

P.E.I. Harness Racing Club Annual Meeting

A well attended meeting of the members of the P. E. Island Harness Racing Club was held in the council chamber at City Hall last evening with the president, Dr. R. F. Seaman, in the chair. The annual report was read by the secretary-treasurer, W. G. Gillespie, and showed the finances to be in a healthy state and the past year a very successful one. The president's report, given by Dr. Seaman, appears below.

After discussion by several members a vote of thanks was presented to the president, the secretary and the board of directors for the excellent way in which they handled the affairs of the Club. The election of directors to succeed retiring ones resulted in Dr. R. F. Seaman, Charlottetown, Winston Taylor, Nine-Mile Creek and John Kelly, Southport being elected to the Board. Other members of it are Frank McKay, Harold Stead, George Bookings, Charles Miller, Dr. Temple Hooper and Jack Amherst. At a directors' meeting which was held following the annual meeting, Dr. Seaman was re-elected president with Jack Amherst as vice-president and W. G. Gillespie, secretary-treasurer.

The meeting went on record as favourable to continuing the two-year-old futurity trot, two-year-old futurity pace, three-year-old futurity trot, three-year-old futurity pace, four-year-old futurity trot, four-year-old futurity pace. These are the same classes as were raced last season.

the starting fee and 34 horses faced the starter. Total purses amounted to \$3,000.00 plus \$80.00 to non-money winners and the club as usual donated a cooler to the winner of each class. No records were broken but in the two-year-old race, Ralph McFadden's "Dr. F. C." a bay colt by Abner T. Clegg, dam, My Ann, driven by George Sobey, paced within two seconds of the Maritime record. Fast times were made in all other classes and the competition was keen. The three-year-old trot and four-year-old trot having each two heat winners. I am sure that we all appreciate the encouragement and financial support given us in the last two

Indians Get Kiner In Trade With Chicago Cubs

CLEVELAND (AP) — Ralph Kiner, one of the National League's greatest home run hitters and one of its highest paid players, joined Cleveland Indians Tuesday, and for him Chicago Cubs got an unnamed player and an undisclosed amount of cash.

Kiner's salary — a reported \$65,000 at Chicago and \$75,000 in mid-1953 when Pittsburgh Pirates traded him to the Cubs — was one reason for other National League clubs waiving on the big outfielder.

Other reasons were his age—he was 32 last month—and his performance in 1954, an off-year for him, although he batted .285 and hit 22 homers.

What the Indians will pay Kiner still to be negotiated. "And that's going to be tough to do," said Tribe general manager Hank Greenberg. Greenberg telephoned word of the trade to

Kiner's Palm Springs, Calif., home just before announcing it at a conference.

Surprised he was traded out of the National League, Kiner also was pleased. He said he was "looking forward to being with Cleveland where some of my best friends play."

NO ESTIMATE

Greenberg refused to give even a "range in amount" paid for Kiner and said the "satisfactory player" to go to the Cubs would not be selected until "about the time the season starts." Such a player would have to be waived out of the American League or be a minor leaguer.

The general manager said Kiner would "add power to our outfield and be an emergency first base man." Although left field is his regular position, and he is just a so-so fielder, Kiner played some first base for the Pirates in 1951.

Would Raise Junior Hockey Age Limit To 21

QUEBEC (CP) — Phil Watson, coach of Quebec Frontenacs, said Tuesday he thinks the age limit for junior A players should be raised to 21 from 20 if junior hockey, particularly in Quebec province, is to survive.

The Quebec Junior Hockey League is down to three teams from last year's five. Jonquiere Marquis withdrew during the weekend after losing 13 of 14 games and last season's poor attendance forced Montreal Royals to disband before this season started. Frontenacs, Trois-Rivieres Flambeaux, and Montreal Canadiens remain.

"If the age limit were higher perhaps there'd be more players to spread around the league and Jonquiere wouldn't have had to drop out," Watson said in an interview. "I lost 11 players from last year's team. Trois-Rivieres lost nine and Canadiens eight. If these boys were still playing junior, the kids we brought up this year to replace them could have gone instead to Jonquiere or any weaker team that needed them."

"With an age limit of 21, there'd probably be enough players around to have junior teams operating in Hull, Sorel and Sherbrooke."

Halifax Pair Eighth In Snipe Championship

HAVANA, Cuba (CP) — Tex Wells of Wichita, Kan., the defending titleholder, Tuesday won the first race of a six-race series for the western hemisphere snipe championship.

Dick Shaw of Halifax Armadale Yacht Club finished eighth among the nine contestants after dropping back two positions in the last leg of the six-mile course.

Sailing with Shaw as crew member was 17-year-old Bob Dauphinee, a student at Queen Elizabeth high school in Halifax. Shaw and Dauphinee called it "a very good race, but we hope to do better."

"We will be very happy to be in the middle," said Shaw, a third year engineering student at Halifax's Dalhousie University.

Shaw and Dauphinee are making their first appearance in the western hemisphere championships. Last August they won the Canadian snipe championship at Baddeck, N. S.

The race was held in a smooth sea at the Miramar Yacht Club, 10 miles west of Havana. There was a light breeze of eight to 12 miles an hour.

Wells, former world's champion, sailed the triangular course in one hour and 20 minutes. He finished just seven seconds ahead of Harris Whittemore of Lake Quassapaug, Conn. Clemente Inclan of Cuba, 1950 western hemisphere champion, was third.

