

Rumors New Revolution Threatens In Argentina

Admiral Isaac Rojas, and the BUENOS AIRES (Reuters)—Strong forces of armored cars took up positions near the ministry here Wednesday and rumors started that another Argentine revolution was in the offing.

A dramatic climax to the recently mounting tension appeared to be approaching. It was not clear whether the troops were protecting or threatening the ministry building.

Air force units from inland military airstrips were arriving at Buenos Aires airports.

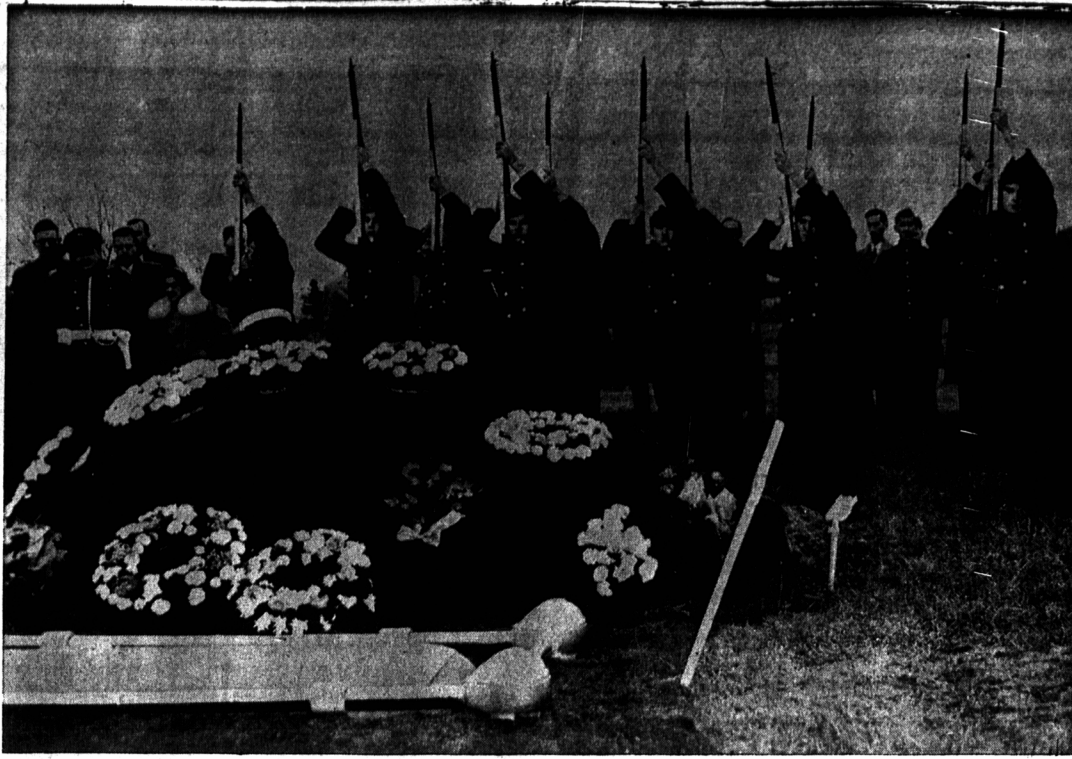
The political situation—barely seven weeks after the deposition of Juan Peron from the presidency—is in turmoil following night-long meetings between army leaders and government ministers.

Despite an early morning statement by a spokesman for the army minister, Brig-Gen. Leon Bengoa, that the general had resigned, the city was expecting news which will measure the depth of the rift among the country's administrators.

Government sources say the issue at stake is the degree of thoroughness with which revolutionary compromises between the men in power and the political parties must be carried into effect.

Let's Talk It Over

The Provincial Government of Ontario at last coming to grips with a project that we have long thought was very important. They propose to have pupils in school take a course in driving a car with the idea that they will complete the course and obtain a driving license at the age of 16. The Education Department of Ontario, however, threatens to put a spoke in the wheel of this new idea. Its members object to it as no time for such instruction in the modern curricula. Surely there must be something taught to modern pupils that is of less importance than the ability to drive a car with discretion, courtesy, and a thoroughgoing knowledge of the rules of the road.

We think the ever-mounting annual toll of traffic fatalities will be reduced appreciably by instilling in teen-agers a thorough appreciation of the importance of careful and courteous driving, and a sound knowledge of the principles, not only of safe driving, but also, of safe pedestrian procedure. This form of instruction in the school would not take very much time. It could be given once a week during the high-school years. Sandwiched in between more or less passive study, it would have a certain recreational value, and give pupils a chance of moving their hands and feet. To borrow some of Bobby Burn's words, "I think 'it's comin' yet, for a' that."

FO. Ness Is Buried With Full Military Honors

Killed in an air collision last Thursday night near Bagotville, Que., Flying Officer William Ness, 20, of Borden, P. E. I., was buried with full military honors in St. Peter's Cemetery, Seven Mile Bay, on Wednesday morning.

Requiem High Mass was sung at Sacred Heart Church, Borden, for FO. Ness, with Flight Lieutenant J. A. Warren, Roman Catholic chaplain at R. C. A. F. Station Summerside, as the celebrant. He was assisted by the Rev. F. McDonald, P.P., and the Rev. T. P. Hammill, of Sacred Heart Church.

Under the direction of Ft. Lt. E. C. S. Wilkinson, DFC, a funeral party of 70 officers and airmen from the local air base was in attendance at the church and at the cemetery. Three volleys were fired by the firing party at the graveside before the sounding of the Last Post by Sergeant E. J. Ford, station bandmaster.

After coming to Prince Edward Island from Scotland, FO. Ness attended school at Cape Traverse and Kinkora and was employed in Summerside by the Island Equipment Co. Ltd., and the Summerside Co-Op Store.

After enlisting in the R. C. A. F., he served at London, Ont., Winnipeg, Man., and Cold Lake, Alta., before being transferred to Bagotville, where the fatal accident occurred.

FO. Ness is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Michael Ness, of Borden, in addition to his sister, Mrs. Russell Doyle, of Charlottetown, and the following half brothers and sister all of Borden, Michael, David, Robert and Elizabeth.

Ancient Insects Found In Amber From Alaska

MONTREAL, (CP)—Mummified bodies of insects 60,000,000 years old have been found embedded in Alaskan amber, the Arctic Institute of North America announced Tuesday.

Fossil impressions of older insects exist, said the institute, but the Alaskan animalcules are believed to be many millions of years older than any other actual insect specimens extant.

The institute sponsored the search for ancient Alaskan relics. It was conducted by Dr. Robert L. Usinger and Dr. R. F. Smith, professors of entomology at the University of California.

Bedrock sources of Alaskan amber were discovered within the last few years by the United States Geological Survey, but it was not until last summer that the California professors extracted pieces of amber for study and examination.

The institute said detailed study will be necessary to determine the nature of the insect in the amber samples brought out by the scientists but preliminary examination shows the specimens were in a fine state of preservation.

The amber was found in the Colville river valley and along the Kuk river, on the northern slope of the Brooks range some 150 miles above the Arctic Circle.

The institute said amber is unusual in that it is the only substance which may contain actual insects preserved from the past when they became trapped in the resinous matter from which amber is formed. The U. S. Geological Survey has reported that dates from cretaceous time and any insect specimens it contains may contribute materially to entomology and to the field of evolution studies in general.

The recent field work in Alaska was based on the Arctic research laboratory of the office of naval research at Point Barrow, northernmost research station on U. S. soil.
