

4. Derives an income from his earnings or investments of at least \$500 annually.

5. Is a farmer's son whose father's property, if divided would qualify both father and son or sons.

6. Is the son of an owner of real property of sufficient value, if divided, to qualify both father and son or sons.