Plan \$15,000 Golf Tourney At Vancouver

VANCOUVER (CP) — This west coast city moved into the big-time professional-golfing circuit Tuesday with the announcement that a \$15,000 tournament will be staged here next summer.

The British Columbia open championship, formerly a \$1,500 meet, was upped to \$15,000 by an unnamed city industrialist. Dates for the tournament are June 29 to July 2.

The B. C. Open has been put on the schedule of the U.S. Professional Golfers' Association which virtually assures the presence of the top golf-trail stars.

Officials said the \$15,000 prize money will not be an annual affair, but it is possible it will be offered the years in which the U.S. Open is played in the west. The U.S. Open in 1955 will be played in San Francisco June 16-18.

Carver Gets Three Goals As Islanders Defeat Ramblers

The Prince Edward Islanders still dazed from their defeat at the hands of the Ramblers on Monday night, struck hard in the final period of last night's battle at the Forum to trounce the Lou Kiley men 11-3 before a small home-town crowd. The smooth, hard sheet of ice allowed the teams to combine and stage the fastest and most rugged performance of the local season. The Islanders, who have carried the most impressive lineup in the league but who have had poor luck in getting their men to work together, really showed fans last night that the combinations have finally started to click and that they mean business from here out.

Orin Carver, who arrived in town only yesterday morning, took only 43 seconds to make the red light (dash behind the over-worked Am-

herst goalie Ray "Toughie" Steeves. Orin added a goal and an assist in the middle frame and banged home another for his hat-trick in the final. Centerman Copper Leyte was high point-getter of the game collecting a total of one goal and four assists for five points. Lorne Hennessey had two goals and two assists, Bob Gray with four assists and Buck Whitlock getting two markers and one helper. Ray LeDuc, Wally Kullman and Wimpy Jones were the other marksmen for the local team, while Dave Kiley picked up two of the three Amherst goals.

PENALTY PARADE

A total of 11 penalties were handed out by referees Maurice Goodwin and Jack Kane, including two majors and a misconduct in

a wide-open second period. The Islanders received six and the Ramblers five. Shortly after the 15 minute mark of the second period the play, which had been considerably rough all during the session, came to a climax when Amherst defenceman Don "Buck" Rogers started the wait to the penalty box after being tabbed with a 10-minute misconduct for roughing up referee Jack Kane while protesting Lorne Hennessey's first goal. Thirty-four seconds later Wally Dropped the gloves to duel with Amherst forward Emmett Kennedy after the latter had given Wally a hard jab with his stick. Kullman received a minor roughing charge. A little over a minute later, at 18:24, saw a shoving contest between Buck Whitlock and Roger LeDuc, behind Islanders' net, turn into a boxing-wrestling show with both men trading several good rights and lefts before being parted by the refs. Each man was handed a two-minute major.

The 10-minute rest between the periods seemed to quiet the boys and they settled down to play some of the fastest, cleanest hockey seen here this season with the Islanders collecting a total of six goals as they peppered Ray Steeves with 28 shots.

GOAL FOR GOAL

The teams played goal for goal in the first period with Dave Kiley matching Carver's early period goal at 2:28 on a pass from Kennedy that slid in on the far corner. Whitlock put the Brklacieh gang ahead again at 6:43 as a puck passed from the corner by Lorne Hennessey bounced crazily off Buck and behind the surprised Steeves. Dave Kiley was back two minutes later as he stole the puck off Danny O'Connor at the Islanders' blue line and rapped it past Jim Shirley to close out the first period scoring. The Ramblers were short-handed at the time. The Ramblers had a two-man advantage for over a minute at 15:00 but were unable to get organized.

Wanderers Rout Moscow Soccer Team In 4-0 Win

WOLVERHAMPTON, Eng. (AP) — Wolverhampton Wanderers, England's best soccer team, routed Moscow Spartak 4-0 here Tuesday night after a three-goal blitz in the last five minutes.

The speedy and spirited Wolves, ranked at the top in the Football Association's first division, ran the Russians off their feet to score the final three goals in the 86th, 88th and 89th minutes.

The victory on a cold, clammy night over a Russian team they badly wanted to defeat was just what the Wanderers and all English soccer needed. English prestige has been falling like autumn leaves since Hungary, Yugoslavia and Uruguay defeated England's national teams in the last year.

Individual English clubs also have lost three straight games to top ranked foreign teams.

All-Australian Tennis Final

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — An all-Australian final was assured Tuesday for the New South Wales tennis championships when Ham Richardson of Balora Rouge, La., was eliminated. But the stunning surprise came when ageless John Bromwich upset Davis Cup star Lewis Hoad.

Southpaw Mervyn Rose eliminated Richardson, the last United States player in the tournament, 6-4, 6-4, 7-5, but the outcome of the Bromwich-Hoad match dismayed the crowd.

The 36-year-old Bromwich, a two-handed player who started winning the New South Wales title back in 1937, raked the 19-year-old Hoad with a sharp 6-4, 6-3, 7-5 victory. Bromwich meets Rose in the semi-finals Thursday, while Ken Rosewall plays Rex Hartwig.

Rosewall ousted Lennart Bergelin of Sweden 6-4, 6-3, 8-6, and Hartwig defeated Don Candy, conqueror of America's Tony Trabert, 6-1, 1-6, 6-1, 6-0.
